GENERAL INFORMATION

WELCOME: The State Fair of Texas[®] (State Fair) encourages your participation in this year's Fair. The Fair staff looks forward to hosting you and your exhibits at Fair Park, and we welcome you to Dallas.

FAIR DATES: The 2014 State Fair of Texas (the Fair) will be held at Fair Park, Dallas, September 26 to October 19, unless postponed, shortened or extended by the Board of Directors, which they reserve the right to do if they deem it necessary for the general welfare of all concerned.

HOMELAND SECURITY/EMERGENCY EVACUATION OF LIVESTOCK/PROPERTY STATEMENT: During such time as deemed necessary by local, state or federal authorities, the State Fair of Texas, and/or its officials may, temporarily or permanently evacuate Fair Park under the authority of the Homeland Security Act. Incidents such as, but not limited to, extreme weather conditions, bomb threats, acts of war, declarations of war, code red of the Homeland Security System, etc., will be acted upon in accordance and cooperation with local, state and federal authorities. Priority evacuation will be given to human life, then livestock and/or property. In such cases, exhibitors will turn over the care of their livestock or property to State Fair, or as directed by governmental authorities. Proper animal husbandry practices will be followed within reasonable expectations. At such time the evacuation notice is lifted, exhibitors will be allowed to re-enter Fair Park and claim their livestock or property.

INTERPRETATION OF RULES: State Fair reserves to its Executive Committee the final and absolute right to interpret these General Rules and Regulations, the Youth Livestock Show Special Rules, and/or any applicable special requirements as published in this premium list (collectively, the "Rules") and to reasonably settle and determine all matters, questions and differences in regard thereto, or otherwise arising out of or connected with or incident to the Fair, and the right to amend or add to these rules as its judgment may determine. An exhibitor who violates any of the following rules may forfeit all privileges, fees paid and premiums and be subject to such penalty as the Executive Committee may order.

The failure of the State Fair to enforce any of the provisions, rules, rights or remedies of this premium list or to exercise any options or sanctions herein provided will in no way be construed to be a waiver of such provisions, rules, rights, remedies, sanctions or options.

Special rules or conditions are published in each department where necessary. If there is a conflict between the special rules or requirements of any department or division and the general rules and regulations, the special rules or requirements shall apply.

LIABILITY STATEMENT: All exhibitors and exhibits shall comply with the Rules of State Fair. State Fair shall not be liable to exhibitor for lost profit or other financial loss to exhibitor of any type or description including any special, indirect, reliance, incidental or consequential damages which may be caused directly or indirectly by the enforcement of such Rules, or for any time delays, inadequacies of services of State Fair or any use of the premises or by any deficiency or defect therein. Additionally, State Fair is not responsible for any loss, injury or damage caused by exhibitor or exhibitor's animal(s) that may arise directly or indirectly from exhibitor's participation at the Fair. Each exhibitor will be solely responsible for any such loss, injury or damage, whether to person or property, and shall indemnify State Fair, the City of Dallas and their officers, directors and employees against all legal proceedings arising there from.

DISCLAIMER OF WARRANTIES: State Fair expressly disclaims any express or implied warranties (including warranty of merchantability), whether the goods or services are provided by State Fair, its vendors or others (such as drug testing). State Fair does not provide special security or guard services for the livestock area and is not responsible for the acts of third parties. Exhibitor (and exhibitor's parent or legal guardian, if exhibitor is a minor) agree and acknowledge that State Fair will disqualify any exhibitor whose animal tests positive for ANY drug even if the exhibitor (and the exhibitor's parents/guardian) are innocent of any wrongdoing and had no role in the administration of the drug shown by the drug test. Even if the source of the drug is unknown, the State Fair shall be entitled to disqualify the exhibitor. Disqualification will result in the forfeiture of all auction proceeds and/or premiums, and the exhibitor may be prohibited from exhibiting livestock in future State Fair shows.

VETERINARIANS/MEDICATIONS: Animal under the care of a licensed veterinarian and/or taking ANY type of medication, including but not limited to steroids, diuretics, anti-inflammatories, tranquilizers and/or pain killers, are ineligible for competition. Exhibitors with questions regarding medications and/or eligibility should consult the

Official State Fair Veterinarian prior to competition. Exhibitor (and exhibitor's parent or legal guardian, if exhibitor is a minor) agree and acknowledge that: (1) they are absolutely and solely responsible for the care and custody of their animals; (2) State Fair shall be entitled to disqualify an exhibitor whose animal(s) test positive for ANY medication, even if the exhibitor and the exhibitor's parents/guardians are innocent of any wrongdoing and did not administer the medication; and (3) the drug test results of the testing laboratories are final and binding upon the exhibitor and the exhibitor's parents/guardians.

PRESS INFORMATION: Members of the State Fair Agricultural Publicity Staff will be glad to furnish any information requested by representatives of newspapers, magazines, radio and television stations. Results of judging will be furnished as quickly as reasonably possible. All reasonable cooperation and assistance will be given to all representatives of the working press covering the State Fair. Facilities for the working press will be available through the State Fair's Public Relations Department.

FIRE REGULATIONS: Smoking is prohibited in and around any buildings, regardless of whether such building is open air or enclosed. No containers containing flammable liquids will be allowed in any buildings.

GUEST ASSISTANCE: It is the intention of State Fair that all visitors be welcomed and treated with courtesy and respect. Should guests experience problems with a State Fair employee or vendor, these concerns should be reported immediately to State Fair Management, so that the matter can be addressed before the Fair concludes.

FIRST AID STATION: State Fair will maintain a completely equipped First Aid Station staffed by registered nurses, paramedics and ambulances to provide emergency treatment and reference facilities for accidents and illnesses occurring in Fair Park. The First Aid Station is located on the Southwest side of Fair Park Coliseum, call (214)421-8723 for assistance. Management assumes no responsibility for accidents in Fair Park.

ENTRY REQUIREMENTS

- 1. SIGNED LIABILITY STATEMENT: Each exhibitor (and exhibitor's parent or legal guardian, if exhibitor is a minor) must sign a statement acknowledging that he/she understands and will abide by the liability requirements and all Rules of State Fair. If the exhibitor does not sign this statement (contained on the entry application forms), application for entry will be rejected.
- 2. ENTRY ELIGIBILITY: The State Fair does not discriminate against any applicant, volunteer, customer or patron on the basis of race, sex, color, age, disability, religion, citizenship, veteran status, nationality or ethnic origin. Competition in all Pan-American Livestock Exposition (open show) classes is open to the public, except where stated in this premium list. Competition in Youth Livestock Show classes is restricted. Refer to the Youth Livestock Show Special Rules for entry eligibility. Only animals officially entered will be allowed on the Fairgrounds.
 - **a. TAX IDENTIFICATION:** Each 4-H Club, FFA Chapter, Youth Contestant, and Open Contestant <u>MUST</u> complete an IRS Form W-9 and return it with entry applications.
 - **b. ENTRY REQUIREMENTS**: Contestants and their exhibits must meet and adhere to the requirements of these Rules and any and all Special Rules listed under the appropriate department(s) and division(s) as printed in this premium list to be eligible for entry.
 - c. **HEALTH REQUIREMENTS**: Please refer to the State Fair of Texas Animal Health Requirements listed in this premium list.
 - **d. FIRMS AND PARTNERSHIPS**: Firms and partnerships entering animals for competition must be in existence at the time of making entry and, in all cases, must be bona fide.
 - e. **REGISTRATION**: All animals in the breeding classes must be recorded in the recognized books of record for their respective breeds and exhibitors must produce a certificate of registry at the request of the management at any time during the Fair. Tattoos, ear tags or other identification marks must match registration certificates. See applicable special rules.
 - f. OWNERSHIP: To be eligible for competition, whether singly or in groups, animals must be the bona fide property of the exhibitor, and all animals entered for competition in the open breeding classes must be entered in the name of the owner and must have been owned prior to entry closing date. If proof of ownership is required, an affidavit must be furnished. Jointly owned animals must be entered and shown under the multi-ownership (all co-owners) in the individual classes. In the group classes, jointly owned animals may be entered and exhibited under the name of one of the co-owners provided he owns a full or part interest in each of the animals in the group entry. For joint ownership of animals entered for competition in the Youth Livestock Show, see the Youth Livestock Show Special Rules.

3. INELIGIBLE TO ENTER:

- a. DISQUALIFIED EXHIBITORS: State Fair reserves the right to refuse entry of any contestant for violation of these Rules. Contestants who have previously been disqualified from State Fair shows will not be allowed entry until the time expressed to them by the Executive Committee of State Fair.
- b. DISEASED ANIMALS: Diseased animals cannot enter the State Fair livestock area or grounds. Animal Health Officials, Superintendents, the Official State Fair Veterinarian, and/or State Fair Management will refuse unloading privileges to animals showing signs and symptoms of disease.
- **c. BARREN ANIMALS**: Barren animals are not eligible for breeding classes. An affidavit verifying the animal is a breeder must be furnished upon request.

4. ENTRY PROCEDURE:

- a. ENTRY APPLICATION: All applications for entry must be made on current, official State Fair of Texas entry application forms in accordance with instructions on same, giving division, class, and all other necessary information. Exhibitors may also enter online at www.bigtex.com. All youth entries must be submitted online by the CEA/AST. (See Youth Livestock Show Special Rules)
- **b. GROUP ENTRIES**: An additional entry fee may be required for group classes, see individual department rules and regulations. Group class entries will not be accepted after the registration check deadline. NO ANIMALS WILL BE ALLOWED TO ENTER AT THE SHOW RING. All animals entered in a group class must be shown in their respective individual age class. The dam, sire, or breeder represented must be named on the entry application.
- **c. DOUBLE ENTRIES**: If the exhibitor chooses to show in both the youth and open shows, separate fees are required. Exhibitor may enter both shows on the Youth Entry Application by noting the open division and class on the entry form. Only animals entered in the Youth Breeding Shows may enter the open show.
- **d. ENTRY ACCEPTANCE**: In all cases, the management reserves the right to reject, accept, or accept conditionally an application for entry and does not guarantee space in the exhibition buildings. Rejected entries may be returned to the applicant.
- e. ENTRY SUBSTITUTIONS: Entry substitutions may be made within the same department/division and by the same owner of the original entry. The substitution may be made after the entry deadline without a late fee if the entry information for the substituted animal is provided to State Fair Management at the time of check in. NO SUBSTITUTIONS WILL BE ALLOWED AFTER THE CHECK IN DEADLINE.
- **f. ERRONEOUS ENTRIES**: At the discretion of State Fair Management, exhibits that have been erroneously entered may be transferred to their proper classes prior to judging. State Fair Management will decide the disposition of each case of erroneous entry upon its merits.
- **g. INCOMPLETE ENTRIES**: Incomplete entries are defined as entries made by entry deadline (online, if required) but are missing signatures, W-9's, payment, or other required information and may be accepted conditionally.
- 5. ENTRY DEADLINES: Entries must be postmarked by the U.S., Canadian, or International Postal Service no later than the applicable deadline date. Postal metered date is not acceptable.
 - a. Youth show entries must be submitted <u>online by midnight. August 25th</u>. The following must also be postmarked on or before September 1.
 - **1.** One check per county/chapter
 - 2. One W-9 per exhibitor
 - 3. One Release and Liability Signature form per exhibitor
 - 4. One W-9 per county/chapter
 - **5.** One Summary Sheet per county/chapter
 - **b.** Open show entries will be accepted after the September 1, 2014 deadline.
 - c. Contest (public speaking, judging, etc) and rabbit show entries need to be postmarked by September 15,.
 - **d.** Late Fees will be assessed to any entry postmarked after applicable entry deadline (see Miscellaneous Fees). State Fair Management may reject any late entry without explanation.

6. ENTRY FEES: All applications for entry must be accompanied by all entry and related fees. If the entry does not have fees enclosed, the application for entry will not be accepted or accepted conditionally. All international exhibitors must pay fees in certified United States currency. Entry fees are not stall fees and do not dictate stall space.

d. COMPLIMENTARY TRAILER PARKING:

The Trailer Parking Lot is locate east of the Pennsylvania Avenue Gate and is monitored by security personnel. State Fair assumes no responsibility for vehicles or trailers parked in this lot. No trailers will be allowed to park on grounds. Official Release will be required to remove trailer from lot (See specific departments/divisions for release times).

10. RETURNED CHECKS: Any exhibitor issuing a check for payment of entries, stalls or passes which does not clear their account for any reason will have five (5) days in which to make payment to keep entries eligible to participate in the Fair shows with a \$35.00 returned check fee assessed.

11. REFUNDS:

- **a.** Entry Fees for competitive events are refundable when written notification of cancellation is postmarked prior to the applicable entry deadline.
- **b.** Admission and parking pass fees are refundable when written notification of cancellation is received prior to the opening day of the Fair. Admission and parking passes must be returned with the written notification.
- c. All refund requests must be made for amounts greater than \$20.00.
- **d.** Refunds will be forwarded to the entry applicant as soon after the close of the Fair as they can be properly processed. Cash refunds are payable by bank check. All refunds, whatsoever, not claimed within 90 days upon receipt, shall be deemed forfeited to State Fair.

COMPETITION

12. JUDGES:

- **a. SELECTION OF JUDGES**: Judges will be selected by State Fair Management. Judges will be familiar with all Rules of the State Fair.
- **b.** JUDGES' DECISION: The judges' decisions are final. See Rule 13 for protest details.
- **c.** Interference With Judges: If any exhibitor, in any way, whether in person or by their representative, interferes with the judge(s), or shows any disrespect to them or to show officials, State Fair management may excuse him/her from the ring and disqualify them from further competition; exhibitor premiums that may have been awarded may also be forfeited.

13. PROTESTS:

- **a. FILING**: All protests must be in writing and accompanied by a deposit of \$300.00, cash or certified check, which will be forfeited if protest is not sustained. Such protest must state plainly the cause of the complaint or appeal and must be delivered to State Fair Management immediately after the occasion for such protest.
 - **1.** Protests will be accepted prior to, during and within 2 hours immediately following the conclusion of judging.
 - 2. Any protest as to the eligibility on account of age or breeding of animals must be filed with the management prior to the day on which they are to be judged.
 - 3. No protests will be accepted for over looked entries.
- **b. INVESTIGATION**: Judging procedures will not be interrupted for protest investigation; and depending on the basis of the protest, a decision may be withheld until a thorough investigation is completed.

14. SHOW RING COMPETITION:

- a. Humane Treatment: Exhibitors are to treat animals in a humane manner at all times. Show Management will provide a warning to any exhibitor deemed to be in violation of this basic principle of animal husbandry. Any exhibitor who fails to heed the warning will be disqualified and removed from show grounds. Show Instruments (ex: show sticks, driving sticks, bats, etc.) are to be used for the purpose of directing animals while they are in transit throughout the barn and while they are being exhibited in the show ring.
- **b. COMMUNICATION DEVICES: NO** electronic/communication devices are allowed in the show ring. This includes cell phones, PDA's, laptops, walkie-talkies, and other communication devices.
- **c. ENTRY NUMBER**: Each entry in the Pan-Am and Youth Livestock Shows will be assigned an entry number. This number will identify animals in the show and will correspond with the numbers in the Official Judge's Book and must be displayed by exhibitors when the entries are being judged.
- d. METHOD OF AWARDING: No animal will be awarded a prize unless removed from its stall or pen and exhibited, with entry number, before the judge(s) in the show ring. The management reserves the right to return entries and cancel any class in which, in its judgment, the numbers of entries are insufficient to insure adequate competition. Where there are fewer entries in a class than the number of premiums offered, the judge(s) may, at their discretion, award a prize or prizes of such grade as the animal merits.
- e. TIME OF JUDGING: The Livestock Events Schedule, as published in this premium list, will be followed as closely as possible. Exhibitors should ascertain at what time the exhibits entered will be judged. Judging will not be delayed for exhibitors entering the show ring late. Any exhibit not presented promptly at the scheduled time will be ruled out and excluded from competition when the class is called.
- f. JUDGING CONTESTS: When an exhibitor is called upon to furnish one or more animals for any judging contest(s), he or she will cooperate with State Fair Management. Refusing to allow an animal to be used in this manner, without State Fair Management approval, will result in the forfeit of any prizes or such other action as State Fair Management deems necessary. Selection will be made under the direction of the department superintendent(s).
- **g. DISQUALIFICATION**: If an exhibit is disqualified after having won awards or premiums, the exhibits placing below it WILL NOT be moved up to fill the vacated position. There will be no refund of any fees due to disqualification.
- **h. UNWORTHY EXHIBIT**: Judges shall not award a prize to an unworthy exhibit. It is the intention of the management that no premium or distinction of any kind shall be given to any exhibit that is not deserving.

- **15. PHOTOGRAPHS**: Photographs of Champion and Reserve Champion exhibits will be taken by the Official Photographer of State Fair. Exhibitors of Champion and Reserve Champion winners must make themselves and their exhibits available for the taking of official photographs. Exhibitor hereby grants State Fair permission to utilize photograph, image or likeness in whole or in part for use in official State Fair publications and promotions.
- **16. PREMIUM PAYOUT**: Total premiums will be paid by State Fair unless otherwise stated. Premiums will be forwarded to designated person(s) as directed, as soon after the close of the Fair as they can properly be processed. Cash premiums are payable by bank check. Checks will be made payable to the exhibitor listed on the entry form. All premiums whatsoever, not claimed within 90 days upon receipt, shall be deemed forfeited to State Fair. State Fair reserves the right to withhold premiums awarded in every case in which it shall appear to the State Fair Management that the Rules have not been complied with, or that fraud or deception has been practiced or attempted.

COMPETITION EXHIBITS

- **17. ANIMAL/EXHIBITOR DISQUALIFICATION:** In order to foster fair competition, provide a level playing field and protect the safety of the food chain, the showing of unethically fitted livestock, livestock of any ineligible age for exhibition in the class entered, and/or animals being administered unapproved drugs is strictly prohibited. Additionally, any animal that has been administered a drug, even though that drug is FDA approved for its species, is subject to disqualification if that animal tests positive for that drug once it has arrived at State Fair and/or participated in State Fair shows. All animals must remain free and clear of all drug and chemical residues while on State Fair grounds.
 - **a. UNETHICAL FITTING**: Unethical fitting means any attempt to alter the natural appearance, conformation, musculature or weight of an animal by any unnatural means. Animals showing any signs of being unethically fitted will be disqualified. Examples of unethical fitting include, but are not limited to the following:
 - Application of any substance to any part of the animal's body, unless specifically allowed in the department rules of that entry
 - Use of injection
 - Draining of fluids
 - Bruising
 - Feeding of material not conducive to the health of the animal, safety of food or marketability of its carcass
 - Surgical alterations
 - Artificially filling animals by stomach pumping or airing injections
 - **b.** OVER AGE ANIMALS: Over age animals will be disqualified.
 - **c. UNAPPROVED DRUG USE**: The showing of an animal that during its life has been administered any quantity of any unapproved drug, chemical or medication is strictly prohibited. Such drugs include, but are not limited to, any diuretic, unapproved growth stimulant or other unapproved medication. Unapproved means not approved by the FDA and/or the USDA for slaughter animals including animals that may be destined for human consumption.
 - **d. APPROVED DRUG USE**: If an animal has been administered a drug that is FDA approved for its species, sufficient time must have passed so that the animal does not test positive for that drug upon arrival at the Fairgrounds. Animals must remain free and clear of all drug and chemical residues while on the Fairgrounds and/or participating in State Fair shows. Please note that elimination time (the time it takes for no drug residue to be found in the system) is generally longer than the labeled withdrawal time for most approved drugs.
 - e. ANIMAL INSPECTION: As condition for participation in the State Fair shows, exhibitor agrees to submit any animal entered by the exhibitor for inspection by any veterinarian appointed by State Fair Management. Exhibitor also agrees to have such animal submitted to any tests requested by State Fair. Exhibitor also agrees that the opinion reached by State Fair or its officials as to whether such animal is unethically fitted or over age shall be final and binding without recourse against State Fair, its officials or any of its appointed veterinarians. Further, State Fair specifically reserves the right to have ultrasound, D.N.A., tissue, blood or urine laboratory analysis made on any animal entered for State Fair competition. The conclusions reached by the veterinarian or laboratory shall be final and binding without recourse against State Fair, its officials or any of its appointed veterinarians. An exhibitor of an animal that is found to be unethically fitted, over age, and/or testing positive for any drug or medication or unapproved chemical may forfeit all titles, awards, auction proceeds, premiums, scholarships, as well as rights and privileges to exhibit livestock in the future at the Fair. Exhibitor waives any cause of action which he/she

might have for any action taken under these Rules, and releases State Fair and any appointed veterinarian from any and all claims or demands whatsoever in connection with the inspection or testing of any such animal or any ruling or action taken by reason of the conclusion of such veterinarian.

- f. UNMANAGEABLE ANIMALS: State Fair may disqualify any animal deemed unmanageable.
- **g. NON-ADHERENCE TO THE RULES**: Any person found guilty of misrepresentation or not abiding by the Rules in this premium list will be disqualified and denied the privilege of showing at the Fair.
- h. EMERGENCY TREATMENT: If an animal requires emergency treatment while on State Fairgrounds, only a licensed veterinarian will be allowed to administer any drug, chemical or feed additive. An exhibitor may choose a licensed veterinarian other than the Official State Fair Veterinarian, but the Official State Fair Veterinarian MUST be notified in advance and he/she MUST be present. Animals which are administered treatments with a withdrawal or extended elimination time period will be disqualified from competition. Furthermore, the Official State Fair Veterinarian, in agreement with State Fair Management, reserves the right to treat any animal if, in the opinion of the Official State Fair Veterinarian; it is in the best interest of the animal's health and well-being to be treated. If the Official State Fair Veterinarian administers treatment to an animal, and therefore uses any medication that does not meet the appropriate withdrawal and/or elimination time, such animal will be determined ineligible for competition.
- i. **TREATMENT COSTS**: All treatment costs are the responsibility of the exhibitor.
- j. DISQUALIFICATION/CONDEMNATION OF ANIMAL: State Fair practices a "zero tolerance" policy on all residue violations. State Fair reserves the right to condemn and/or disqualify any animal, either live or slaughtered, found in violation of the Rules, and the exhibitor will forfeit all auction sale and/or premium money if the animal is disqualified. If an animal(s) is disqualified, the class placing will not change. A disqualified exhibitor may forfeit all rights and privileges to exhibit livestock in the future at the Fair, as well as any and all State Fair scholarship opportunities. Disqualifications due to violations of State Fair Rules as stated in this premium list or the Entry Certification, Release and Indemnity agreement and any consequences will be decided by State Fair Management. These decisions may be appealed to State Fair's Executive Committee from whose decision there can be no further appeal.
- **18. POSTMORTEM EXAMINATIONS:** The City of Dallas and State Fair require a postmortem examination of any animal or poultry which dies during the Fair. This examination must be performed by the Official State Fair Veterinarian at the expense of the exhibitor.
- **19. CONDUCT**: Any exhibitors or their representatives not cooperating with State Fair officials in all matters, while on the Fair grounds, will have their entries disqualified and will be ordered to remove their exhibit from the grounds immediately and may lose the opportunity to participate in future competitions.
- **20. GROOMING**: Animals are to be shown in natural conformation and color, except where stated otherwise in this premium list. Any product used externally to alter the conformation and/or appearance of an animal for exhibition is prohibited. This includes, but is not limited to, false hair, artificial color, adhesives, or other similar substances.
- **21. RELEASE**: Entries must be on exhibit at the official opening of the Fair or any other time specified in the premium list and shall not be removed from the Fairgrounds prior to the release date printed in the premium list, except at the discretion of State Fair Management.

DISPLAYS AND NON-LIVESTOCK EXHIBITS

- **22. DISPLAYS:** All displays/exhibits must remain in assigned space and out of pedestrian aisles. All curtains, drapes, decorations, merchandise, or material must be Non-Combustible or Flame Proof. Fire Marshalls will inspect exhibits and ask you to remove any materials that they believe is a fire hazard.
- **23. CARE OF EXHIBITS/PROPERTY**: All owners or others in charge of livestock, poultry or other property shall care for, guard, protect and preserve the same, as State Fair does not undertake to do so, and it shall not be held responsible for any loss or damage to said property, poultry or livestock. State Fair does not provide special security or guard services for the livestock area and is not responsible for the acts of third parties.
- 24. OBJECTIONABLE EXHIBITS: State Fair Management, in its sole and reasonable discretion, reserves the right to remove from the Fairgrounds any exhibit, animal, stand or display that may be falsely entered, or may be deemed unsuitable or objectionable. State Fair will refund any money already paid by the removed exhibitor which shall exonerate the State Fair from any claims whatsoever on the part of such removed exhibitor.

- **25. ADVERTISING**: No person will be permitted to distribute any literature or advertising materials on the Fair grounds, except from a valid contracted exhibit space. The tacking or posting of any advertisement, bills, etc., other than within the exhibit space as defined by State Fair is strictly prohibited. The distribution of handbills, fliers and heralds will not be permitted. Nothing shall be sold or given away or otherwise disposed of by exhibitors which will in any way conflict with, or which is subject matter of, any privilege or concession granted or sold by State Fair.
- **26.** CLEANUP: All stalls, pens and exhibition places must be cleaned before 7:00 a.m. each day and refuse matter disposed of as directed by State Fair Management. For those exhibitors refusing to keep their stalls, pens and/or exhibits clean and neat, State Fair Management reserves the right to have said stalls or pens properly cleaned with the cost to be charged against the exhibitor. Said cost will be collected from the exhibitor before release is issued.
- **27. EQUIPMENT**: Any equipment brought in must be used in assigned stalls or space and must comply with and be used in compliance with all federal, state and municipal occupational safety and health regulations. Some equipment may require a special permit and a fee to be paid before being utilized on grounds.
 - **a. SCALES**: State Fair will provide scales for the use of exhibitors during shows that classes are broken by weight. NO OTHER SCALES will be allowed on the Fairgrounds.
 - b. FANS: Fans are not allowed in any pedestrian aisle. No rear fans are allowed. No exceptions.
 - **c. GENERATORS**: City of Dallas Fire Prevention Code prohibits liquid or gas fired portable generators or other equipment in livestock facilities in all enclosed structural areas. No liquefied petroleum-fueled or flammable or combustible liquid-fuel generators or other devices will be allowed.
 - d. **GROOMING/TRIM CHUTES**: Chutes will be allowed with appropriate permit. Chutes must remain in assigned stall space and may not be placed in any aisle or walkway.
- **28. DOGS:** Dogs are not allowed on Fairgrounds, except service dogs aiding sight impaired or physically challenged persons, or dogs under contract with State Fair.
- 29. NURSE COWS: Nurse cows are not allowed on Fairgrounds.

STATE FAIR OF TEXAS ANIMAL HEALTH SUMMARY OF REQUIREMENTS Effective: August 15, 2014 THESE REGULATIONS ARE SUBJECT TO CHANGE AT ANY TIME

The following summary is a condensed version of the Texas Animal Health Commission regulations. The regulations will supersede this summary if there is a dispute between the two. FOR MORE INFORMATION, contact the Texas Animal Health Commission by calling (512)719-0777 (24 hours) or 1(800)550-8242, ext. 777, or by writing the TAHC, P.O. Box 12966, Austin, TX 78711-2966.

The State Fair of Texas® Youth Livestock Shows are restricted to intrastate entries. The Pan-American Livestock Exposition® and State Fair of Texas Horse Shows are open, interstate shows, accepting entries of livestock, equine and poultry from within Texas, other states, and other countries.

<u>Certificate of Veterinary Inspection</u> The certificate must indicate that the accredited veterinarian found the animals or fowl to be free of symptoms or evidence of communicable disease and that all tests, immunizations or treatments required by the Commission were completed. For certain diseases, a specific statement may be required indicating disease free status. The certificate is required to accompany animals and fowl entering the State of Texas and Fair Park as stated in the following summary of entry requirements.

THE CERTIFICATE IS VALID FOR 45 DAYS FOR EQUINE AND 30 DAYS FOR ALL OTHER SPECIES.

Prior Entry Permit Entry permits are required as noted in the following summary of entry requirements. Permits may be obtained by calling (512)719-0777 (24 hours) or 1(800)550-8242, ext. 777, or by writing TAHC, P. O. Box 12966, Austin, TX 78711-2966. The permit for entry is not required when livestock and ratites enter for the exhibition and return to the state of origin. All poultry entering Texas must be permitted.

CATTLE (BEEF & DAIRY) Texas Origin Breeding Cattle (not including Youth Market and Prospect Steers)

- 1. Certificate of Veterinary Inspection current, within 30 (thirty) days. CVI must have a statement "the animals listed on this CVI have not been in or near a quarantined area nor exposed or showing symptoms for Vesicular Stomatitis within the last 30 days ."
- 2. All dairy cattle must be identified with official ID and recorded on the certificate of veterinary inspection.
- 3. Any bulls changing ownership, more than 12 months, must have a negative trichomoniasis test within 60

days. (Does not apply to exhibition only Bulls)

Out-of-State Origin Cattle

- 1. Must meet the same requirements as Texas Origin Breeding Cattle.
- 2. Negative tuberculosis (TB) test within 60 days for all sexually intact dairy cattle that are 2 months of age or older or originate from an accredited tuberculosis free herd. In addition, all sexually intact dairy cattle originating from a state or area with anything less than a tuberculosis free state status shall be tested negative for tuberculosis in accordance with the appropriate requirements for states or areas for that status, prior to entry with results of the test recorded on the certificate of veterinary inspection.
- 3. All bulls entering Texas for the purpose of participating at fairs, shows, exhibitions and/or rodeos and returning to the state of origin, which are more than (12) months of age and capable of breeding may enter the state without testing for trichomoniasis, but shall obtain a permit prior to entry into the state. Bulls permitted for entry into the State of Texas under the provisions of this subsection shall not be commingled with female cattle or used for breeding. Bulls that stay in the state more than sixty (60) days must be tested negative for trichomoniasis with one official Polymerase Chain Reaction (PCR) test.
- 4. **The Permit for Entry** is not required when cattle enter for exhibition and return to the state of origin, except for exhibition bulls that do not meet TAHC's Trich entry requirements.
- 5 All sexually intact cattle entering Texas for exhibition purposes and originating from Idaho, Montana or Wyoming must be individually identified and must have a statement on the certificate of veterinary inspection that the animals have never resided in the DSA.

Youth Market and Prospect Steers

1. Certificate of Veterinary Inspection current, within 30 (thirty) days. CVI must have a statement "the animals listed on this CVI have not been in or near a quarantined area nor exposed or showing symptoms for Vesicular Stomatitis within the last 30 days ."

EQUINE

Texas Origin Equine & Out of State Origin Equine

- 1. **Certificate of Veterinary Inspection**, current, issued within 30 (thirty) days or a current, valid equine interstate passport or equine identification card, issued within 6 (six) months. CVI must have a statement "the horses listed on this CVI have not been in or near a quarantined area nor exposed or showing symptoms for Vesicular Stomatitis within the last 30 days ."
- 2. Negative equine infectious anemia (EIA) test (also known as "Coggins Test") within 12 (twelve) months. In state origin equine: foals, under eight months of age, nursing a negative dam are exempt from testing. Test document must be in hand or test results and related information must be shown on the certificate of veterinary inspection.

GOATS Texas Origin Goats & Out of State Origin Goats (including Youth Market Goats)

- 1. Certificate of Veterinary Inspection, current, within 30 (thirty) days. CVI must have a statement "the animals listed on this CVI have not been in or near a quarantined area nor exposed or showing symptoms for Vesicular Stomatitis within the last 30 days ."
- 2. Texas All sexually intact exhibition goats must be officially identified with a Scrapie Eradication Program eartag prior to entry, except registered goats with a registration tattoo and accompanied by registration papers.
- 3. Out of State All exhibition goats must be officially identified with a Scrapie Eradication Program eartag prior to entry, except registered goats with a registration tattoo and accompanied by registration papers along with a scrapie premise ID number.

LLAMAS

Refer to Exotic Livestock and Ratites (Camelidae)

<u>POULTRY</u>

Texas Origin Poultry (not including Youth Market Broilers)

- 1. **Negative pullorum-typhoid test** within 30 (thirty) days or from flocks that meet either the Texas Pullorum-Typhoid Program or the National Poultry Improvement Plan (NPIP).
- Poultry must originate from areas where reportable avian diseases are not known to have been active within the last 30 (thirty) days.

Out of State Origin Poultry

1. NO OUT OF STATE POULTRY ENTRIES PERMITTED.

Youth Market Broilers

1. Youth Market Broilers are **NOT** required to have a Certificate of Veterinary Inspection.

<u>SHEEP</u> Texas Origin Sheep (including Youth Market Lambs)

- 1. Certificate of Veterinary Inspection issued within 30 (thirty) days. CVI must have a statement "the animals listed on this CVI have not been in or near a quarantined area nor exposed or showing symptoms for Vesicular Stomatitis within the last 30 days ."
- 2. All sexually intact exhibition sheep must be officially identified with a Scrapie Eradication Program eartag.

Out of State Origin Sheep

- 1. Must meet the same requirements as for Texas Origin Sheep.
- 2. All exhibition sheep must be officially identified with a Scrapie Eradication Program eartag prior to entry.
- 3. **Negative ELISA brucella ovis test** within 30 (thirty) days for all breeding rams 6 months of age or older. Each ram shall be individually identified with an individual eartag or registration tattoo. This number, along with the test results and name of the approved laboratory and date of test, shall be entered on the certificate of veterinary inspection.

SWINE **Texas Origin Swine** (not including Youth Market Swine)

- 1. Certificate of Veterinary Inspection current, within 30 (thirty) days listing identification and including a statement that they have not been fed garbage, have not been exposed to pseudorables, have not been vaccinated for pseudorables, have not had any clinical signs or diagnosis of TGE or PEDv within the last 60 days and is under no guarantine for any disease or condition.
- 2. Leptospirosis vaccination is required on breeding swine, 6 months of age and older, within 30 (thirty) days with Leptospirosis vaccine containing the following strains: Canicola, Hardjo, Icterohaemorrhagiae, Grippotoyphosa, and Pomona.

Out of State Origin Swine

1. Must meet the same requirements as Texas Origin Swine.

2.Permanent Identification is required on all swine except swine designated to slaughter.

1. Certificate of Veterinary Inspection is desirable, but not required for this terminal show. All youth market swine entering the grounds must be in good health and disease free.

EXOTIC LIVESTOCK AND RATITES

Exotic Livestock are defined as grass-eating or plant-eating, single hooved or cloven-hooved mammals that are not indigenous to this state and are known as ungulates, including animals from the swine, horse, tapir, camel, llama, rhinoceros, elephant, deer, and antelope families.

Camelidae are defined as members of the family of animals which include camel, llamas, and vicunas. The domestic members of the genus lama include the llama, alpaca, and guanaco.

Ratites are defined as exotic fowl with a flat breast-bone and small or nonexistent wings, such as ostriches, emu, rheas, and kiwi.

Exotic bovidae are defined as non-indigenous members of the family of animals which includes water buffalo, gnu (wildebeest), addax, antelope and nilgai (among others).

Exotic cervidae are defined as non-indigenous members of the family of animals which includes deer, elk. moose, caribou, reindeer and the sub-family musk deer.

Texas Origin Camelidae

1. Certificate of Veterinary Inspection current, within 30 (thirty) days. CVI must have a statement "the animals listed on this CVI have not been in or near a guarantined area nor exposed or showing symptoms for Vesicular Stomatitis within the last 30 days ."

Texas Origin Ratites

- 1. Certificate of Veterinary Inspection current, within 30 (thirty) days.
- 2. Individually identified with an implanted electronic device (microchip), tag or band. The identification will be shown on the certificate of veterinary inspection along with the location and name brand of the implanted electronic device. If an animal has more than one implanted microchip, then the location, microchip number, and name brand of each will be documented on the certificate of veterinary inspection; and
- 3. Tested and found to be serologically negative for Avian Influenza and Salmonella pullorum-typhoid from a sample collected within 30 days of entry. Birds or hatching eggs must originate from flocks that show no evidence of infectious disease and have no history of Avian Influenza in the past six months.

Texas Origin Exotic Bovidae

- 1. Certificate of Veterinary Inspection current, within 30 (thirty) days.
- 2. Negative brucellosis test within the past 30 (thirty) days.
- 3. Negative tuberculosis test within the past 60 (sixty) days.

Texas Origin Exotic Cervidae

- 1. Certificate of Veterinary Inspection current, within 30 (thirty) days.
- 2. Negative brucellosis test within the past 30 (thirty) days.
- 3. **TWO Negative tuberculosis tests** conducted no less than 90 (ninety) days apart the second test must be conducted within 90 (ninety) days prior to the date of movement; and the animals must be isolated from all other members of the herd during the testing period, or;
 - A. Originate from an accredited free herd, or;
 - B. Originated from a qualified herd and have a classified negative 90 (ninety) day tuberculosis test. If the qualifying herd test was administered within 90 (ninety) days of movement, the animal(s) do not require an additional test, or;
 - C. Originate from a monitored herd and have a classified negative 90 (ninety) day tuberculosis test, or;
 - D. Be less than 12 (twelve) months of age, originate and were born in accredited, qualified, or monitored herds and have not been exposed to cervids from a lower status.

Texas Origin Exotic Swine

- 1. Certificate of Veterinary Inspection current, within 30 (thirty) days.
- 2. Negative brucellosis test within the past 30 (thirty) days or originate from a validated free herd.
- 3. Negative pseudorabies test within the past 30 (thirty) days or originate from a qualified free herd.

Out of State Origin Exotic Livestock and Ratites

1. Must meet the same requirements as Texas Origin Exotic Livestock and Ratites.

DOGS

DOGS ARE NOT ALLOWED ON THE FAIR GROUNDS because of safety and public health regulations. This rule will be strictly enforced and applies to exhibitors and their employees, as well as to State Fair visitors. This rule does not apply to official dog entries in a sanctioned State Fair of Texas competitive and/or entertainment event or to guide dogs for those with sight impairment. A Certificate of Veterinary Inspection current within 30 days is required to accompany all dogs eligible to enter Fair Park. Certificate must state that the dog has had a rabies vaccination within 1 year.

PAN-AMERICAN LIVESTOCK EXPOSITION® OPEN BEEF CATTLE

BEEF CATTLE DEPARTMENT REQUIREMENTS

- 1. **RULES/REGULATIONS**: Entries made in this department shall be subject to and each exhibitor agrees to abide by the General Rules and Regulations as published in this premium list.
- 2. ENTRY APPLICATION/FEE: An entry application and fee of \$30 per head must be submitted by entry deadline. All fees must accompany online or mailed in applications for entry or mailed in signature forms. This fee is not a stall fee. A show fee in addition to the State Fair of Texas entry fee may be levied by a breed association or group.

Late entries will be accepted until September 15, for a late entry fee per head equal to two times the regular entry fee per head.

- **3. ENTRY LIMITATION**: No exhibitor shall be permitted to show more than two animals or one group of animals in any one class. All animals shown in a group class must be shown in their individual age class.
- 4. ADMISSION/PARKING: No complimentary admission will be available. All exhibitors are requested to purchase a section admission pass good for the duration of each show entered. Complimentary parking passes will be given to exhibitors entering 6 or more head in any one section. Please see "Admission and Parking" in the General Rules Section of this Premium List. When a request for Certified Mail is indicated on the entry application and the certified mail fee is included with all other fees, passes will be mailed to the exhibitor. Livestock personnel at the Animal Health Office will issue prepaid passes, not mailed, to the driver of vehicles with livestock upon arrival.
- 5. OWNERSHIP: Exhibitors entering an animal in any other name rather than the name of the bona fide owner or owners, or showing an animal in a class for which it is not eligible, may, at the sole discretion of the livestock vice president, be barred from further showing, and any or all premiums previously awarded may be forfeited. Animals owned in partnership may be entered in proper classes in one owner's name, but must appear under this ownership name in all classes entered.
- 6. **REGISTRATION**: Each animal shown in this division must be registered. An original certificate of registration must be presented to the superintendent at the registration check and kept available at all times during the show for each animal exhibited. Application for transfer and pending registration will not be accepted.
- 7. HEALTH REQUIREMENT: All animals entering Fair Park must comply with the requirements as determined by the Texas Animal Health Commission. An original Certificate of Veterinary Inspection must accompany animals, be made available to animal health officials and/or show management upon arrival, and kept available with exhibit at all times during the show. (see TAHC Requirements.)
- 8. DOGS ARE NOT ALLOWED ON THE FAIR GROUNDS because of safety and public health regulations. This rule will be strictly enforced and applies to exhibitors and their employees, as well as to State Fair visitors. This rule does not apply to official dog entries in a sanctioned State Fair of Texas competitive and/or entertainment event or to guide dogs for those with sight impairment. One warning toward removal will be given prior to contacting law enforcement officials for removal from Fair Park.
- 9. STALLS/BEDDING: Stall space will only be assigned for animals that arrive on the grounds. Animals entered, but not arriving on the grounds will not receive stall space or first bedding. Exhibitors will be provided a coupon that may be exchanged for first bedding material through the State Fair of Texas Feed Office on the grounds on the day of arrival only. Only bagged or baled wood shavings or chips and small square baled straw, in very limited quantities for an individual exhibitors use as first bedding, will be permitted on the grounds and the same will be available from the State Fair of Texas Feed Office. All additional bedding must be purchased from the State Fair of Texas Feed Office. Special and specific stall requests must be submitted on the Stall Request Form included in this premium list by September 15. There is no guarantee that any stall request can or will be honored.
- **10. FEED/HAY:** Feed grains of all types, along with several kinds of hay, will be available, at reasonable prices, through the State Fair of Texas Feed Office on the grounds. Exhibitors are not allowed to bring large quantities of feed, bedding or hay onto the grounds. However, exhibitors who must use their own feed will be allowed to bring the feed on grounds in limited amounts on a daily use basis.

- **11. TIE OUTS**: A limited number of tie out spaces will be sold on a first come first serve basis. Tie outs may be purchased at time of entry or from the Livestock Office. Tie outs will be assigned upon arrival when the exhibitor provides proof of purchase to the superintendent. Cattle will not be removed to tie outs until 7:00 PM daily. Cattle are limited to the assigned tie-out areas. Special provisions may be made for those breeds that have special requests which are submitted to the livestock and/or beef cattle superintendent in writing, prior to the start of the show. Tie-out fees must be paid for, in advance, before using tie-outs.
- **12. FANS**: No fans permitted in any pedestrian aisle. No rear fans permitted. No exceptions.
- **13. GENERATORS**: No generators permitted.
- **14. GROOMING CHUTES**: Chutes may be brought on the grounds during the beef cattle shows provided a permit is purchased. Fee is to be paid at the time entries are made. Space for chutes will be in stalls or outside cattle buildings. No chutes permitted in any pedestrian aisle.
- **15. RELEASE**: Releases will be written upon arrival.

The premium assistance provided by the American Angus Association for participation in this show is in addition to the premiums offered by the show itself. The Association contributions will be included in the premium checks issued by the show.

SPECIAL RULES

- GROUP ENTRIES: Group classes are denoted by a "G" after the class number. A \$10 additional entry fee is required for each group class entered by entry deadline. A late fee equal to two times the regular group class entry fee is required for group class entries made after the entry deadline. <u>GROUP CLASS ENTRIES WILL NOT</u> <u>BE ACCEPTED AFTER THE REGISTRATION CHECK DEADLINE</u>. All animals entered in a group class must be shown in their respective individual class. The dam, sire or breeder represented <u>MUST</u> be named on the entry application. Do <u>NOT</u> name the individual animals entered in the group.
- 2. A minimum of fifty (50) head must be shown in the open class division to receive American Angus Association premium participation for the following year.
- 3. Premiums from the association are paid only to registered Angus cattle and only if the registration number is a part of the show report provided to the Association. Therefore, all cattle should be registered at the time of entry to make certain they receive the association's portion of premiums. The association does not pay a percentage on premiums offered in championship classes.
- 4. Exhibitors must have the original registration certificate on each animal available for inspection at the show. Electronically stored registration certificates are NOT accepted – only the original certificates issued by the American Angus Association.
- 5. Any female shown with calf at side, calf must be the cow's most recent natural calf and the calf must be registered by show date and have the original registration certificate at check in.
- 6. Only one person at a time shall lead animals into the show ring.
- 7. Exhibitors who participate in shows that accept premium monies contributed by the American Angus Association are subject to the Association Rules as found in the Breeders Reference Guide of the Association. These rules are found in Part 2; Association Rules. The rules relating directly with the exhibition of Angus cattle are Part 2: Association Rules; Rule 800 Series; including Rule 800-810. These rules can be found at www.angus.org.
- 8. Altering the conformation and/or appearance of an animal for exhibition is prohibited. This includes the covering of white skin, false tale heads (or use of any false hair), with the exception of false tail switches. The use of graphite, powders, hemp or other similar substances used externally are also prohibited. Other prohibited products include those used internally such as steroids, illegal or unlicensed pharmaceuticals or artificial filling. Any animal found to be in violation will be barred from showing.
- 9. At any show for which the American Angus Association appropriates funds toward the payment of premiums, no exhibitors, individuals assisting exhibitors or member owners at such show shall be allowed to use any coloring agents, on any animal exhibited. The Association may adopt and implement various tests designed to monitor this prohibition, including but not limited to a "white towel" or "white glove" test. No aerosol cans or other pressurized containers will be allowed in designated make up areas.
- **10.** All animals exhibited are subject to DNA marker or blood type test to verify accuracy of parentage as covered under the Association Rules and for other testing as required by the individual show.
- **11.** Authorized representatives of the Association have the authority to enforce the rules set forth herein as well as in the Association Rules, including barring of a registered animal from a livestock show at which it is to be shown, if there are reasonable grounds to believe a violation has occurred.

- 2. All animal tattoos will be checked for legibility and must match the registration papers for that animal. Animals with illegible tattoos or incorrect papers will not be allowed to show.
- 3. Animals entered in group classes must have been shown in an individual class.
- 4. Heifers exhibited at 24 months of age or older must be accompanied by a certificate of pregnancy or be nursing their natural calf at side (6 months of under).
- 5. No animal may be shown that has had any foreign objects glued to or otherwise attached in a manner so as to alter its conformation or change its appearance. Animals unethically fitted to alter the conformation or appearance of the animals will be disgualified.
- 6. All bulls 12 months and older must be led with a nose lead at all times.
- 7. All animals must be shown with their hair coats laying flat against their entire body. Hair trimming is permissible. Those few areas such as the legs, tail head and portions of the top line of the animal which may not naturally lay flat against the body must be trimmed to be flush with adjacent portions of the hair coat. Hair may not be trained or pulled upwards and forwards. No animals may have any foreign objects attached to it in any manner or have its natural color altered in a manner so as to change the conformation or appearance. An exhibitor who fails to abide by this rule will be dismissed from the arena and/or forfeit premiums, awards and points from the show.

ABBA SPECIAL RULES

- 1. Animals must be registered in the American Brahman Breeders Association to be eligible to compete in association sponsored shows. The registration certificate (or photocopy) for each entry must be available for presentation to the superintendent or manager of the show at the time entries are verified prior to judging.
- 2. The registration number and animal identification number (number branded on animal) of (1) each animal must be entered in an individual class, (2) the sire of each get-of-sire entry and (3) the dam of each produce-of-dam entry must be listed on the entry card of each animal entered.
- **3.** Entries that have not complied with rules one (1) and two (2) will not be eligible to show, receive premium monies or earn points in the association's Register of Renown.
- 4. Animals to be eligible to be shown in group classes must be entered and shown in individual classes.
- 5. Entries will be listed numerically according to age (oldest first) in catalogs and judging schedules. <u>Include</u> <u>animal identification number (number brand) as a part of identification.</u> When entering the arena for judging, the handlers will line cattle up numerically in the same order.
- 6. Judges will be allowed to comment on placings in selected classes when conditions permit.
- 7. Each animal will be presented in the show ring in its natural conformation and structure without alteration or modification. Alteration or modification shall be defined to include any surgical or circulatory constriction including banding or other appearance change, save only branding, tattooing, foot trimming or dehorning. Injections of foreign substances for cosmetic purposes shall be prohibited. If to the satisfaction of the ABBA's staff, Officers, Executive Committee or Board of Directors; any animal has had its natural conformation and structure altered or been administered steroids, growth hormones or stimulants; then said animal shall be ruled ineligible to compete until such time the show committee and owner/owners have reviewed the case. Any violators, both owner and fitter will be ineligible to exhibit cattle at ABBA approved shows for 5 years.
- 8. In cases where families, companies, corporations, etc., are operated as a unit under the same management but have cattle also registered in the name of individual partners, said cattle, even though bearing a different ownership brand, are eligible to be shown in competition under the firm name provided they have not been and will not be shown in the name of the individuals.
- 9. For females being shown in the three oldest classes **CURRENT YEAR LESS 3 YEARS** (females calved Sept. 1 August 31, 2010 for Fall Shows), exhibitor must have a certificate of pregnancy issued by a licensed veterinarian and will be presented to show officials at time of check-in or registration paper check. The show reserves the right to perform pregnancy determination by palpation for females in the above classes at any given ABBA approved show if an official protest has been filed. For Fall Shows only the last class of females is required to have a calf at side. The only exemption from this rule will be cows that have already weaned a calf and a registration certificate of the calf <u>MUST</u> be presented to the judge.
- **10.** All bulls will be shown with a nose ring or nose restraint with lead attached. For bulls showing in the oldest class, the exhibitor must have a certificate issued by a licensed veterinarian stating the bull has produced viable semen. This certificate must be available for inspection by the judge on request.
- **11.** This deals with the produce of dam classes and the get-of-sire class:

Embryo Produce of Dam - Two animals from the above classes produced by one dam by embryo transfer either or both sexes may be represented. No ownership requirement.

Natural Produce of Dam - Two natural born animals produced by one dam from the above classes, either or both sexes may be represented. No ownership requirement.

Get-of-Sire - Four animals from at least two dams by one sire from the above individual classes, both sexes represented. No ownership requirement.

- **12.** No exhibitor shall be permitted to show more than one produce or embryo produce of dam, per dam.
- **13.** Cows that are exhibited with calves at side must be in a lactating stage. Calves must be shown and exhibited with their dams and said calves must not exceed 240 days of age on day of judging. The judge will be made aware the ring steward for those cows whose calves are ineligible to show by this rule.
- **14.** Cattle will not be allowed to show if their switches have been balled or glitter applied to their skin.
- **15.** In the get-of-sire and produce-of-dam classes, breeders will not be allowed to show cattle of mixed color. They will be entered as to the color division they are assigned by the Color Committee for the show. If so, the following procedure will apply. All grey cattle and solid black cattle will show grey. Red, black and white speckled or red and white speckled cattle will show red. Cattle with questionable colored pigmentation may be entered in the color division the breeder selects, however, said cattle are subject to inspection by a three member ABBA committee. If the Color Committee disagrees with the breeder, the pedigree of said animal will then be used to aid in the final determination, but color pigmentation will take preference. In those cases, where questionable colored cattle possess both red and grey breeding, then the committee will make the final determination. The decision of the committee is final.

Once animals have been classified they will remain in that classification unless they were young at time of classification and it is apparent that they have changed their color.

In the get-of-sire and produce-of-dam classes, breeders will be allowed to show cattle of varying color. They will be entered as to the color division of the sire in case of get-of-sire and dam in case of produce-of-dam. In other words, if a get is mixed red and grey and the sire was red; then the get will be entered in the red division show.

At split shows where the color committee is not present, a staff member with (2) ABBA directors will clarify questionable colored cattle for that particular show. The final classification will be done by the Color Committee. {Revised 08/99}

- **16.** The owner of record of any registered animal entered in an ABBA approved shows and/or his/her agent, exhibitor, fitter, handler and/or representative releases ABBA and its representatives from any and all liability that seller/owner might claim as a result of injury of any kind sustained before, during, or after handling cattle for any ABBA board approved activity.
- **17.** For shows to remain approved, point shows by ABBA, they must maintain a 20 head average for the previous two years.
- **18.** The official ABBA rules and procedures governing showing and exhibiting of registered Brahman cattle supersede any rules printed in any show catalog.
- **19.** In an attempt to insure that all animals receive an equal evaluation at the National and International Shows, classes with more than 30 entries may at the discretion of the Show Management and/or ABBA Officials be split by age as evenly as possible.
- **20.** Any animal that exceeds the weight & measurement requirements at the International Brahman Show, National Brahman Show or any other designated show where weights & measurements are taken will be ineligible to show at any future ABBA approved shows until they reach the Junior Division. Any animal that exceeds the parameters and is shown at an ABBA approved show before reaching the Junior Division will be ineligible to show their remaining career. Bothe the exhibitor and owner of the previously disqualified animal that is shown before reaching the Junior Division will be ineligible to show their animals for 13 months following the infraction.

- 4. An animal that is scurred (scurs are small, rudimentary horns that are loosely attached to the head, which are considered to be expressed only in animals that are genetically heterozygous for the polled gene) will show in the polled division of Hereford Shows. Once an animal is confirmed to be scurred by an AHA field representative, then this designation will be placed on the animal's registration papers. Once this determination has been made and reported to the AHA office, then the owner(s) may remove the scurs. Animals with scrus removed will show in the polled division of the Hereford Shows. Once an animal is confirmed polled or scurred they will retain this designation forever.
- 5. Premier Breeder and Premier Exhibitor are awarded with the following point system: 1ST place = 5 points, 2ND place = 4 points, 3RD place = 3 points, 4TH place = 2 points and 5TH = 1 point. A late fee equal to two times the regular group class entry fee is required for group class entries made after the entry deadline. <u>*GROUP CLASS ENTRIES WILL*</u> <u>*NOT BE ACCEPTED AFTER THE REGISTRATION CHECK DEADLINE*</u>. All animals entered in a group class must be shown in their respective individual class. The dam, sire or breeder represented <u>MUST</u> be named on the entry application. Do <u>NOT</u> name the individual animals entered in the group. **EXHIBITORS MUST BE A MEMBER OF TPHA.**

POLLED HEREFORD REQUIREMENTS

- 1. All Polled Hereford entries must be duly recorded with the American Hereford Association. Any animal with a pending registration or without a legible tattoo will not be eligible for show competition. All entries are subject to provisions and rules for showing as set forth by the American Hereford Association Board of Directors, and are subject to supervision of the Show and Sale Committee representing the AHA.
- 2. Expected Progeny Difference (EPD) values will be provided to the judge and audience for all animals shown. Animals without EPD data are eligible to show, but will have N/A (not available) in place of missing EPD data.
- 3. The original registration certificate (or photocopy) for each entry must be available for presentation to the Superintendent of the Show at any time during the show.
- 4. An animal that is scurred (scurs are small, rudimentary horns that are loosely attached to the head, which are considered to be expressed only in animals that are genetically heterozygous for the polled gene) will show in the polled division of Hereford Shows. Once an animal is confirmed to be scurred by an AHA field representative, then this designation will be placed on the animal's registration papers. Once this determination has been made and reported to the AHA office, then the owner(s) may remove the scurs. Animals with scrus removed will show in the polled division of the Hereford Shows. Once an animal is confirmed polled or scurred they will retain this designation forever.
- 5. Premier Breeder and Premier Exhibitor are awarded with the following point system: 1ST place = 5 points, 2ND place = 4 points, 3RD place = 3 points, 4TH place = 2 points, and 5TH = 1 point. No points will be given for champions. Points will be awarded for the Get of Sire and Best Six Head for Premier Exhibitor and Get of Sire for Premier Breeder. The same scoring system as above will be used for awarding points for the group classes.

Registered Red Angus cattle, including Category 1-A (100%) and Category 1-B (87% through 99%) will be eligible to show.
- 2. Cattle entered in the State Fair of Texas must be duly entered in their appropriate Herdbook. Exhibitors are subject to all rules, regulations and policies of the Red Angus Association of America.
- 3. Entries in any Red Angus show are accepted with the understanding that each exhibitor agrees to conform to the rules and regulations of the Red Angus Association with reference to inspection of entries, such as blood typing, mouthing and such other inspections prescribed by the Red Angus Association of America.
- 4. Any animal entered in a Red Angus show found to have an illegible tattoo, improper or incorrect tattoo or no tattoo, or dental development in excess of allowable limits, will be disqualified for that and subsequent Red Angus Shows.
- 5. Each entry in a Red Angus show must be made in the name of the owner of record, or a member of the immediate family of the owner of record, appearing on the registration certificate.
- 6. Partnership animals must be so registered and entered under the partnership designation.
- 7. Exhibitors must have the original registration certificate or the officially produced copies (obtainable from RAAA at no charge) on all entries available for inspection by association or show officials.
- 8. Animals entered for which registration certificates have been applied for, must have a letter of confirmation from the Red Angus Association national office that such papers are in process.
- 9. Entry or entries in any Red Angus show must have been registered in the name of the person entering said animal(s) on the date of the advertised deadline for entries.

GROUP ENTRIES: Group classes are denoted by a "G" after the class number. A \$10 additional entry fee is required for each group class entered by entry deadline. A late fee equal to two times the regular group class entry fee is required for group class entries made after the entry deadline. <u>GROUP CLASS ENTRIES WILL</u> <u>NOT BE ACCEPTED AFTER THE REGISTRATION CHECK DEADLINE</u>. All animals entered in a group class must be shown in their respective individual class. The dam, sire or breeder represented <u>MUST</u> be named on the entry application. Do <u>NOT</u> name the individual animals entered in the group.

SGBI SPECIAL RULES

- 1. All exhibits of Santa Gertrudis breeding cattle must be registered meeting the requirements for registration as outlined in the Santa Gertrudis Rules and Regulations for Registration, and shall be governed by the last revised version of the Rules and Regulations for Approved Santa Gertrudis Open & Junior Shows as approved by the board of Santa Gertrudis Breeders International, PO Box 1257, Kingsville, Texas 78364. A copy may be obtained by contacting the association or viewed at www.santagertrudis.com.
- 2. Each owner must be a bona fide member of SGBI. This means the active or junior member has paid all current dues and fees with no outstanding balances on their account.
- **3.** ALL animals accepted for exhibition in an SGBI sanctioned show are subject to inspection at each show between arrival on grounds and prior to entering the show ring. The inspection will be conducted by a committee comprised of two (2) members of the Shows and Exhibits Committee and one (1) from the Breed Standards Committee.
- **4.** Heifers 24 months of age or older must have produced a calf or be safe in calf as verified by a graduate veterinarian. If animal is open due to being in an embryo transfer program, this fact must be verified by a written statement signed by a licensed embryo technician.
- 5. A cow shown with calf at side:

a. Calf must be her natural calf meeting the Standard of Excellence.

b. Calf must be registered if older than thirty (30) days. If calf is less than 30 days of age it is subject to registration.

- 6. All senior bull classes (late junior yearling bull and over) must have either a nose ring or a nose clip for show purposes.
- 7. All animals must be individually identified by tattoo and/or numerical fire or freeze brand.
- 8. To be eligible to compete in SGBI approved junior shows, animal(s) must be recorded in the name of the junior member. This recorded junior must feed, fit, care for, and show the animal entered. Ownership deadline is April 1 for all animals born May 1 and thereafter and November 1 for all other animals.
- **9.** All animals must be exhibited with the hair brushed down on the entire body, legs, and tail with no foreign objects attached to the animal in a manner as to alter the animal's conformation or change its appearance.

*Exhibitors failing to abide by this rule will not be allowed to show. Specifically, all hair must be brushed down slick; head clipped smooth; underline clipped blending sides; udder and teats clipped with no long hair to emphasize udder; ears clipped as to environmental and local standards; neck and brisket clipped; body clip using common sense as to season; leg hair clipped (no steer or Brahman clips) and do not leave long from hock or knee to hoof; tailhead clipped; pull switch or brush out (no ball, etc.); trim tail (no shear except back side). Fitting handbook should be studied.

- **10.** Each animal exhibited must be exhibited with the correct age and shown in the class corresponding with their correct age. SGBI reserves the right to tooth animals without prior notice to the breeders in order to verify age of cattle.
- **11.** Entries in each class will be placed 1, 2, 3, etc. Animals are to be presented in descending order according to age.
- **12.** Polled classes will be entered at the same time as class entries are required by each show. Animals will be lined up according to age for the judge.
- **13.** To be eligible to show in Best of Polled, animals must be slick polled with no scurs, no scars, no dehorning and with no evidence of horny tissue.
- **14.** There must be at least five (5) exhibitors and twenty-five (25) head of cattle, or a minimum of fifty (50) head of cattle, to constitute a recognized Santa Gertrudis Show.
- **15.** In all shows in which fifty (50) head or less are entered, all early and late classes may be combined at the discretion of the show officials.
- **16.** Classes with over thirty (30) entries should be divided into sections and section winners return for final placing.
- **17.** The judge must be an SGBI approved judge.
- **18.** Dress for exhibitors participating in SGBI sanctioned Open and Junior shows shall be of neat and clean clothing of collared shirts with sleeves, belts, no midriffs showing and appropriate footwear no tennis shoes. Exhibitors may wear hats or go bareheaded no caps.
- **19.** Juniors showing in open shows are allowed and encouraged. Entry must be shown by the owner or immediate family member (sister, brother, mother, father, grandparents, legal guardian). No animal may be fitted or shown by any open exhibitor at any time during the junior's ownership period. An exception is transportation feed and care to a show may be allowed. Refer to junior ownership rules.
- **20.** Each animal shall be presented in the show ring in its natural conformation and structure without alteration or modification. Alteration or modification shall be defined to include any surgical, chemical, electrical, pharmaceutical or other appearance change, save only branding, tattooing, foot trimming or dehorning. Additionally, no pumping or filling of an animal with a liquid diuretic or any other substance is allowed. ALL animals and exhibitors found to be in violation of this rule will be banned for life from showing at SGBI approved shows.
- **21.** If entries are not properly fitted and good herdsmanship followed, the owner may be asked to not display their cattle until adhering to the proper procedures as outlined in our herdsmanship paper.
- 22. Every exhibitor, in consideration of his/her entry being accepted, agrees to submit any animal so entered by him/her to inspection and agrees to have such animal submitted to any tests as may be designated and requested by the Shows and Exhibits Committee, or the authorized representatives of the relevant show or fair, and agrees that the conclusions reached by the committee/representative as to whether such animal is unethically fitted or over age, shall be final, without recourse, against SGBI and designated personnel. Any false representation, interference or unprofessional conduct on the part of any exhibitor will be dealt with by the Shows and Exhibits Committee according to the equities of the case.
- **23.** Any person who furnished the birthday of an animal to SGBI either on the IPRA or some other document (whereby that birthday information is transferred to the registration certificate) and that animal is exhibited in an AGBI approved show with an incorrect age and the age determined by the SGBI designated veterinarian exceeds the age listed on the registration certificate by more than thirty (30) days, the person furnishing the birthday above and such person furnishing said information to SGBI for inclusion on the registration certificate shall be barred from showing in an SGBI approved show for a period of six (6) months for the first offense, one (1) year for the second offense and for life for the third offense. However, the animal, if transferred to another owner, may be placed in the correct class and be shown again.
- 24. For and in consideration of the opportunity to participate in any SGBI approved show, each exhibitor hereby releases SGBI, its officers, directors and representatives from negligence, any and all claims, suits and judgments, either past, present or future, arising from or connected with the administration or use of such test or examination and the resulting decision therefrom.

- **25.** Any exhibitor desiring to dispute or challenge the results of any text, exam, or show rule enforcement, as applied to his/her animals, shall do so in accordance with the procedures established by the rules of the association.
- 26. APPEALS:

a. The Chairman of the Shows and Exhibits Committee and the Vice President of Youth Activites in conjunction with the person(s) responsible for coordinating the individual shows will continue to be primarily vested with authority to determine whether animals entered shows meet the standards formally approved by the Breed Standards Committee.

b. In the event the Vice President of Youth Activities or individual show coordinating official disqualifies an animal from participating in a youth show and the exhibitor wants to appeal the disqualification, the appeal process outlined below must be followed.

c. In the event the Chairman of Shows and Exhibits or individual show coordinating official disqualifies an animal from participating in a sanctioned show, and the exhibitor wants to appeal the disqualification, the appeal process outlined below must be followed.

d. Additionally, any exhibitor participating in an individual youth show or other SGBI sanctioned show that wants to appeal a breed standards disqualification decision by either the Vice President for Youth Activities/youth show coordinating official or the Chairman of Shows and Exhibits/show coordinating official must follow the appeals process outlined below.

APPEALS COMMITTEE

The appeals committee will be comprised by the following three (3) members – Vice President of Breed Improvement, the Vice President of Marketing and Promotions and the Executive Director of SGBI. All three (3) members must be present to constitute a quorum. All decisions rendered by the Appeals Committee will be binding and final for all appeals submitted to the committee.

APPEALS PROCEDURE

a. All qualification/disqualification appeals and appropriate supporting documentation submitted by exhibitors must be submitted in writing to the Executive Director of SGBI. The written appeal must be accompanied by a \$200 process fee. No waivers will be granted to the requirements for written appeals and the up front \$200 fee.

b. Exhibitors must file written appeals postmarked or via e-mail within five (5) business days following the date of the show governing the qualification/disqualification decision by the primary officials (Vice President of Youth Activities/show coordinating official or Chairman of Shows and Exhibits/event coordinating official).

c. The Executive Director will be responsible for coordinating meetings of the Appeals Committee and forwarding copies of the appeal and supporting documentation to the other committee members.

d. The Appeals Committee will render a final decision within five (5) business days following receipt of the written appeal, appropriate supporting documentation and the \$200 fee.

e. In the event an exhibitor appeals a disqualification decision by the primary official and the Appeal Committee approves the exhibitor's appeal, the animal covered by the appeal will be qualified to participate in all future SGBI sanctioned events.

f. In the event an exhibitor appeals a disqualification decision by the primary official and the Appeals Committee disapproves the exhibitor's appeal, the animal covered by the appeal will be disqualified from participating in future SGBI sanctioned events. Additionally, any points or awards previously given to the owner of the animal will be forfeited.

g. In the event an exhibitor appeals a qualification decision by the primary official and the Appeals Committee rules that the animal covered by the appeal does not meet breed standards, the covered animal will be disqualified from participating in future shows and the owner of the animal will forfeit any points and awards previously granted.

27. PROCEDURES TO FILE PROTEST:

- a. File protest with show that infraction occurred. Follow their protest rules.
- b. File the same protest with the Shows and Exhibits Committee. Contact the chairman.
- c. Three (3) exhibitors must sign the protest.
- d. All protests must be in writing and accompanied by a deposit of \$100, cash or certified check, which will be forfeited if protest is not sustained. Such protest must state plainly the cause of the complaint or appeal and must be delivered to the Shows and Exhibits Committee within twenty four (24) hours after the occasion for such protest.
- e. Order of hearing a protest:
- 1. Chairman of Shows and Exhibits Committee

- 2. Action by Shows and Exhibits Committee
- 3. Final action by Board of Directors
- 4. Follow appeal procedure as outlined in Rules and Regulations.
- f. All rules and regulations that have been properly protested to the Shows and Exhibits Committee shall be subject to the following penalties:
- 1. Loss of premium money.
- 2. Loss of awards
- 3. Suspension from showing the subject animal as deemed necessary. Penalty may be for one (1) show, two (2) shows or three (3) shows, or as long as deemed necessary for the offense.
- 4. Suspension of the exhibitor being the same as the other SGBI Rules and penalties.

28. Failure to adhere to each show's specific rules shall also be subject to these penalties. Proper protest procedures must be adhered to according to that particular show's rules. SGBI will follow each show's rules, and any action taken by a show will be upheld by SGBI in relation to its bearing on our point show system.

29. DISQUALIFICATIONS: An exhibitor who has been disqualified from competition in any livestock show or has had a premium withheld or withdrawn on the grounds of rule violation(s) will not be allowed to compete in other shows. This shall include, but is not limited to, disqualification for fraud, misrepresentation, unethical fitting or deception. Judging procedures will not be interrupted for protest investigation; and depending on the basis of the protest, a decision may be withheld until a thorough investigation is completed. No complaint or appeal that a judge overlooked an animal will be considered. If any exhibitor, in any way, whether in person or by their representative, interferes with the judge(s), or shows any disrespect to them or to show officials, the existing show officials may excuse him/her from the ring and exclude them from further competition; exhibitor premiums that may have been awarded may also be withheld. If an animal is disqualified after having won awards or premiums, the animals placing below him/her may be moved up (at the option of the Shows and Exhibits Committee) to fill the vacated position.

30. RULES FOR HIGH POINT AWARDS:

1. For each point show, first place class winner will receive 2 points; second place class winner receives 1 point; Division Champion receives 3 points; Reserve Division Champion receives 2 points; Grand Champion receives 5 points; and Reserve Grand Champion receives 4 points; Best of Polled receives 1 point but does not count toward overall points.

- 2. Get of Sire and Produce of Dam points go toward Exhibitor/Breeder of the Year Awards.
- 3. Points will stay with animal if sold.
- 4. The Sire and Dam of the Year should have points from at least two (2) different offspring.
- 5. All points earned at the National Open Show are to be doubled.

31. Conduct in the Show Ring:

If any exhibitor/owner/showman interferes in any way with the judge or shows disrespect to him, or to the show in the ring, the exhibitor/owner/showman may be dismissed by the judge or show management from the ring. The management may withhold from each exhibitor/owner/showman any premium monies that may have been awarded or take other steps deemed desirable.

32. DNA test on questionable animals:

Santa Gertrudis Breeders International and its representatives reserve the right to require any test deemed necessary to verify the accuracy of an entry, classification and/or the pedigree of exhibited Santa Gertrudis animals, including calves exhibited at the side of a Santa Gertrudis female.

- 1. **RULES/REGULATIONS**: Entries made in this department shall be subject to and each exhibitor agrees to abide by the General Rules and Regulations as published in this premium list.
- 2. ENTRY APPLICATION/FEE: An entry application and fee of \$30 per head must be submitted by entry deadline. All fees must accompany online or mailed in applications for entry or mailed in signature forms. This fee is not a stall fee. A show fee in addition to the State Fair of Texas entry fee may be levied by a breed association or group.

Late entries will be accepted until registration check in deadline, for fee per head equal to two times the regular entry fee per head.

The State Fair of Texas reserves the right to use any Dairy Cattle for the Dairy Judging Contest.

- **3.** ENTRY LIMITATION: No exhibitor shall be permitted to show more than two animals or one group of animals in any one class. All animals shown in a group class must be shown in their individual age class.
- 4. GROUP ENTRIES: Group classes are denoted by a "G" after the class number. A \$10 additional entry fee is required for each group class entered by entry deadline. A late fee equal to two times the regular group class entry fee is required for group class entries made after the entry deadline. <u>GROUP CLASS ENTRIES WILL</u> <u>NOT BE ACCEPTED AFTER THE REGISTRATION CHECK DEADLINE</u>. All animals entered in a group class must be shown in their respective individual class. The dam, sire or breeder represented <u>MUST</u> be named on the entry application. Do <u>NOT</u> name the individual animals entered in the group. ONE PREMIUM PAID PER EXHIBITOR.
- **5. YOUTH SHOW**: Youth Show exhibitors are permitted to enter the Open Show when an additional entry application and entry fee are submitted by the entry deadline.
- 6. ADMISSION/PARKING: No complimentary admission passes will be available. All exhibitors are requested to purchase a section admission pass good for the duration of each show entered. Complimentary parking passes will be given to exhibitors entering 6 or more head in any one section. Please see "Admission and Parking" in the General Rules Section of this Premium List.

When a request for Certified Mail is indicated on the entry application and the certified mail fee is included with all other fees, passes will be mailed to the exhibitor. Livestock personnel at the Animal Health Office will issue prepaid passes, not mailed, to the driver of vehicles with livestock upon arrival.

7. OWNERSHIP: Ownership will be defined by the Registration Certificate. Pending transfers will not be accepted. Animals owned in partnership may be exhibited in one owner's name but such ownership must be declared by the exhibitor at the time registration certificates are checked by the superintendent.

Where animals in a herd are registered in the name of members of a family residing on the same farm, and, where the herd is operated as one milking unit, or, if more than one milking unit, is legally incorporated and/or animals are registered with the same prefix, all entries will be considered as a single exhibitor and/or as a single breeder for purposes of substitutions, group class requirements and Premier Exhibitor and Breeder Awards.

Animals registered in the name of different members of a family which meet the above requirements may be exhibited under the farm name EXCEPT animals entered in both the Open and Youth shows must be entered in the Youth's name in both shows.

If it is necessary to change the ownership in the judges book to conform to registration certificate (except for animals owned in partnership), a \$10.00 fee will be charged.

8. **REGISTRATION**: Each animal shown in this division must be registered.

An original certificate of registration must be presented to the superintendent at the registration check and kept available at all times during the show for each animal exhibited. Application for transfer and pending registration will not be accepted.

- **9. HEALTH REQUIREMENT:** All animals entering Fair Park must comply with the requirements as determined by the Texas Animal Health Commission. An original Certificate of Veterinary Inspection must accompany animals, be made available to animal health officials and/or show management upon arrival, and kept available with exhibit at all times during the show.
- **10. STALLS/BEDDING:** Stall space will only be assigned for animals that arrive on the grounds. Animals entered, but not arriving on the grounds will not receive stall space or first bedding.
- **11. FEED/HAY:** Feed grains of all types, along with several kinds of hay, will be available, at reasonable prices, through the official feed concessionaire on the grounds. Exhibitors are not allowed to bring large quantities of

feed, bedding or hay onto the grounds. However, exhibitors who must use their own feed will be allowed to bring the feed on grounds in limited amounts on a daily use basis.

- **12. MILK OUT:** A milk out may be requested by an exhibitor provided such request is made to the Superintendent prior to the judge lining up the class. Judge is not required to honor request.
- **13. PREMIER EXHIBITOR DEFINED:** The award to be made to the exhibitor winning the most points on, not to exceed six, animals owned and exhibited by the exhibitor in the open single classes. Not more than 2 can be bulls in Brown Swiss classes. Point system listed below.
- 14. PREMIER BREEDER DEFINED: This award to be made to the breeder winning the most points, on not to exceed six, animals bred and exhibited by the breeder and/or others in the open single classes. Not more than 2 can be bulls in Brown Swiss classes. Point system listed below.

STATE HERD REQUIREMENTS

A qualifying State Herd entry submitted by the state secretary must include:

- 1. A list of names and addresses of exhibitors.
- 2. The names of people in charge of the herd at the show.
- 3. The name of the person designating the animals that shall constitute the group for the State herd class.
- When the state herd enters the judging ring, this person shall present the superintendent with a written list which shall include the name, registration number, date of birth and owner of each animal as well as the registration certificate of each animal. The list will be retained in the judge's book.
- The State Herd shall consist of six animals, properly entered in the show, representing the best of the breed from their respective state and shall be composed of the following animals:
- a. Two females shown in classes eligible to show for Junior Champion Female
- Two females shown in class eligible to show for Senior Champion Female

Two females any age.

- b. The six animals in the state herd must be owned by not less than three exhibitors, from one state, with no exhibitor furnishing more than three animals and all animals in which a breeder owns a partnership interest will be counted in these three.
- c. All animals from a herd or farm, regardless of ownership, shall be counted in the three head allowed one exhibitor. Any partnership or syndicate animals must be shown in the herd of the state in which they are usually housed.
- d. Cattle owned by state institutions will be allowed to show in the state herd class, but all institutions in a state will be considered one exhibitor and allowed to show not more than three head in a state group.
- e. No entry fee required. Must be entered with the superintendent's at check in.

THE PUREBRED DAIRY CATTLE ASSOCIATION SHOW RING CODE OF ETHICS

(Adopted by PDCA in March 1970; Revised February 1993).

The showing of registered dairy cattle is an important part of the promotion, merchandising and breeding program of many breeders. Additionally, it is an important part of the program of the various dairy breed associations to stimulate and sustain interest in breeding registered dairy cattle. This relates to both spectators and exhibitors. In this connection The Purebred Dairy Cattle Association believes that it is in the best interest of the breeders of registered dairy cattle to maintain a reputation of integrity and to present a wholesome and progressive image of their cattle in the show ring. It recognizes that there are certain practices in the proper care and management of dairy cattle which are necessary in the course of moving dairy cattle to and between shows that are advisable to keep them in a sound, healthy condition so that they might be presented in the show ring in a natural, normal appearance and condition. Conversely, it recognizes certain practices in the cataloging, handling, and presentation of cattle in the show ring which are unacceptable.

The following practices or procedures are considered unacceptable and defined as being fraudulent and/or unethical in the showing of registered dairy cattle:

- (1) Misrepresenting the age and or milking status of the animal for the class in which it is shown.
- (2) Treating the animal, particularly the udder, internally or externally, with an irritant or counter irritant or other substance to artificially improve the conformation.
- (3) Surgery or insertion of foreign material under the skin, performed to exchange the natural contour or appearance of the animal's body, though not to preclude practices required or involved in normal management.
- (4) Criticizing or interfering with the judge, show management or other exhibitors while in the show ring, or other conduct detrimental to the breed or the show.

The following is considered a serious violation and defined as an unethical practice that detracts from the show ring.

(1) Setting teats or manipulating a teat to alter its normal position such as to unnaturally hold it plumb or to alter the length is unacceptable.

The following practices and procedures are considered to detract from the image of the show ring when carried to excess and will be given slight to serious discrimination in placing animals within class.

- (1) Excessive manipulation of hair.
- (2) Use of artificial hair except for false switches.
- (3) Unsportsmanlike conduct on the part of showmen.

(4) Improper fitting practices such as over filling and over bagging.

Practices which should be encouraged to enhance the image of the show:

(1) Establish uniform dress code for exhibitors in the show ring.

(2) Recognize good herdsman ship and exhibits in the barn.

In keeping with the basic philosophy of the PDCA, ethics are an individual responsibility of the owner of each animal shown.

Violations of these policies are subject to disciplinary provisions of the appropriate dairy breed association and/or show management.

LLAMA REQUIREMENTS

1. RULES/REGULATIONS: Entries made in this division shall be subject to and each exhibitor agrees to abide by the General Rules and Regulations and Department Requirements as published in this premium list. This show is an Alpaca and Llama Show Association (ALSA) approved show sponsored by South Central Llama Association (SCLA). All rules and guidelines for this show not covered by the State Fair of Texas Rules and Regulations will be in accordance to the current ALSA Handbook. The State Fair of Texas Llama Show is a qualifier for the annual Central Regional ALSA Championship show.

2. ENTRY APPLICATION/FEE: An entry application and fee of \$20 per class plus an ALSA show fee of \$5 per head, and all stall fees must be submitted by entry deadline. All fees must accompany online applications for entry or mailed in signature forms. This fee is not a stall fee. Late entries will be accepted until September 15,2014 for a late entry fee per head equal to two times the regular entry fee per head. An ALSA membership card must be presented at registration check or a \$60 fee for adults/\$15 fee for youth must be paid to receive exhibitor's entry packet. A copy of all entry forms and registrations must be sent to: Terri Bruening 6836 Woodale Dr. Watauga, TX 76148.

3. GROUP ENTRIES: Group classes are denoted by a "G" after the class number. A \$5 additional entry fee is required for each group class entered by entry deadline. A late fee equal to two times the regular group class entry fee is required for group class entries made after the entry deadline. *GROUP CLASS ENTRIES WILL NOT*

<u>BE ACCEPTED AFTER THE REGISTRATION CHECK DEADLINE</u>.</u> All animals entered in a group class must be shown in their respective individual class. The dam, sire or breeder represented <u>MUST</u> be named on the entry application. Do <u>NOT</u> name the individual animals entered in the group.

4. OWNERSHIP: Exhibitors must be the registered owners and make entry in the exact names (owner and animal) as they appear on the registration certificate. An exhibitor may or may not be the handler. Youth division entries must be made in the name of the youth.

5. REGISTRATION: An original certificate of registration must be presented to the superintendent prior to the registration check deadline and kept available at all times during the show for each animal exhibited. All llamas, with the exception of in youth, performance and non-breeder classes, must be registered or have passed screening with the International Llama Registry (ILR) or the Canadian Livestock Record Corporation (CLRC). All llamas have to be registered with the ILR. Non-breeding llamas and llamas used in youth or performance classes do not have to be registered or have passed screening with the ILR or CLRC.

6. STALLS/BEDDING: Stall fee of \$50 per stall, limit two head per stall not including cria 5 mos. or younger, must be submitted with entry application by entry deadline. No bedding provided. Special and specific stall requests must be submitted on the Stall Request Form included in this premium list by September 15, 2014. There is no guarantee that any stall request can or will be honored.

7. WOOL DIVISIONS: Llamas will be divided into three divisions based on length of wool.

Light Wool: Minimal body wool, short neck wool with smooth legs.

Heavy Wool: Abundant body and neck wool with minimal to abundant leg wool. (i.e., leg wool at least to knee and hock.)

Light and medium wools may be combined to have at least eight entries in the division. This will allow these entries to be eligible to show and receive points for Grand and Reserve Grand Champion

8. NON-BREEDER: All ages and wool classifications of gelded males or surgically spaved females to be judged on soundness, conformation, a disposition.

Non-breeding llamas must be accompanied by a registration or veterinarian certificate verifying gelded or spayed status.

If three or less entries per class, classes may be combined.

- 9. ADVANCE/MASTER PERFORMANCE: Open to all entries who meet the specific criteria for the respective ALSA approved class. A llama may be entered only once in either advance/master or youth classes.
- 10. NOVICE PERFORMANCE: Open to all entries who meet the specific criteria for the respective ALSA approved class. A llama may be entered in only either novice or youth classes.
- 11. YOUTH: All youth ages 8 through 18 years of age as of January 1 of the current year. A youth who becomes 8 during the year is eligible to show as of his/her birthday. For youth performance and showmanship classes, ALSA points will be credited to the handler. Youth ALSA number must be included on entry application.

The age divisions at any show may be combined if there are fewer than 8 total entries in any two of the age categories. Please be prepared to provide proof of age with a birth certificate.

- 12. SPECIAL NEEDS (as described in ALSA Rulebook) will be combined with youth junior performance classes, but will be judged separately.
- 13. PREMIER EXHIBITOR: Premier Exhibitor will be calculated from the exhibitor's placement, in individual classes only, as follows: 4 points for each 1st, 3 points for each 2nd, 2 points for each 3rd, and 1 point for each 4th. In case of a tie, 5th place will count. No entry fee, premium, or ALSA points. Llamas may not be entered more than once in the same class.

- **5. OWNERSHIP:** All entries must be owned and continuously cared for by the exhibitor from August 1 through the show date of the Fair. The date of purchase shall be construed to be the date transfer is recorded with the record association.
- 6. **REGISTRATION:** Animals owned in joint names are eligible to compete in the Breeding Swine Show provided each owner is eligible to show in the Show. BOER GOAT REQUIREMENTS

- 1. **RULES/REGULATIONS**: Entries made in this division shall be subject to and each exhibitor agrees to abide by the General Rules and Regulations and Pan-Am Department Requirements as published in this premium list.
- 2. ELIGIBILITY: All goats must be registered in the herdbook of a recognized association 30 days prior to arriving at the show. Recognized associations include ABGA, International Boer Goat Association, USBGA and the Canadian Boer Goat Association. Original registration certificates are required, though a copy of a Registration Application, stamped with the date received by one of the listed associations, can be accepted for kids less than 3 months of age. Animals must be registered in the name of the exhibitor and must have been owned by the exhibitor on or before September 1, 2014. Throughout the ABGA and JABGA Show rules the term exhibitor is defined as the owner of the animal listed in the ABGA registry shown on entry deadline. All goats must be appropriately identified and comply with USDA Scrapie Eradication Program Guidelines. - 3. **ENTRY LIMITATION**: No exhibitor shall be permitted to show more than two animals or one group of animals in any one class. All animals shown in a group class must be shown in their individual age class.
- 4. **TATTOOS**: All goats must have legible tattoos or other means of permanent identification consistent with its registration certificate or the animal will be disqualified. If the animal has a microchip as its permanent identification, the exhibitor is responsible for providing a microchip reader.
- 5. **DISQUALIFICATION**: Any goat showing any pronounced defect or abnormality will be barred from showing in any of the breeding classes. Artificial coloring will be a disqualification as well as illegible tattoos or tattoos that are inconsistent with the goat's registration papers. STATE FAIR OF TEXAS® YOUTH LIVESTOCK SHOW AND CONTESTS

SPECIAL RULES

The State Fair of Texas® (State Fair) encourages a practical interest among young people in the responsibilities and practices of feeding and raising livestock and competing agricultural contests. The purpose of the Youth Livestock Division of State Fair is to encourage and promote the educational aspects of agriculture/livestock projects conducted only by youth exhibitors under the proper supervision and direction of an Agriculture Science Teacher (AST) or a County Extension Agent (CEA). State Fair recognizes that the Texas AgriLife Extension, through 4-H Clubs, and the Texas Education Agency, through FFA Chapters, provides a valuable service to the public in educating Texas students in the principles of successful production livestock and agricultural knowledge. In order to encourage participation in the 4-H Clubs and FFA Chapters throughout the state, State Fair includes as a part of its annual fair and exposition, the youth livestock division which is a special exhibition for Texas 4-H club and FFA chapter members.

1. RULES/REGULATIONS: Entries made in the Youth Livestock Show and Contests shall be subject to and each contestant agrees to abide by the General Rules, Youth Livestock Show and Contest Special Rules, and any applicable special requirements as published in this premium list (collectively, the "Rules"). In the event of any conflict between the Youth Livestock Show Special Rules and the General Rules, the provisions of these Special Rules shall apply. Additionally, any conflict between any applicable additional special requirements and the Youth Livestock rules, the additional special rules shall apply.

2. PARTICIPATION:

a. ELIGIBLE EXHIBITORS: Participation in the Youth Livestock Show is limited to Texas residents only, who are members of a Texas 4-H Club or Texas FFA Chapter (except where stated otherwise) who have continuously owned and personally fed and cared for their animal under the direct supervision of a CEA or AST. Exhibitors must be enrolled in, and attending, public, private or home school elementary or secondary schools in Texas and they must be at least 8 years old and in the third grade, but not more than 18 years old on August 31. Exhibitors must be bona fide residents of the State of Texas. ALL EXHIBITORS MUST BE QUALITY COUNTS CERTIFIED.

b. **INELIGIBLE EXHIBITORS**:

- 1. If an exhibitor is suspended under the Texas Education Code 33.081 "No Pass, No Play", then that exhibitor/competitor and their animal are not eligible for competition.
- 2. Exhibitors who have been disqualified from competition at State Fair or any other livestock show or have had a premium withheld or withdrawn are not eligible for competition. This shall include, but is not limited to, disqualification for fraud, misrepresentation, unethical fitting, tampering or deception.
- a. Entry Application: All applications for entry must be made through the online entry procedures located at <u>www.bigtex.com</u> by 12:00 A.M. midnight, August 25th. Payment along with entry authorization signatures must be submitted by AST/CEA on a school/county check, cashier's check, or money order and postmarked on or before September 1 to the State Fair of Texas, Livestock Office, PO Box 150009, Dallas, TX 75315.
- b. **ENTRY CERTIFICATION**: The Certification, Release, and Indemnity portion of each entry application must be signed by the youth exhibitor, a parent or guardian, <u>AND</u> the CEA or AST. By signing the certification portion of the entry application, each party acknowledges that they have read, understood and will abide by all the Rules. Additionally, by signing the entry application, the youth exhibitor and the parent or guardian certify that the entry has not been administered any substance not approved by the U.S. Food and Drug Administration (FDA) and/or the U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) for food animals. Furthermore, the exhibitor and parent/guardian certifies that the entry is free and clear of ALL drug and chemical residue, regardless of whether such drug is FDA or USDA approved or whether the withdrawal or elimination periods have been met.
- c. **HEALTH REQUIREMENTS:** Health papers are not required on Youth Market Barrows or Broilers. Health papers are required on animals entered in the Youth Breeding Shows and the Youth Market and Prospect Steers, Youth Market Lambs and Goats. See Animal Health Section of this premium list.
- d. ENTRIES: Entries may not be made in joint or multiple names.

- e. **CLUB/CHAPTER ENTRIES**: Entries made by 4-H Clubs and FFA Chapters will only be accepted in Youth Dairy Herd classes and Contests.
- f. **ENTRY LIMITATIONS**: No exhibitor will be allowed to show more than two market beef steers, three pens of three broilers each, one market goat, one market lamb, and one market barrow.
- g. **INCOMPLETE ENTRIES**: Incomplete entries include entries made online by midnight, August 25 that are missing signatures, W-9's or other required information. Those incomplete entries will be accepted conditionally and will not be assessed the late fee(s) provided, however, that all information is received by State Fair's Livestock Office prior to show time. Otherwise, prizes and premium money may be withheld, or the entry may be disqualified.
- h. LATE ENTRIES: Late entries are defined as entries not received online by 12:00 A.M. midnight, August 25. Entries made after midnight, August 25 must be mailed to State Fair's Livestock Office. See General Rules for fee amounts.

4. OWNERSHIP:

- a. All animals must be exhibited, shown, and sold by their owner. (Exception: see Rule 5)
- b. The exhibitor must own their animal at the beginning of and throughout the feeding period and must feed, care for and exhibit their animal entered without any aid or assistance during the entire feeding period except from parents, CEA, AST or other youth exhibitors and leaders from their county/chapter. All youth animal exhibits must be owned and continuously cared for by the exhibitor from June 30 through the show date of the Fair. Exception: market broilers must be owned and continuously cared for from hatch date to the show date of the Fair.
- c. **JOINTLY OWNED ANIMALS**: Animals owned in joint names are only eligible to compete in the Youth Breeding Shows provided each owner is eligible to show in the Youth Livestock Show. Each owner's name must be listed on the registration certificate. Animals with farm or ranch names listed as the owner will not be allowed to compete.
- a. SUBSTITUTE EXHIBITORS: A substitute exhibitor may be used, at the sole and reasonable discretion of the department superintendent, by submitting a substitute exhibitor form and meeting one of the following conditions: a) when an exhibitor has more than one entry in the Youth Livestock Show showing at the same time; or b) when an exhibitor is sick or injured (must be accompanied by a signed statement from a certified medical doctor). When one of the before conditions exists, the department superintendent may use his own discretion as to whether a substitute showman will be allowed. If a positive decision is rendered by the department superintendent, the substitute showman must be from the same county/chapter as the original exhibitor. The substitute must also meet all requirements of a youth livestock show exhibitor. If only one exhibitor is present from a county/chapter, the department superintendent can approve a substitute from another county. An exhibitor may be used as a substitute only one time per market department. The department superintendent will require positive identification of the substitute and will require documentation in any of the above conditions. Substitute exhibitors must be verified by BOTH department superintendents and forms must be turned in at Reg. Check/Weight Card turn in.
- 5. STALLING UPON ARRIVAL: Youth Market Barrows are stalled upon arrival. To pen together, groups MUST arrive together at the staging area. No pen assignments will be made for animals in trailers coming later. Animals will be counted on trailers. Livestock officials reserve the right to deny stall requests.
- 6. ZERO TOLERANCE: In order to foster fair competition, provide a level playing field and protect the safety of the food chain, the showing of unethically fitted livestock, livestock of any ineligible age for exhibition in the class entered, and/or animals being administered unapproved drugs is strictly prohibited. Additionally, any animal that has been administered a drug, even though that drug is FDA approved for its species, is subject to disqualification if that animal tests positive for that drug once it has arrived at State Fair and/or participated in State Fair shows. All animals must remain free and clear of all drug and chemical residues while on State Fair grounds.
 - a. ANIMAL INSPECTION: As condition for participation in the State Fair shows, exhibitor agrees to submit any animal entered by the exhibitor for inspection by any veterinarian or show official appointed by State Fair Management. Exhibitor also agrees to have such animal submitted to any tests requested by State Fair. Exhibitor also agrees that the opinion reached by State Fair or its officials as to whether such animal is unethically fitted or improperly aged shall be final and binding without recourse against State Fair, its officials or any of its appointed veterinarians. Further, State Fair specifically reserves the right to have ultrasound, D.N.A., tissue, blood or urine laboratory analysis made on any animal entered for State Fair competition. The conclusions reached by the veterinarian or laboratory shall be final and binding without recourse against State Fair, its officials or any of its appointed veterinarians. An exhibitor of an animal that is found to be unethically fitted, improperly aged, and/or testing positive for any drug or medication or unapproved chemical may forfeit all titles, awards, auction proceeds, premiums, scholarships, as well as

rights and privileges to exhibit livestock in the future at the Fair. Exhibitor waives any cause of action which he/she might have for any action taken under these Rules, and releases the Fair and any appointed veterinarian from any and all claims or demands whatsoever in connection with the inspection or testing of any such animal or any ruling or action taken by reason of the conclusion of such veterinarian.

- b. **UNETHICAL FITTING**: Unethical fitting means any attempt to alter the natural appearance, conformation, musculature or weight of an animal by any unnatural means. Animals showing any signs of being unethically fitted will be disqualified. Examples of unethical fitting include, but are not limited to the following: Application of any substance to any part of the animal's body, unless specifically allowed in the department rules of that entry; Use of injection; Draining of fluids; Bruising; Feeding of material not conducive to the health of the animal, safety of food or marketability of its carcass; Surgical alterations
- c. **PUMPING**: Artificially filling animals by stomach pumping or airing injections
- d. **IMPROPERLY AGED ANIMALS**: Animals will be disqualified if their age is misrepresented or improperly recorded.
- e. **UNAPPROVED DRUG USE**: The showing of an animal that during its life has been administered any quantity of any unapproved drug, chemical or medication is strictly prohibited. Such drugs include, but are not limited to, any diuretic, unapproved growth stimulant or other unapproved medication. Unapproved means not approved by the FDA and/or the USDA for slaughter animals including animals that may be destined for human consumption.
- f. APPROVED DRUG USE: If an animal has been administered a drug that is FDA approved for its species, sufficient time must have passed so that the animal does not test positive for that drug upon arrival at the Fairgrounds. Animals must remain free and clear of any measurable quantity of all drug and chemical residues while on the Fairgrounds and/or participating in State Fair shows. Please note that elimination time (the time it takes for no drug residue to be found in the system) is generally longer than the labeled withdrawal time for most approved drugs.
- g. UNMANAGEABLE ANIMALS: State Fair may disqualify any animal deemed unmanageable.
- 7. NON-ADHERENCE TO THE RULES: Any person found guilty of misrepresentation or not abiding by the Rules in this premium list will be disqualified and denied the privilege of showing at the Fair.
- 8. EMERGENCY TREATMENT: If an animal requires emergency treatment while on the Fairgrounds, only the Official Show Veterinarian or his appointee will be allowed to administer any drug, chemical or feed additive. Animals which are administered treatments with a withdrawal or extended elimination time period will be disqualified from competition. Furthermore, the Official State Fair Veterinarian, in agreement with State Fair Management, reserves the right to treat any animal if, in the opinion of the Official State Fair Veterinarian, it is in the best interest of the animal's health and well-being to be treated. If the Official State Fair Veterinarian administers treatment to an animal, and therefore uses any medication that does not meet the appropriate withdrawal and/or elimination time, such animal will be determined ineligible for competition. All treatment costs are the responsibility of the exhibitor.
- 9. DISQUALIFICATION/CONDEMNATION OF ANIMAL: State Fair practices a "zero tolerance" policy on all residue violations. State Fair reserves the right to condemn and/or disqualify any animal, either live or slaughtered, found in violation of the Rules, and the exhibitor will forfeit all auction sale and/or premium money if the animal is disqualified. If an animal(s) is disqualified, the class placing will not change. A disqualified exhibitor may forfeit all rights and privileges to exhibit livestock in the future at the Fair, as well as any and all State Fair scholarship opportunities. Disqualifications due to violations of State Fair Rules as stated in this premium list or the Entry Certification, Release and Indemnity agreement and any consequences will be decided by State Fair Management. These decisions may be appealed to State Fair's Executive Committee from whose decision there can be no further appeal.
- **10. USDA WHOLESOME MEAT ACT**: The United States Department of Agriculture Wholesome Meat Act applies to the sale of market livestock and poultry which are sold during the State Fair of Texas, which includes but is not limited to the following:
 - a. Animals must be in good health and carcasses free of drug, chemical or foreign substance residues;
 - b. Drug label directions for use and withdrawal periods must be followed; and
 - c. If drug or chemical residues are found in tissue of carcasses, the entire carcass may be condemned.

YOUTH LIVESTOCK SHOW BEEF HEIFERS

DEPARTMENT RULES

- 1. **RULES/REGULATIONS**: Entries made in this department shall be subject to and each exhibitor agrees to abide by the General Rules and Regulations and Youth Livestock Show Special Rules.
- 2. ENTRY LIMITATION: There is no entry limitation for beef heifers. All animals shown in a group class must be shown in their individual age class.
- **3. OPEN SHOW**: Youth Show exhibitors are permitted to enter the Open Show when an additional entry application and entry fee is submitted by the entry deadline.
- 4. TIE OUTS: A limited number of tie out spaces will be sold on a first come first serve basis. Tie outs may be purchased at time of entry or from the Livestock Office. Tie outs will be assigned upon arrival when the exhibitor provides proof of purchase to the superintendent. Cattle will not be removed to tie outs until 7:00 PM daily.
- 5. FANS: No fans permitted in any pedestrian aisle. No rear fans permitted. No exceptions.
- 6. **GENERATORS**: No generators permitted.
- 7. GROOMING CHUTES: Chutes may be brought on the grounds during the beef heifer shows provided a permit is purchased. Fee is to be paid at the time entries are made. Space for chutes will be in stalls or outside cattle buildings. No chutes permitted in any pedestrian aisle.
- 8. **GROOMING**: This is a blow and go show. Clipping, electric or manual will be permitted on the grounds. Animals are to be shown in natural conformation and color. Grooming materials leaving any color residue are not permitted.
- 9. REGISTRATION: Each animal shown in this division must be registered. An <u>original</u> certificate of registration must be presented to the superintendent at the registration check and kept available at all times during the show for each animal exhibited. Application for transfer and pending registration will not be accepted. Registration will be checked in the same order as breeds are judged.
- **10. SPONSORED ENTRIES (scramble heifers)**: Youth exhibiting animals sponsored by other shows or organizations which are retaining the registration papers must obtain a photocopy of the registration papers, or the papers themselves. In case of photocopies, both sides of the papers must be copied and presented to the Superintendent. Name of show or organization must be officially shown on the papers by letterhead or official seal/logo.

If the rules of the sponsoring organization prevent the transfer of registration papers to the exhibitor until certain obligations are met, a notarized certification must (1) state this fact and (2) give date the animal was awarded to the exhibitor. The date of awarding must be not later than the ownership deadline.

11. OWNERSHIP: Animals must be owned by and registered in the name of the exhibitor not later than June 30 of the current year. Entries owned in joint names are eligible to show provided each partner is eligible to show. **Farm names and parent/child partnerships are not acceptable**. Entries must have been fed, fitted, and cared for continuously by the exhibitor from June 30 until shown at the Fair. Ownership date on registration paper will be interpreted as follows:

If "date of sale" appears on certificate, it will be accepted as the date of ownership, with the exception of the Angus breed provided the date of transfer/issue is no later than July 20.

If the official date on the certificate is later than June 30, entry will be eligible to show, provided exhibitor has in hand a letter from the association involved, stating that registration application was received in the association office before June 30.

Bred-and-Owned Heifers are a partial exception to the Ownership rule. Bred-and-owned heifers must be recorded with the respective breed association and exhibitor have in hand (at check-in time) a valid, original certificate of registration dated on or before August 25 with the exhibitor listed as the only breeder and owner.

Exhibitors with incorrect registration papers, incorrect tattoos or other identification type problems will be ineligible and their animal(s) disqualified. All registration and ownership information must be in order upon arrival at the fair.

12. RELEASE: Releases will be written upon arrival.

SPECIAL RULES

- American Angus Association, 3201 Frederick Blvd., St. Joseph, MO 64506, (816)233-3101, will participate in premiums offered in individual classes for junior Angus heifers, as included in its standard show classifications, according to the premium schedule based on the number of head shown. The premium assistance provided by the American Angus Association for participation in this show is in addition to the premiums offered by the show itself. The Association contributions will be included in the premium checks issued by the show.
- 1. **GROOMING**: This is a blow and go show. Clipping, electric or manual, will be permitted on the grounds.
- 2. Animals are to be shown in natural conformation and color. Grooming materials leaving any color residue are not permitted.
- 3. A minimum of fifteen (15) head must be shown in the junior Angus heifer classes to receive American Angus Association premium participation. The show is not required to have all classes to be eligible for premiums.
- 4. Separate classes for bred and owned heifers may be held if the size of the show merits a separate class.
- 5. Any female shown with a calf at side: the calf must be the cow's most recent natural calf, and the calf must be registered by show day and have the original registration certificate at check in.
- 6. To be eligible for Association premiums heifer entries must be recorded in the sole name of the Junior exhibitor and the issue date on the registration certificate must conform to the individual show's requirements regarding ownership. The Association's contribution is included in the total premiums listed in each class.
- 7. Premiums from the Association are paid only to registered Angus cattle and only if the registration number is a part of the show report provided to the Association. Therefore, all cattle should be registered at the time of entry to make certain they receive the Association's portion of premiums. The Association does not pay a percentage on premiums offered in championship classes. An animal may only be counted one time toward the total count for premium participation by the Association.
- 8. Exhibitors must have the original registration certificate on each animal available for inspection at the show. Electronically stored registration certificates are NOT accepted only the original certificates issued by the American Angus Association. Any animal, upon check-in, which does not have a legible permanent identification mark (ear tattoo marks, freeze-branded marks or hot-branded marks) corresponding to the permanent identification mark on the registration certificate is ineligible to show. Once disqualified due to an incorrect or illegible permanent identification mark, animals cannot be re-tattooed and rechecked at the show.
- 9. Only one person at a time shall lead animals into the show ring.
- 10. Exhibitors who participate in shows that accept premium monies contributed by the American Angus Association are subject to the Association Rules as found in the Breeder's Reference Guide of the Association. These rules are found in Part 2; Association Rules. The rules relating directly with the exhibition of Angus cattle are Part 2: Association Rules; Rule 800 Series; including Rule 800-810. These rules can be found at www.angus.org.
- 11. Altering the conformation and/or appearance of an animal for exhibition is prohibited. This includes the covering of white skin, false tail heads (or use of any false hair), with the exception of false tail switches. The use of graphite, powders, hemp or other similar substances used externally are also prohibited. Other prohibited products include those used internally such as steroids, illegal or unlicensed pharmaceuticals or artificial filling. Any animal found to be in violation will be barred from showing.

- 12. At any show for which the American Angus Association appropriates funds toward the payment of premiums, no exhibitors, individuals assisting exhibitors or member owners at such show shall be allowed to use any coloring agents, on any animal exhibited. The Association may adopt and implement various tests designed to monitor this prohibition, including but not limited to a "white towel" or "white glove" test. No aerosol cans or other pressurized containers will be allowed in designated make up areas.
- 13. All animals exhibited are subject to DNA marker or blood type tests to verify accuracy of parentage as covered under the Association Rules and for other testing as required by the individual show.
- 14. Authorized representatives of the Association have the authority to enforce the rules set forth herein as well as in the Association Rules, including the barring of a registered animal from a livestock show at which it is to be shown, if there are reasonable grounds to believe a violation has occurred.

- 1. Must be a member of the Junior Beefmaster Breeders Association (JBBA).
- 2. Original BBU Certificate of Breeding (not copies) on each animal shown, including any calf-at-side, must be presented to a representative of the show at the time the cattle arrive on the premises. Application for a BBU Certificate of Breeding on calves under 30 days of age must be presented.
- 3. All heifers must be registered with Beefmaster Breeders United as a purebred and out of a BBU-Certified Purebred dam, Second Cross dam or as otherwise stated in the BBU By-Laws.
- 4. All identification numbers and holding brands branded or tattooed on the animal must match the description with the BBU Certificate of Breeding.
- 5. Any heifer that, in the opinion of the designated BBU official, would be a detriment to the breed shall be removed from the show, regardless of any prior classification. Examples would be heifers exhibiting signs of low fertility, genetic or physical defects.
- 6. Heifers that do not show the day of the month of birth on their BBU Certificate of Breeding shall be considered to be born on the first day of that month.
- 7. All Animals will be shown with their hair coats laying flat against their entire body. Hair trimming is permissible. Those few areas such as the legs, tail head and portions of the top line of the animal which may not naturally lay flat against the body must be trimmed to be flush with adjacent portions of the hair coat. Hair may not be trained or pulled upwards or forwards. Animals will not be shown that have any foreign object(s) attached to it in any manner nor will animals be allowed to be shown that have their natural color altered in a manner so as to change the conformation or appearance. Exhibitors failing to abide by this rule will be dismissed from the arena and/or forfeit premiums, awards and points won by same exhibitors. (4/19/08)

I. 2014 Pan American Livestock Exposition Open Red Angus, October 10, 2014

A. This show will follow and comply with all State Fair of Texas Rules and entry deadlines. Visit <u>www.bigtex.com</u> for complete premium list. **To participate in the show you must enter through the** State Fair of Texas by September 1, 2013. Entry Fee \$30/per head

II. 2014 Texas Red Angus Junior State Bred and Owned Female and Bull Show, October 10, 2014
 A. This show will follow and comply with all State Fair of Texas Rules and entry deadlines. Visit
 <u>www.bigtex.com</u> for complete premium list. To participate in the show you must enter through the State Fair of Texas by August 25, 2013. Entry Fee \$30/per head
 B. All cattle must be BRED AND OWNED by the Junior Exhibitor and must be entered to show in the State Fair of Texas Junior or Pan American Livestock Exposition Open Red Angus show.

IV. Futurity Contest Registration, Entry, and Fees

A. Individual entry forms and required fees for the Texas Junior Red Angus Association contests must be postmarked by the entry deadline of **September 19**. If postmark is after September 19 a **late fee of \$10** per exhibitor will be incurred. The areas of competition in which an individual will participate must be designated at the same time.

B. Fees are located on the entry form. Entry fee of \$25 enters the junior into the futurity and to each contest.

C. All checks will be written to the *Texas Junior Red Angus Assoc.* and must accompany the entry form.

D. All entries will be returned to address designated on entry form.

V. Eligibility

A. Participants in the State Futurity Contests must be paid members of the Junior Texas Red Angus Association.

B. Contest participants must not have reached their 21st birthday prior to September 1, 2014.

I. Novice, Junior, Intermediate, and Senior Division Eligibility

A. Contestants 8 years and under who have not reached their 8th birthday by September 1, 2014, and are not eligible 4-H members must compete in the Novice division. Novice contestants may participate in all contests except the cattle shows. Contests will be age appropriate.

**Novices who participate in showmanship may be accompanied by an adult in the showing. **

B. To compete in the Junior Division, a contestant must be 8 years old prior to September 1, 2013, and not have reached their 13th birthday prior to September 1, 2014.

C. To compete in the Intermediate Division, contestants must be 13-16 years old on September 1, 2013, and not have reached their 13th birthday prior to September 1, 2014.

D. To compete in the Senior Division, contestants must be 17-21 years old on September 1, 2013, and not have reached their 21st birthday prior to September 1, 2014.

II. Individual Competition

A. At the Futurity, overall competition will be determined by points won in four events: Cattlemen's Quiz Public Speaking, Photography, Sales Talk, and Skill-A-Thon.

B. The top 15 competitors in the Cattlemen's Quiz, Public Speaking, Photography, Sales Talk, and Skill-A-Thon, will receive points, with the highest score receiving 15 points and each subsequent score receiving one less point down to one point for fifteenth place.

C. To compete in the overall contest and be eligible for awards, a contestant must compete in four of the five following events: Cattlemen's Quiz Photography, Public Speaking, Sales Talk, and Skill-A-Thon. Contestants must compete in either sales talk or public speaking to be eligible for overall competition.

D. Contestants are required to wear the official Futurity shirt during the contests.

III. Ties

A. Ties will be broken by comparing scores in the order of the following events: Cattlemen's Quiz, Judging Contest, and Public Speaking.

IV. Recognition and Awards

To receive awards, contestants must attend the awards ceremony and dinner on Saturday, October 11, 2014. The only exceptions must be approved by the TJRAA Board. Approval for early release must be brought to TJRAA Board's attention by the completion of contestant check-in.

A. Awards will be presented to winners in the Novice, Junior, Intermediate, and Senior Divisions in each event.

B. Overall competition – The top individuals in the Novice, Junior, Intermediate, and Senior Divisions will receive an award.

V. Conduct and Disciplinary Action

A. All TJRAA members in attendance at the TJRAA Futurity are expected to conduct themselves in a manner becoming to a member of the TJRAA.

B. Violations of the above standard include, but are not limited to: misrepresentation of animals, vandalism, theft, fighting, unsportsmanlike conduct, and failure to comply with the directives of Futurity officials, possessing or being under the influence of intoxicating beverages or other prohibited substances, or willful violation of rules.

C. TJRAA Board Members and Advisers, upon finding an individual in violation of conduct, may take action as deemed necessary.

VI. Liability Provisions

A. All contestants must supply a signed release statement from a parent or legal guardian before being allowed to participate. The release statement is provided on the individual entry form.

B. The Texas Junior Red Angus Association and/or any of its employees are not responsible for accidents or theft that may occur during the Futurity.

CONTEST RULES

Cattlemen's Quiz

- 1. The quiz will consist of multiple choice and true/false questions.
- 2. One and one half hour will be allotted for contestants to complete the quiz.
- 3. Notes, books, and reference materials are not permitted in the testing area. All materials will be provided, including a Sire Summary, quiz questions, answer sheet, and pencils.
- 4. Conferring with other contestants, use of cell phones, or any other form of cheating will be grounds for disqualification of contestants.
- 5. Ties will be broken according to pre-designated tie breaking questions.
- 6. Primary resources for questions used on the quiz will be derived from the Texas 4-H Beef Bowl Quiz and Texas 4-H Managing Beef Cattle for Show. Both of these documents are located on the junior section of http://www.texasredangus.org

Public Speaking

- 1. The junior age division will be doing a prepared speech, while Intermediate and Senior age divisions will participate in extemporaneous speaking.
- 2. Contestant speaking order will be selected in a random drawing. Contestants are free to choose their subject matter. However, speech topics should pertain to the Red Angus breed, or the beef industry.
- 3. Contestants should present speeches composed of original material. Contestants MAY NOT repeat a speech previously used in this contest. If sources of information are used in speech preparation, the source should be cited. In speeches that address technical or scientific matter, resource information should be given. The speaker must give credit when he/she quotes directly the words or writings of another individual.
- 4. Extemporaneous contestants will be given 30 minutes to prepare a speech on one of three randomly selected Red Angus and beef topics. Materials will be provided on the topics to develop speeches.
- 5. Speeches will be 3 to 5 minutes in length. Time elapsed will be posted during the speech so contestants are aware of timing. Speakers, who finish before 3 minutes have elapsed, or after 5 minutes have passed, will be penalized 1 point for each second over/under. Following the speech, time is allowed to judges to ask questions.
- 6. Following each speech, the panel of judges will be allowed to ask relevant questions to participants in ALL DIVISIONS.
- 7. Contestants are permitted to use notes, but excessive reference to note cards may result in point deductions by the judge.
- 8. No props, visual aids, music, etc. will be permitted.
- 9. At the conclusion of each speaker, judges will total scores for that speaker. The scores shall then be averaged and a ranking of contestants determined at the conclusion of the contest.

- 1. The purpose of this contest is to assess practical skills related to the beef industry and Red Angus cattle.
- 2. Contest may include a visual identification via Power Point, identification of the actual equipment, or a combination of the two,
- 3. Contest may include but is not limited to: identification, practical usage, beef industry problem solving, and practical application of ARA materials.
- 4. Contestants may not bring notes, books, or reference materials into the contest area.
- 5. While the contest is in progress, there shall be no conferring between contestants, use of cell phones, use of notes, or any other form of cheating. Any violation will be grounds for disqualification from the contest.
- 6. Ties will be broken by clearly marked tie-breaker questions. If a tie still remains, the tie will be broken according to placing on the Cattlemen's Quiz.

Sales Talk

- Contestants may use any entry or photo (no larger than 8x10) of a Red Angus animal as the subject of the Sales Talk. Contestants may use a heifer/cow other than their own. The contestant may hold or tie the heifer/cow, or have another contestant hold the heifer/cow during the talk. The heifer/cow is not to be fitted.
- 2. Before the talk, contestants will be required to provide judges with a registration certificate for the animal being "sold". The judges will use the registration certificate to evaluate the accuracy of pedigree and performance information provided by the contestant and to also ask questions. The certificate will be returned to the contestant at the end of the talk.
- 3. Contestants will be judged on their knowledge of the animal they are selling (25%), ability to relate important information about the heifer/cow (organization and style-25%), poise and delivery (25%), and overall effectiveness in convincing the judge to buy the animal (25%).
- 4. A contestant's score will be reduced 10% if additional materials are presented to the judges other than those listed in the above rules.
- 5. Sales Talk will be 5-7 minutes in length. Time elapsed will be indicated during the contest so that contestants are aware of time constraints.

Photography Contest

1. All work must be that of the entrant.

2. Photos are to be 8x10-inch (in.) color or black-and-white prints mounted on a 10x14-in.black foam core. Photos should not be matted or framed. Mount the completed 3x5 index card with the contestant name, age division, entry division and photo title on the back side, in the upper left-hand corner of the form core.

3. Photos must be taken by the contestant during the past year. Photo cannot be altered or imageenhanced in any way.

4. There will be four subject categories: Angus Cattle, Landscapes, People and Around the Farm or Ranch. Contestants may enter only one photo per category. Each entry may apply to no more than one subject category. The contestant should declare what subject category the photo is to be judged, as the photograph is representative of the contestant's interpretation of the category. Judges, however, reserve the right to move an entry to a more suitable category. Should the contestant already have a photograph in the more suitable subject category, judges are empowered to disqualify a photograph from competition. Further explanation of the subject categories is listed below.

• Red Angus Cattle - Photographs that highlight Red Angus cattle on the farm or ranch or at an

Red Angus event. The cattle should be the dominate focus of the picture.

- Landscape Photographs that focus on scenery around the farm or ranch. Red Angus cattle should be included in the photo.
- People Photographs that show a Red Angus junior and/or family, friends, fellow junior members, etc., either involved in activities on the farm or ranch or at a Red Angus event.
- Around the Farm or Ranch Photographs that highlight activities and scenes around the farm or ranch.
- 5. A maximum of two entries per contestant is allowed, with only one entry per division. Only one photo will go towards the points for the overall competition.

DEPARTMENT REQUIREMENTS

- 1. **RULES/REGULATIONS**: Entries made in this department shall be subject to and each exhibitor agrees to abide by the General Rules and Regulations and Youth Livestock Show and Events Special Rules.
- 2. ENTRY LIMITATION: No exhibitor shall be permitted to show more than two market beef steers. If both steers place high enough to make the sale, ONLY the highest placing steer will sale. Only exception to this rules is if exhibitor has BOTH the Grand and Reserve Grand Champion Steers.
- **3. OWNERSHIP**: All entries must be owned and continuously cared for by the exhibitor from June 30 through the show date of the Fair.
- **4. VALIDATION**: This show will adhere to the recommendations of the Texas 4-H/FFA Steer Validation Program. Failure to abide by these rules will result in disqualification.
- 5. ASSISTANCE: Market steers may be led through the sifting procedure by the owner, another qualified youth exhibitor, or parent/adult. Parents or other adults will not be allowed to assist youth exhibitors during judging of classes.
- 6. **PROCESSING**: Market steers will be classified and hair checked by division in the same order as listed in the premium list. Market beef steers must meet the following requirements or automatically be sifted:
 - a. Be slick shorn to no more than 1/4" on any location of the body, excluding tail switch.
 - b. Be free of grubs or grub damage.
 - c. Be dehorned and show no secondary horn growth in excess of one inch.
 - d. Be trained to lead easily and handle properly through processing and in the show ring.
 - Market beef not shorn will be disqualified from showing.

Decisions of official veterinarians, classifiers, and/or sifters is final and no protests will be considered by show management.

- 7. EARTAGS & SHOW WEIGHTS: The Texas Validation Tag number will be used for animal identification. Exhibitors will turn in the official show weight for their steer. Show weight will be no less than 1,000 pounds. All steers with weights turned in less than 1,000 lbs. will be sifted. WEIGHT CHANGES WILL NOT BE ALLOWED AT ANY TIME. Exhibitors must completely enter the State Validation Tag Number and Weight on the Class Card provided in the Exhibitor's Packet. This card must be presented to Superintendents at classification and hair check. Upon completion, the exhibitor will be given the Exhibitor Receipt and Consignee Receipt sections of their class card. Exhibitors must have the remaining portions of the class card to show and/or consign their animals.
- 8. TIE OUTS: A limited number of tie out spaces will be sold on a first come first serve basis. Tie outs may be purchased at time of entry or from the Livestock Office. Tie outs will be assigned upon arrival when the exhibitor provides proof of purchase to the superintendent.
 - Cattle will not be removed to tie outs until 7:00 PM daily.
- **9. GROOMING**: All animals must be shorn (see rule 7a) before arrival on the grounds. Animals are to be shown in natural conformation and color. Grooming materials leaving any color or other residue are not permitted.
- **10.** Drench guns may not be used in any stall/pen, aisle or walkway. Stomach pumping, drench tubes or any other method per os (by esophagus) is prohibited.

- **11. RE-WEIGH**: After judging of each class is completed, all placing steers will be re-weighed. Any animal weighing more than 105% of the weight turned in will be disqualified. - 2. Soft pelt which is characteristic of 1/2 blood wool (60's, 62's spinning count).

- 1. **RULES/REGULATIONS**: Entries made in this department shall be subject to and each exhibitor agrees to abide by the General Rules and Regulations and Youth Livestock Show and Events Special Rules.
- 2. ENTRY LIMITATION: No exhibitor shall be permitted to show more than one market goat. All animals entered must be neutered males.
- **3. STALLING**: Lambs and goats will be stalled together by county or chapter upon arrival. BRING dividers, they will not be provided to you.
- **4. OWNERSHIP**: All entries must be owned and continuously cared for by the exhibitor from June 30 through the show date of the Fair.
- **5. VALIDATION**: This show will adhere to the recommendations of the Texas 4-H/FFA Goat Validation Program.

All goats must be tagged with an official Texas Goat Tag approved by the Texas Education Agency Department of Agricultural Education and the Texas AgriLife Extension Service. Additionally, each entry must have been recorded on a 4-H or FFA Goat Validation Form (completed by the County Goat Validation Committee) between June 1 and June 30. Goats arriving at the Show without the Official Texas Goat Tag will not be eligible to show until re-validated.

All class winners as well as any other goats designated by the show management will have hair follicle samples collected for DNA analysis. In the event the DNA analysis reveals there is not a positive match, the animal will be disgualified.

- 6. ASSISTANCE: Parents or other adults will not be allowed to assist youth exhibitors during judging of classes.
- 7. EARTAGS & SHOW WEIGHTS: The Texas Validation Tag number will be used for animal identification. Exhibitors will turn in the official show weight for their goat. Show weight will be no less than 50 pounds. All goats with weights less than 50 pounds will be sifted. WEIGHT CHANGES WILL NOT BE ALLOWED AT ANY TIME. Exhibitors must complete the State Validation Tag Number and Weight on the Class Card provided in the Exhibitor's Packet. This card must be presented to Superintendent. Upon completion, the exhibitor will be given the Exhibitor Receipt and Consignee Receipt sections of their class card. Exhibitors must have the remaining portions of the class card to show and/or consign their animals.
- 8. MARKET GOATS must also meet the following requirements or be sifted:
 - a) Weigh no more than 115 pounds.
 - b) Be slick shorn to no more than 3/8" from knee and hock up, excluding tip of tail.
 - c) Be free of any external parasites.
 - d) Have horns tipped, no sharp points allowed.
 - e) Market goats with teeth that have been tampered with will be disqualified from showing.
 - f) Market goats with external parasites will be disqualified and removed from the grounds.

Decisions of official veterinarians and/or sifters is final and no protests will be considered by show management.

9. CLASSES: All animals will be weighed and divided into nine classes as equal in number as possible.

10. GROOMING: All animals must be shorn before arrival on the grounds. No mechanical clipping is allowed on grounds. Touch up clipping with scissors or hand shears will be allowed. Grooming tables are not allowed in any aisle or walkway.

- 1. **RULES/REGULATIONS**: Entries made in this department shall be subject to and each exhibitor agrees to abide by the General Rules and Regulations and Youth Livestock Show and Events Special Rules.
- 2. ENTRY LIMITATION: No exhibitor shall be permitted to show more than two pens of three broilers each. All broilers must be ordered from Texas A & M Poultry Science Club.
- ORDERS: The price is \$1.30 per straight run (as hatched) chick with a minimum order of twenty-five (25) chicks per exhibitor. There is no maximum order for chicks ordered by the order deadline. Please visit for more detailed ordering information: <u>http://posc.tamu.edu/files/2012/08/2014-STATE-FAIR-OF-TEXAS-ORDER-FORM.pdf</u>.
- 4. HATCH DATE: Broilers will be forty three days of age on the day of processing.
- 5. WINGBANDS: All chicks will be wing banded. The person picking up the chick order at TAMU is responsible for checking and confirming wing bands at the time of pickup. No broiler will be accepted at the State Fair without the original wing band properly in place. Exhibitors are requested to consult with their CEA/AST in the proper management methods of rear wing banded birds. Each broiler must have the original wing band in place.
- 6. OWNERSHIP: All entries must be owned and continuously cared for by the exhibitor from hatch date through the show date of the Fair.
- 7. SUBSTITUTIONS: No substitutions allowed in this department.
- 8. FEED AND LITTER: Each exhibitor is required to bring two one pound coffee cans (or any metal can of equal size, shape and weight) with a hole punched in the side next to the top of the can to be used for feed and water. Feed and litter is furnished by the Show. No other feed or litter is allowed in coops. Exhibitors cannot add water or other liquid to feed.
- 9. SHOW LOCATION: Loading and unloading of broilers will be done at Cattle Barn II.
- **10. SIFTING**: Pens of broilers will be sifted and scored at upon arrival. All entries must be of U.S. Grade A live market quality to be accepted. A pen may be sifted for the lack of uniformity. Any broiler which has no wing band, regardless of reason, will be sifted. Sick or diseased broilers will be refused entry and if discovered during the show, will be removed. - 5. SPONSORED ENTRIES (scramble heifers): Youth exhibiting animals sponsored by other shows or organizations which are retaining the registration papers must obtain a photocopy of the registration papers, or the papers themselves. In case of photocopies, both sides of the papers must be copied and presented to the Superintendent. Name of show or organization must be officially shown on the papers by letterhead or official seal/logo. If the rules of the sponsoring organization prevent the transfer of registration papers to the exhibitor until certain obligations are met, a notarized certification must (1) state this fact and (2) give date the animal was awarded to the exhibitor. The date of awarding must be not later than the ownership deadline.
- 6. OWNERSHIP: Animals must be owned by and registered in the name of the exhibitor not later than June 30 of the current year. Entries owned in joint names are eligible to show provided each partner is eligible to show. Farm names and parent/child partnerships are not acceptable. This show will be governed by the General and Youth Rules and Regulations of the State Fair of Texas and the following special rules.

The purpose of this show is to provide an opportunity for 4-H and FFA members to display projects constructed in agricultural mechanics labs; to promote the development of skills in agricultural mechanics through competition; to recognize individual and group accomplishments in the area of agricultural mechanics; and to provide an opportunity for public appreciation of this important phase of 4-H and FFA Youth Programs.

SPECIAL RULES

- ELIGIBILITY: Entries in this division are limited to Texas FFA and 4-H members. Entries must be included on the official group summary sheet submitted by the CEA or AST. Projects exhibited must have been constructed by FFA and 4-H members under direct supervision of the CEA or AST, either as a part of their agricultural mechanics instruction in agricultural science or as a part of their supervised work experience program. *Each exhibitor is required to return a Youth Entry Certification Form.*
- 2. **OWNERSHIP:** Projects may have been individually or group constructed and may be individually or chapter owned.
- **3. CLUB ENTRIES:** Entries made in the name of FFA Chapters or 4-H Clubs are not eligible. All projects must be entered in the names of the exhibitors who participated in planning and construction of the project.
- 4. ENTRY LIMITATION: Each exhibitor may enter two individual projects and no more than one per class. Each group of students may enter no more than two group constructed projects and may have no more than one entry in any project class. No individual exhibitor may enter more than four projects total.
- 5. **INELIGIBLE PROJECTS:** Any project that does not fit into one of the stated classes will be disqualified by the Show committee.
- 6. **SUBSTITUTIONS:** All project substitutions must be made at check in with the superintendent. Substitutions will not be allowed after check-in. See Youth Show Rules for exhibitor substitution rules.
- 7. CONSTRUCTION DATE (AG MECH): A project can be exhibited only one time at the State Fair of Texas. All projects must be started on or after April 1, 2013.
- 8. **RESTORATION DATE (TRACTORS):** A tractor can be exhibited only one time at the State Fair of Texas. All restoration projects must be started on or after October 1, 2012
- **9. EXHIBIT SPACE:** Due to limited exhibit space, please note your space requirements on your entry form. Final space allotment is at the superintendent's discretion.
- **10. PROJECT PRESENTATION:** All projects must be painted or properly treated and must be clean and in a presentable condition, even though they may have been used. Due to limited exhibit space, trailers and other equipment are to be displayed in transport position. Operation of ramps, extensions, and other special features may be demonstrated only as directed by the official judges and as space permits. No additional floor space will be provided for podiums, chairs, tables, show boxes, etc. No electricity will be available for computers, other electronics, etc. Electricity will be available for projects requiring it for operation during judging only. No touch up painting of any type will be allowed.

- 11. EXHIBITOR PRESENTATION/SHOWMANSHIP: Exhibitors should be dressed appropriately and be with their project when it is judged. Exhibitors should be courteous and helpful to those viewing their project, including those exhibiting next to them. Exhibitors should not interfere with or shield those who are exhibiting next to them. Exhibitors should be available to answer questions when their project is being judged. Knowledge of the project will be evaluated at this time. Exhibitors should be well informed of the project they are representing, but should not be boisterous or argumentative. Exhibitors should provide any equipment that may be necessary to judge their project (flashlights, mat or creeper for judging projects that the judge would need to get underneath such as trailers). Exhibitors may be requested to hold measuring tap and assist the judge in making measurements on projects. An anonymous judge will award showmanship.
- 12. TRAILER REGISTRATION: Current registration plates or one trip permits and paper plates are required on all trailers that are towed to the project show. Hauled trailers will be exempt from this rule.
- **13. DOCUMENTATION:** An original (exhibitor drawn) plan or drawing, a bill of materials and photographs showing all phases of construction are to be provided with projects. TxDOT and/or ASAE regulations and specifications are to be provided as they apply to individual projects. Display of plans, photos, etc. must be done in such a manner that no additional floor space is required. Stands, podiums, etc. will be permitted only when they can be positioned on or under the project.
- 14. PROJECT SAFETY: Appropriate and safe display stands must be provided for gates, panels, and other projects that need support. Sharp edges and points, such as found on self feeder roofs, bale movers, etc. are to be padded or covered as necessary to prevent injury. All trailers and other equipment that is to be operated and/or transported on public roads are to be equipped with safety equipment specified in Title 7, Vehicles and Traffic Transportation Code of Texas Statutes, Specific chapters regarding width (621.201), lights and reflectors (545.106, 547.324 and 547.331), brakes (547.401), length (621.201) and inspection (621.204) are to be adhered to. Any trailer that exceeds 102 inches in width must have a signed permit. All towed equipment, regardless of standards, is to be equipped with safety chains. All three-point hitch and P.T.O. operated equipment are to meet current ASAE standards. The IMS WEB page will provide information on how to access or acquire TxDOT Equipment and Vehicle Registrations, and ASABE Standards. (www-ims.tamu.edu)
- **15. ELECTRICAL SAFETY:** All 120 VAC and higher electrical plugs and receptacles are to be the equipment grounding type. All metal components are to be grounded. Ground fault circuit interrupters (GFCI) shall be provided for all 120 VAC receptacles. All 50 VAC and higher connections are to be protected in appropriate indoor or outdoor rated enclosures.
- **16. GENERAL SAFETY:** Flammable and/or combustible liquids shall not be used, stored or sprayed inside any State Fair of Texas® building at any time. This shall include, but is not limited to, enamel paints, thinners, reducers, gasoline or any other petroleum based liquids. All liquids must be in properly labeled original containers. All compressed gas cylinders shall be properly secured in place. Hand wheels are to be removed. Protective caps installed and taped. No regulators or hoses are to be installed at any time. No extension cords allowed.
- **17. OFFLOADING ASSISTANCE:** If the project can be removed safely from the trailer, the State Fair of Texas will provide assistance to unload the project. Unloading assistance is left to the discretion of the Superintendents.
- **18. PROJECTS WITH ENGINES:** There is to be no more than two gallons of fuel in any fuel tank. The fuel tank cap is to be in place and sealed with tape. The battery is to be disconnected. This applies to all engines in the exhibit area.
- **19. VEHICLES:** Tractors, truck or other vehicles (including non-entered trailers) are not allowed in the exhibit area as part of the display.
- **20. PROJECT COMPLETENESS:** All projects should be complete including finish. Any item, necessary for use of the project, must be a part of it (example: hinges and latches on gates and panels) including documentation.
- **21. SIGNS:** All projects are to be identified with standard club exhibitor cards. Additional signs, banners, etc. are encouraged, but are subject to approval by the Committee. No "For Sale" signs will be permitted.
- **22. LOSS OR DAMAGE:** Every precaution will be taken to protect the projects entered; however, neither the State Fair of Texas, its management, superintendents nor judges of this Division will be responsible for any loss or damage to projects.

24. TRACTOR RESTORATION:

- a. No yard tractors or riding lawnmowers.
- b. Tractors with steel lugs Exhibitors must provide mats or lumber/plywood to serve as runners to protect asphalt and concrete from damage.
- c. Tractor Serial Number must be included with Description on Entry Form.

25. Judging Criteria for Tractor Restoration projects:

- a. **Aesthetics: 15 points**. Overall appearance of tractor, including workmanship and finish. Items that will be considered include, but are not limited to the following:
 - Metal preparation prior to painting
 - Completeness of all sheet metal
 - Painting and finish
 - Detail and completeness of components steering wheels, seats, decals, instrument panels, wiring harness, etc.
- b. Authentic: 10 points. Must be as original as possible. To include:
 - Paint color, fasteners, and other components such as magnetos, carburetors, exhaust systems
 - Mechanical systems, fuel, electrical, engine, transmission, final drive, cooling, etc.
 - Serial plates in place with unaltered serial numbers
- c. **Mechanical: 40 points**. To include the mechanical restoration of all systems including: (some tractors may not have all systems)
 - Engine, transmission, final drive

• Fuel, cooling, ignition, lighting, exhaust, charging, starting, hydraulic and steering systems Exhibitors will be asked to start the tractor and drive it, demonstrating all gears along with systems (hydraulics, lights, brakes, etc.). Driving and mechanical evaluation will be done outside when offloading on Monday. Exhibitors may be asked to move tractors back outside for additional driving and mechanical evaluation on Tuesday.

A Mechanical Check Sheet, which tractor judges use in their evaluation, will be posted on the website as soon as it becomes available. These score sheets will include (a) Checks on Systems – engine – transmission – final drive – brakes/steering – lights/safety equipment – cranking/charging and PTO/lift/hydraulics; (b) example question that could be used in interviewing exhibitors to ascertain their knowledge; and (c) observations made when tractors are driven.

- d. **Safety Equipment: 5 points**. All equipment that was original to the tractor should be in place (includes all shields and decals). Tractor must be in safe operating condition. To exhibit a tractor, the following safety considerations must be followed:
 - No more than 5 gallons of fuel in the fuel tank
 - Neat and functional drip pans containing floor absorbent material (cat litter) to collect any coolant, oil, or hydraulics that may drip from the tractor
 - Fuel shut off valves, under all fuel tanks, must be functional and all tractors must be exhibited with these valves off
 - An approved ABC fire extinguisher with a minimum of 5 lb. capacity must be provided and placed near the tractor
 - Tractors may be started only at the request of show officials

- e. **Documentation: 15 points**. Documentation must be typed (recommend word processor or spreadsheet) and include the following: (The National FFA Tractor Restoration Competition documentation format may be used.)
 - One page description of the overall restoration project
 - Expense report identifying all costs involved in the restoration
 - Photos (before, during, after) Safe working environments should be depicted in all photos
 - Mechanic's report detailing all mechanical work performed
 - All documentation is to be arranged in a three-ring notebook, divided and sequenced with a table of contents and page numbers.
- f. **Knowledge: 10 points**. Judges will ask questions to determine the exhibitor/exhibitors knowledge of and involvement in the restoration.
- g. **Presentation: 5 points**. Showmanship includes meeting public, eye contact, introduction, enthusiasm for describing tractor, articulate and assuring.

- ENTRY: An entry fee of \$25 made payable to State Fair of Texas will be charged per entry. Entries
 must be made through official State Fair of Texas entry forms and completed online at
 <u>http://www.bigtex.com/sft/LiveStock/OnlineEntryForm.asp</u>. The form must be completed online;
 printed; signed by the youth contestant, parent/guardian, and AST/CEA. The original must be post
 marked by the entry deadline. Any missing forms will be considered incomplete entries and will not be
 accepted.
- 2. MANUSCRIPT: <u>The manuscript must be uploaded to the official State Fair of Texas online entry</u> system as a single PDF file by September 15, 2014. No late entries will be accepted.
 - a. Manuscripts will certified and validated by contest committee to determine appropriate divisions was entered.
 - b. Do not bring a copy of the manuscript to the speaking contest.
 - c. The manuscript must be completed in APA style. Information about APA can be found at the following link: <u>www.apastyle.org</u>.
 - d. A bibliography following APA style must also be included.
 - e. If guidelines are not followed correctly, points will be deducted at the discretion of the Superintendents, Show Management, and/or Judges.
- 3. **ORIGINALITY:** The manuscript and speech presentation must be the contestant's own effort. A statement of originality is included on the entry form that must be completed online, signed, and mailed.
- 4. ELIGIBILITY: Participation is limited to Texas residents only, who are members of a Texas 4-H Club, FCCLA or Texas FFA Chapter. Exhibitors must be enrolled in, and attending, public, private or home school elementary or secondary schools in Texas and they must be at least 8 years old and in the third grade, but not more than 18 years old on August 31. Exhibitors must be bona fide residents of the State of Texas. Past State Fair of Texas Grand Champion speaking contestant winners who have won scholarships are ineligible to enter.
- 5. **AGE GROUPS:** Contestants will be divided into two age groups.
 - a. Junior: 8 years old and in the third grade, but no more than in the eighth grade on August 31.
 - b. Senior: At least ninth grade, but no more than 18 years old on August 31.

6. CONTEST FORMAT:

- a. The speech presentations will be judged by a panel of 2-3 judges.
- b. The junior age group may be combined into one division for judging. The top two junior contestants will compete for Grand and Reserve Champion during the Public Awards Ceremony in the Food & Fiber Pavilion, unless otherwise announced.

- c. Senior contestants will be divided based on Division entered.
- d. The top two contestants in each Division will advance to the Semi-Finals where they will compete for division championship
 - i. If there are more than 15 entries in a Division, show management reserves the right to randomly divide into sub-divisions. The top two entries in the sub-division will advance to the Division Semi-Finals. The top two contestants in the Division Semi-Finals will advance to the Semi-Finals.
- e. Top two senior finalists will compete for Grand and Reserve Champion during the Public Awards Ceremony in the Food & Fiber Pavilion, unless otherwise announced.
- 7. **TIME LIMIT:** Each speech shall be a minimum of six (6) minutes and a maximum of eight (8) minutes. Deductions will be applied to overall score if time is under/over the allotted time. Time point deductions will apply as follows: Under six minutes one point per ten seconds, over eight minutes one point per ten seconds.
- 8. **QUESTION/ANSWER PERIOD:** A three-minute question/answer period will follow each speech. At the end of three minutes, time will be called and all questioning will end. If time is called during the student's answer to a question, the contestant may complete his or her answer. Only official judges may ask questions of the contestants.
- 9. ATTIRE: Business attire or official 4-H or FFA dress is recommended.
- 10. **PROPS:** The use of props of any kind is prohibited. Violation will result in disqualification.
- 11. **DIVISIONS:** Each contestant will enter their speech in one of nine divisions. The division must be declared on the entry form when submitting the manuscript. There are topics which may be appropriate in more than one division. If a topic is appropriate in more than one division, final division determination of all speeches will be at the discretion of show management.
 - a. <u>Agribusiness</u>: Any current or future subject that addresses topics such as cooperatives, sales, service, communications, entrepreneurship, marketing, finance, commodities, hedging, advertising, etc.
 - b. <u>Agricultural Policy</u>: Any current or future subject that addresses topics such as domestic farm issues, international trade, international competition, rural economic development, legal issues, animal rights, subsidies, price supports, etc.
 - c. <u>Agriculture Communication</u>: Any current or future subject that addresses the process or act of communicating agricultural related information to the public.
 - d. <u>Animal Science</u>: Any current or future subject that addresses any aspects of the dairy, equine, poultry, sheep, goat, swine, beef or specialty animal industries.
 - e. <u>Livestock Show Ethics</u>: Any current or future subject that addresses any aspect of the ethics practiced in the livestock show industry.
 - f. **Natural Resources:** Any current or future subject that addresses topics such as soil, water, air, water quality, wildlife, forestry, aquaculture, conservation, recreation, recycling, energy environmental issues, etc.
 - g. <u>Horticulture</u>: Any current or future subject that addresses any aspect of the horticulture and/or agronomy industries including floriculture, fruit and/or vegetable production, nursery operations, turf and landscape management, crop production or specialty crop production.
 - h. <u>Western Heritage</u>: Any current or future subject that addresses topics such as western history, culture or heritage.
 - i. <u>Agricultural Technology</u>: Any current or future subject that addresses topics such as biotechnology, biogenetics, bioengineering, mechanical engineering, new agri-technology applications global positioning and other satellite technology, computer applications, etc. .
- 12. **SCORE SHEET:** The manuscripts will be reviewed and validated by show management prior to the speaking contest. A separate panel of judges will evaluate and score the presentation. Judges' comments will be returned by mail to the County Extension Agent or Agriculture Science Teacher following the contest. Score sheets can be found at <u>www.bigtex.com</u>.
- 13. **RESULTS:** The contest results as announced will be final.
- 14. AWARDS: Division Champions will receive a Banner, Trophy and a Special Award. Reserve Division Champions will receive a Banner and a Special Award. Grand and Reserve Grand Champions in each age division will receive a Banner and Trophy Buckle. Grand Champion speaker is awarded a \$5,000 State Fair of Texas Scholarship, sponsored by Lone Star Ag Credit – Fort Worth, Texas (subject to SFT Scholarship eligibility rules/requirements).

SPECIAL RULES

- 1. ENTRY: An entry fee of \$25 made payable to State Fair of Texas will be charged. Entries must be made through official State Fair of Texas entry forms. The entry must be postmarked by September 15, 2014. Participants are limited to one individual entry, team entries are not allowed.
- **2. ENTRY LIMITATION**: Each student may enter only one project. There is no limit to the number of participants a chapter or club may submit.
- 3. ELIGIBILITY: Entries are limited to Texas 4-H, FFA and FCCLA members.
- 4. A project may be exhibited only one time at the State Fair of Texas and must have been researched and developed within one calendar year of the exhibition date. If the project is a continuation of a longitudinal (multi-year) study, the student's focus for research, display and presentation must center on the most recent year's data.
- **5. JUDGING:** Judging is based on the criteria set forth on the judges guidelines located in the Printable Forms section of this premium list.
- **6. DOCUMENTATION:** Participants must submit the following information to the State Fair of Texas: attn.: Contest Intern postmarked no later than September 15th to the address below.
 - **a.** Four copies of the entry's abstract
 - **b.** Four copies of the entry's research paper (stapled or bound copies)
 - c. One copy of Adult sponsor/safety assessment form
 - d. One Human Vertebrate Endorsement
 - e. One Non-Human Vertebrate Endorsement
 - f. One Hazardous Material Waiver Form
 - g. One Research Expense Form

7. CONTEST FORMAT:

- **a.** Participants are provided a 10ft X 10ft booth space to put up a table display and poster board explaining the project.
- **b.** Participants must be present at their booths during judging on Wednesday to explain their research/science project and answer questions to the public and judges
- c. Participants must provide all supplies including backing to mount poster board.
- d. Participants must provide their own extension cords and tape to safely secure cords and prevent tripping.
- **e.** There will be limited electrical supply provided by the show. Equipment should have an internal power supply for demonstrations.
- **f.** Table will be provided by the Fair.

8. TOPICS

Biochemistry/Microbiology/Food Science- Biology of microorganisms-bacteriology, virology, protozoology, fungi bacterial genetics, yeast. This area also can include chemistry of life processes-molecular biology, molecular genetics, enzymes, photosynthesis, protein chemistry, food chemistry, hormones, etc. Examples: Compare different yeast fermentation techniques for converting sugars to alcohol. Research resistance of organic fruits to common diseases. Examine techniques for controlling molds on bakery products.

Environmental Sciences- Study of pollution (air, water and land) sources and their control; ecology Examples: Study effect of agricultural chemicals on water quality. Compare water movements through different soil types. Examine effects of cropping practices on wildlife populations. Compare different irrigation systems for energy efficiency. Research uniform water quality standards.

Animal Science/Zoology- Study of animals-animal genetics, ornithology, ichthyology, entomology, animal ecology, paleontology, cellular physiology, animal husbandry, cytology, histology, animal physiology, invertebrate neurophysiology, studies of invertebrates, etc. Examples: Compare effects of different thawing temperatures on livestock semen. Compare effects of different nutrient levels on animal growth. Study effects of growth hormones on meat or milk production. Research new disease control mechanisms. Examine effects of estrous synchronization on ovulation.

Plant/Soil Science/Botany- Study of plant life-agriculture, agronomy, horticulture, forestry, plant taxonomy, plant physiology, plant pathology, plant genetics, hydroponics, algae, etc. Examples: Study effects of lunar climate and soil conditions on plants growth. Examine effect of substrate particle size on shiitake mushroom growth. Research effects of heavy metals such as cadmium on edible plants. Compare plant growth using hydroponics and conventional methods. Study effect of ultraviolet light on soil microbes.

Mechanical/Agricultural Engineering Science - Technology; projects that directly apply scientific principles to manufacturing and practical uses-mechanical, chemical, electrical, environmental engineering, etc. Examples: Develop alternate energy source engines. This show will be governed by the General and Youth Rules and Regulations of the State Fair of Texas and the following special rules.

- 1. **Objective:** Participants will apply for a position in the agricultural industry and write a cover letter/résumé pertaining to the job description. During the contest, participants will fill out a job application, interview before a panel of judges and write a follow up letter once the interview is completed. However, the cover letter, résumé and past work experiences should all reflect true and correct information about the applicant. It is encouraged that participants apply for a job that best reflects his/her interests and work experiences.
- 2. Entry: An entry fee of \$25 made payable to the State Fair of Texas will be charged for each job interview entry. Entries must be made through official State Fair of Texas entry forms and completed online at <u>http://www.bigtex.com/sft/LiveStock/OnlineEntryForm.asp</u>. All entries for the 2014 job interview contest will be completed by using the State Fair of Texas entry system. All forms must be completed. Forms with missing information will be considered incomplete entries and will not be accepted. Contestants failing to submit a copy of these materials by this deadline are subject to disqualification.
- 3. Eligibility: Entries in this division are limited to Texas FFA, 4-H and FCCLA members. Cover letters and résumés submitted must have been constructed by FFA, 4-H or FCCLA members under direct supervision of the Agricultural Science Teacher, County Extension Agent or FCCLA Advisor. Participants may enter the contest under only one youth organization (FFA, 4-H, FCCL). Entries in multiple organizations will result in both submissions being disqualified. Participants must be an actively enrolled member in either the Texas FFA Program, Texas 4-H and Youth Development Program or Texas FCCLA.
- 4. Entry Limitation: Participants may enter only one time in the job interview contest.
- 5. All materials submitted must have been created and written, in their entirety, by a member of FFA, 4-H or FCCLA.
- 6. **Contest Format:** The event will be held in the following contest format:
 - a. A maximum of 30 participants will be selected from the cover letter/résumé submission as the top participants. Those selected will be notified of their advancement by September 23, 2014 and compete on October 7, 2014. The first round of interviews will be divided among a maximum of three rooms. The top two individuals from each room will then advance to the final round and participate in the interview \ portion of the contest again.
 - b. Contest order will be determined by a random system to determine the order in which they will compete in both rounds.
 - c. At the beginning of the contest, all participants will be given 10 minutes to fill out the job application in unison and then wait their turn to compete in the interview portion of the contest.

- d. Finalists will compete for Grand and Reserve Champions placing at 4:00 p.m., unless otherwise announced.
- 7. Guidelines:
 - a. Cover Letter: The cover letter must be the result of the participants' own effort and cannot exceed more than one page and must be single spaced, 12 pt. size and Times New Roman font with 1"margins. - c. Résumé: Submit an accurate résumé with no fictitious experience and not to exceed one page. Participants are free to format the résumé in the way they deem most professional. The résumé should be submitted no later than September 15, 2014.
- d. A statement of originality signed by the participant, parent(s), and AST, CEA or teacher must be attached to each copy of the cover letter and résumé. The statement of originality should be submitted.
- e. If a participant exceeds the guidelines for the cover letter and/or the résumé, point deductions will be taken at the discretion of the Superintendent, Show Management and Judges.
- f. Each participant should bring **five copies** of their cover letter/résumé on the day of the contest.
- g. Dress Attire: Business attire or Official FFA/4-H/FCCLA attire is recommended.
- h. Application: The participants will begin this portion of the contest in unison before the personal interviews start. The participants will have 10 minutes to complete the application and may bring in a copy of their résumé to use as reference for past employment information. The résumé must be discarded immediately after the application is complete.
- i. Personal Interview: Participants will proceed to a room during the contest with two (2) to five (5) judges who will act as the hiring managers for the position in which the participant has applied. The interview will last no more than 15 minutes.
- j. Follow-Up Letter: Participants will conclude the contest by writing or typing a letter to the interview panel thanking them for their time. A name, address and writing utensils will be provided to complete the letter.
- k. Outside Materials: The use of outside materials is limited to business cards and notepads for the personal interview and a copy of the résumé for the application. All other materials are prohibited and violation will result in disgualification.
- 8. **Score Sheet**: The cover letter and résumé will be reviewed and scored by judges prior to the contest. Judges' comments will be returned by mail to the Agriculture Science Teacher, County Extension Agent or FCCLA Advisor following the contest.
- 9. **Awards**: Awards will be based on the evaluation of the job interview segments to a set of standards.
 - a. Grand Champion: One Grand Champion Award trophy will be presented to one participant in addition to a \$250 premium cash prize.
 - Placing Awards: Awards will be given to second through fifth place in the contest. Second place will also receive a \$125 premium cash prize. All other participants will not be placed.
 - c. Evaluation of the Job Interview Contest: Participants will be evaluated using the following criteria:
- 10. **Tiebreakers**: Ties will be broken based on the highest score in the rubric category that carries the most weight. If a tie still exists, then the rubric category that carries the next amount of weight will be used to break the tie. This process will continue in the event that a tie still exists. The superintendent has the authority to further determine tie breakers to declare a winner.

- 1. ENTRY FEE: \$10 per team
- 2. ELIGIBILITY: Entries in this division are limited to Texas FFA, 4-H and FCCLA members. <u>Each</u> <u>exhibitor is required to return a Youth Judging Contest Liability and Indemnity Form.</u>
- 3. All teams must consist of members from the same county 4-H, FFA Chapter or FCCLA Chapter.
- 4. Each team shall consist of a minimum of three and maximum of 4 contestants, with the three highest scores being used to compute team scores.
- 5. Each club or chapter may enter as many teams as desired. Each team must be designated by the teacher or county agent at the time of entry.
- 6. Contestants must be passing all subjects for the semester or grading period immediately preceding the contest.
- 7. There will be no talking between contestants during the contest. Violating this rule may cause the contestants and their teams to be disqualified and ineligible to receive awards.
- 8. Only contestants and contest officials will be permitted in the contest area during the competition.
- 9. Contestants must have their contestant number clearly visible on their clothing.
- 10. Contestants must advance from one exhibit to the next when instructed to do so.
- 11. Contestants must evaluate each exhibit in sequence and will not be allowed to return to any exhibit after advancing.
- 12. Contestants should not in any way willfully obstruct the work of another contestant.
- 13. If an ineligible contestant is permitted to judge, the team and individual members of that team will be ineligible for prizes and future entry into this contest may be denied to the FFA, 4-H or FCCLA.

1. **ELIGIBILITY**: Any Agriculture Science Teacher (AST) or County Extension Agent (CEA) may enter up to two teams trained under his/her supervision in each Division.

Participants must be enrolled in a public or private elementary or secondary school of Texas to be eligible to compete. *Each exhibitor is required to return a Youth Judging Contest Liability and Indemnity Form.*

Junior Division participants must be 8 years old and in the third grade and no more than a freshman in high school on August 31.

- ENTRY APPLICATION/FEE: An entry applications, remittal summary, and fee of \$5 per participant must be submitted by entry deadline. All fees must accompany application for entry. All entries must be signed and sent in together with one check by the Agricultural Science Teacher or County Extension Agent. Entries will NOT be accepted from other individuals. Late entries will be accepted through contest day registration, for a late entry fee per participant equal to two times the regular entry fee per participant.
- 4. **PLANTS**: Plants may be mounted specimens or live specimens.

 PURPOSE. This contest follows a modified format that is shorter and eliminates certain activities as compared to the 4-H and FFA contest. Read the rules and procedures carefully to properly participate in this contest. The purpose of the wildlife event is to support educational objectives related to management and conservation of natural resources for wildlife habitat, knowledge of and respect for laws related to hunting and other outdoor recreational activities, and safety. Referring regions and appendices for this contest can be found in the National WHEP Manual at <u>www.whep.org</u>.

2. TEAMS.

- a. Three or four individuals per county/school form a team. All members will be scored and the top three scores will count towards the team total.
- b. Contests entered as Individuals will participate in the entire contest in their age division including Activity IIA – Written wildlife Management Plan (this activity will continue to be an individual effort for these contestants). A score will be given for each activity and used to formulate the individual score. Individuals are eligible for High Point Individual awards but not team awards.
- c. Age Divisions (ages as of August 31, 2014): Junior (8-13 years old) and Senior (14-19 years old).
- d. Contestants should dress appropriately for the weather and for being in the habitat such as tall grass, brush, woods, mud, etc.

e. <u>Each exhibitor is required to return a Youth Judging Contest Liability and Indemnity Form.</u> 3. EQUIPMENT.

- a. Teams will be provided scan sheets.
- b. Each contestant will be allowed to bring the following items to the contest area:
 - i. Clipboard
 - ii. Colored map pencils
 - iii. Plastic bag for storing scan sheet in wet weather
 - iv. Small ruler or straight edge to help align rows on the score sheets
 - v. #2 pencils
 - vi. Backpack with necessary items to be outdoors such as drinking water, sunscreen, raincoat, binoculars, etc.
- c. Contestants will <u>NOT</u> be allowed to bring any of the following items to the contest area:
 - i. Any electronic device (calculators, compasses, phones, PDA's, etc.)
 - ii. Papers of any kind containing contest written information
 - iii. Any contestant bringing any of these items into the contest area will be immediately disqualified from competition.

4. JUNIOR DIVISION ACTIVITIES.

- a. I: On-Site Recommendations of Wildlife Management Practices (1 hour, in the field). Select the Wildlife Management Practices (WMPs) given in multiple choice format for four species named at the contest. Contestants will move around to 8-10 staked stations within a habitat and answer the multiple choice WMP question pertaining to the habitat and particular specie at each stake. This activity covers wildlife species and WMPs listed in the *Urban Region* only. (See sample question in Appendix A).
- b. **IIA: Written Wildlife Management Plan** (1.5 hours, in the field). Develop a wildlife management plan for the species listed in the Field Conditions and the habitat in its current condition on the contest site. Write the plan in outline format using bullet statements and the outline that will be provided on the day of contest (Appendix B). Include a labeled sketch of the habitat showing

management practices prescribed in the management plan for each of the species as requested in the Field Conditions. This activity covers WMPs and wildlife species listed in the *Urban Region* only.

- c. III: General Wildlife Knowledge Quiz (30 minutes). Answer 10 multiple choice (A D) questions covering information from the following sections in the Manual: Concepts, Regions (*Urban Region* only), Wildlife Species (only those listed in the *Urban Region*), Definitions of Food Groups and *Urban Region* Species Food Utilization Chart, Wildlife Management Practices (only those listed in the *Urban Region*), Glossary, and Interpreting Aerial Photos.
- d. **IV: Wildlife Identification** (30 minutes). ID 15 Species from photos, tracks, calls, or various external body parts (i.e. pelt, wing, etc.). This activity covers only wildlife species listed in the *Urban Region* of the 4-H WHEP Manual.

5. SENIOR DIVISION ACTIVITIES.

- a. I: On-Site Recommendations of Wildlife Management Practices (1 hour, in the field). Select the appropriate Wildlife Management Practices (WMPs) for each of the four species named at the contest following the provided Field Conditions and upon evaluating the habitat on site. This activity covers WMPs and wildlife species listed in the *Urban Region* only. The score sheet will be the grid from the Manual corresponding to the Urban region. This score sheet grid will provide all X's applicable for each of the species. Contestants must select (circle) the X's appropriate for the habitat and field conditions provided at the contest. This eliminates the need to memorize the placement of the X's on the grid.
- b. IIA: Written Wildlife Management Plan (1.5 hours, in the field). Develop a wildlife management plan for the species listed in the Field Conditions and the habitat in its current condition on the contest site. Write the plan in outline format using bullet statements and the outline that will be provided on the day of contest (Appendix B). Include a labeled sketch of the habitat showing management practices prescribed in the management plan for each of the species as requested in the Field Conditions. This activity covers WMPs and wildlife species listed in the Urban Region only.
- c. III: General Wildlife Knowledge Quiz (30 minutes). Answer 15 multiple choice (A D) questions covering information from the following sections in the Manual: Concepts, Regions (*Urban Region* only), Wildlife Species (only those listed in the *Urban Region*), Definitions of Food Groups and *Urban Region* Species Food Utilization Chart, Wildlife Management Practices (only those listed in the *Urban Region*), Glossary, and Interpreting Aerial Photos.
- d. **IV: Wildlife Identification** (30 minutes). ID 20 Species from photos, tracks, calls, or various external body parts (i.e.- pelt, wing, etc.). This activity covers only wildlife species listed in the *Urban Region*.
- 6. **SCORING:** All contestants are eligible for an overall individual placing. All activities will be used for the individual score and the team score. The Activity IIA (Written Wildlife Management Plan) score will be used for both individual and team placings.

a. Junior Division

- i. I: On Site Recommendations of Wildlife Management Practices 8-10 points total; one point for each correct answer (See Question Format in Appendix A)
- ii. IIA: Written Wildlife Management Plan 100 points total; points earned according to Judges' Score Sheet (See Appendix C)
- iii. III: General Wildlife Knowledge Quiz 10 points total; one point for each correct answer
- iv. IV: Wildlife Identification 15 points total; one point for each correct answer

b. Senior Division

- i. I: On Site Recommendations of Wildlife Management Practices 30 points total; score based on formula in WHEP Manual
- ii. IIA: Written Wildlife Management Plan 100 points total; points earned according to Judges' Score Sheet (See Appendix C)

This contest will be governed by the General Rules and Regulations of the State Fair of Texas, the Judging Contests rules, and the following special rules.

SPECIAL RULES

1. ELIGIBILITY: Contestants must be bona fide 4-H or FFA members enrolled in public or private schools in Texas. All members from a team must be from the same county if entered by a CEA, or from the same school if entered by an AST.

Any contestant violating any rule will be disqualified from the contest along with his/her team. If the eligibility of any student is protested, such protest must be made in writing at the Livestock Office the day of the contest before the contest begins. The protest must be accompanied by a check in the amount of \$100, which will be returned if the protest is sustained. If the protest is not sustained, the \$100 protest fee shall be forfeited. *Each exhibitor is required to return a Youth Judging Contest Liability and Indemnity Form.*

2. TEAMS: One (1) to four (4) students may constitute a team in this contest. Clubs/Chapters can enter individuals and/or teams. Contestants entered as individuals, and not teams, will be ineligible for Team Awards. Contestant names and birthdates will be submitted the morning of the contest at registration.

Team scores will be determined by the combined scores of the three (3) highest scoring individual team members. The contestant with the lower score will be designated as alternate, but will be eligible to receive individual awards.

3. ENTRY APPLICATION/FEE: Entry applications, remittal summary, and fee of \$40 per team and \$10 each participant thereafter must be submitted by entry deadline. All fees must accompany application for entry. All entries must be signed and sent in together with one check by the CEA/AST. Entries will NOT be accepted from other individuals.

4. CONDUCT OF CONTESTANTS:

- a. There will be no talking between contestants during the contest. Violating this rule may cause the contestants and their teams to be disqualified and ineligible to receive awards.
- b. Only contestants and contest officials will be permitted in the contest area during the contest.
- c. Contestants must have their group letter clearly visible on their clothing.
- d. Contestants cannot smoke or use any tobacco products in contest facilities.
- e. No electronic devices will be allowed in contest area.

5. CLASSES: Contestants will judge six (6) classes of four (4) animals each. Classes will not be handled. Contestants will have twelve (12) minutes to observe and complete cards.

There will be two (2) questions classes, consisting of five (5) questions each. Contestants will be notified of the classes requiring questions before placing that class. Contestants will have five (5) minutes to study notes and ten (10) minutes to answer questions.

6. TIES: Ties will be broken using question scores, then by a tie break class predetermined by Show Officials. No duplicate awards will be given.

7. SCORING: Scan sheets will be provided. All contestants must provide their own #2 pencil and may bring an unmarked clipboard and/or manila folder for use during the contest. Forms that are bent or abused will not be scored.

8. RESULTS: The contest results, as announced, will be final.

This contest will be governed by the General Rules and Regulations of the State Fair of Texas, the Livestock Judging Contests, and the following special rules.

Each county and FFA chapter must furnish at least one (1) adult leader to assist with the contest as needed. Leaders and contestants should report to the Superintendent.

SPECIAL RULES

1. ELIGIBILITY: Contestants must be bona fide 4-H or FFA members enrolled in public or private schools in Texas. All members from a team must be from the same county if entered by a CEA, or from the same school if entered by an AST.

Junior Division: Contestants must be entered as a member of a Junior Team, be eight (8) years old and in the third grade but not have reached their fifteenth (14th) birthday on September 1, 2014.

Senior Division: Contestants must be entered as a member of a Senior Team, be in the ninth grade or have passed their fourteenth (14th) birthday but not older than nineteen (19) years old on September 1, 2014. Any contestant classified as a junior may move up to compete on a senior team. This will make the junior contestant ineligible for any Junior Division Awards.

Any contestant violating any rule will be disqualified from the contest along with his/her team. If the eligibility of any student is protested, such protest must be made in writing at the Livestock Office the day of the contest before the contest begins. The protest must be accompanied by a check in the amount of \$100, which will be returned if the protest is sustained. If the protest is not sustained, the \$100 protest fee shall be

forfeited. <u>Each exhibitor is required to return a Youth Judging Contest Liability and Indemnity Form.</u> **2. TEAMS**: One (1) to four (4) students may constitute a team in this contest. Clubs/Chapters can enter individuals and/or teams. Contestants entered as individuals, and not teams, will be ineligible for Team Awards. Contestant names and birthdates will be submitted the morning of the contest at registration.

Team scores will be determined by the combined scores of the three (3) highest scoring individual team members. The contestant with the lower score will be designated as alternate, but will be eligible to receive individual awards.

Contestants will be notified of the classes requiring questions before placing that class. Contestants will have five (5) minutes to answer questions. No notes will be allowed while answering questions.

6. TIES: Ties will be broken using species question scores, overall question scores and overall score when breaking ties within species. Ties within questions will be broken by overall score and ties within overall score will be broken by overall questions. Scores tied after application of these tie breakers will be broken by a method determined by contest officials. No duplicate awards will be given.

7. SCORING: Scan sheets will be provided. All contestants must provide their own #2 pencil and may bring an unmarked clipboard and/or manila folder for use during the contest. Forms that are bent or abused will not be scored.

8. RESULTS: The contest results, as announced, will be final.

SPECIAL RULES

- 1. COLLEGE ELIGIBILITY: Junior colleges in the U.S. with agriculture departments are eligible to enter the Junior contest. Senior colleges in the U.S. which offer a degree in animal Science are eligible to enter the Senior contest. The entry application must be signed officially by the team coach, certifying that all team members are eligible for entry in this contest. Each college will be permitted to enter one team in the Senior Division, or one team in each Junior division.
- 2. JUNIOR TEAM: Each Junior team will consist of 5 members and all 5 scores will count for the team total. Each team member is eligible for individual awards in their division. Junior college individual participants designated as alternates will be eligible for individual overall awards in their division. Contestants must be regularly enrolled in a Junior (2 –year program) College and may not have credit for more than 66 semester hours or the equivalent. Contestants must have attended full time the previous semester at the school from which they are competing, or not attended and Junior College the previous semester, in order to be eligible to compete. Students must have a 2.0 GPA on a 4 point scale to be eligible.

a. Novice – Junior colleges may enter (1) team in this division. Contestants entered in this division may be eligible to complete in the Professional division in future contests. (Subject to other eligibility rules.)

b. Professional – Junior colleges may enter (1) team in this division. Contestants entered in this division must not have competed in the Junior College Professional Division in past years, and may be eligible to enter the Senior College Division in future contests.

- **3. SENIOR TEAM**: Each Senior College may enter 1 team consisting of 5 members and all 5 will count for the team total. Each team member is eligible for individual awards. Senior college individual participants designated as alternates will be eligible for individual overall awards. Contestants must be regularly enrolled in a Senior college which offers a degree in animal science. Students who have participated as contestants in senior intercollegiate livestock judging contests of interstate or international character previous to January 1 are not eligible to enter this contest. Contestants must have been regularly enrolled in their respective colleges the previous semester and must not have served any time as an animal science instructor at any secondary school or college.
- 4. BARN ENTRY: No contestant or coach will be permitted to enter the Show barns 24 hours prior to the contest.
- **5. ARENA SEATING**: Coaches and alternates will not be permitted in the seats of the arena while the contest is in progress. Coaches and alternates may be permitted to see the classes after the judging is completed.
- 6. CLASS MAKEUP: Each class will consist of four animals. Animals within a class will be designated by numbers 1, 2, 3 and 4. The following classes will be judged: a total of four sheep/goat classes (any combination of market lamb classes, market goat classes, breeding sheep classes (fine wool or medium wool), and/or breeding goat classes); a total of four to five classes of cattle (any combination of market steer classes and/or breeding cattle classes); and a total of three to four swine classes (any combination of market and/or breeding hogs). When available, records may be used for evaluation of breeding classes. Actual class makeup is subject to change within the aforementioned list of classes.
- 7. TIME: On each class of livestock, contestants will be allowed fifteen (15) minutes to make their observations, record their placings, and take such notes as will assist them in remembering the class when they appear before the judge. All groups will be notified two (2) minutes before the time is up. All contestants shall hand their cards bearing their number, class of animals, and placings, to the group leader immediately when called for by him. When final time is called, groups will change to other classes as directed by the Superintendent.

- 8. ORAL REASONS: After placing all classes in the contest, the contestants will appear singly before a judge to give oral reasons substantiating their placings on certain classes. Each contestant will be allowed two (2) minutes to give reasons on each class. No contestant will be allowed to hold any paper or device of any kind that will assist in stating reasons to the judge. Seniors 8 sets, Junior Professionals 8 sets, and Junior Novice 6 sets.
- **9. DRESS CODE**: No contestant will wear any uniform, college colors or belt buckle, or will in any way signify to the judge his/her identity or the identity of the college represented.
- **10. TALKING**: While the contest is in progress, there is to be no conferring between contestants or anyone else, except as directed by the Superintendent or his representative.
- **11. RULE VIOLATIONS**: Any coach or contestant who violates any of the rules of this contest will be barred from competing in future contests and their team will be disqualified for any awards.
- **12. TIES**: Ties will be broken using species reasons scores, overall reasons scores and overall score when breaking ties within species. Ties within reasons will be broken by overall score and ties within overall score will be broken by overall reasons. Scores tied after application of these tie breakers will be broken by a method determined by contest officials. No duplicate awards will be given.
- **13. SCORING**: Scan sheets used for scoring will be provided by the Fair. Standard rules that apply to optical scanning should be followed (blacken only one bubble per class, completely blacken the bubble, avoid stray marks). Each contestant must provide their own #2 pencil and may bring a clipboard for use during the contest. Forms that are abused will not be scored. Team number and contestant number are assigned at registration.
