GENERAL INFORMATION & RULES

WELCOME: The State Fair of Texas[®] (State Fair) encourages your participation in this year's Fair. The Fair staff looks forward to hosting you and your exhibits at Fair Park, and we welcome you to Dallas.

FAIR DATES: The 2015 State Fair of Texas (the Fair) will be held at Fair Park, Dallas, September 25 to October 18, unless postponed, shortened or extended by the Board of Directors, which they reserve the right to do if they deem it necessary for the general welfare of all concerned.

HOMELAND SECURITY/EMERGENCY EVACUATION OF LIVESTOCK/PROPERTY STATEMENT: During such time as deemed necessary by local, state or federal authorities, the State Fair of Texas, and/or its officials may, temporarily or permanently evacuate Fair Park under the authority of the Homeland Security Act. Incidents such as, but not limited to, extreme weather conditions, bomb threats, acts of war, declarations of war, code red of the Homeland Security System, etc., will be acted upon in accordance and cooperation with local, state and federal authorities. Priority evacuation will be given to human life, then livestock and/or property. In such cases, exhibitors will turn over the care of their livestock or property to State Fair, or as directed by governmental authorities. Proper animal husbandry practices will be followed within reasonable expectations. At such time the evacuation notice is lifted, exhibitors will be allowed to re-enter Fair Park and claim their livestock or property.

INTERPRETATION OF RULES: State Fair reserves to its Executive Committee the final and absolute right to interpret these General Rules and Regulations, the Youth Livestock Show Special Rules, and/or any applicable special requirements as published in this premium list (collectively, the "Rules") and to reasonably settle and determine all matters, questions and differences in regard thereto, or otherwise arising out of or connected with or incident to the Fair, and the right to amend or add to these rules as its judgment may determine. An exhibitor who violates any of the following rules may forfeit all privileges, fees paid and premiums and be subject to such penalty as the Executive Committee may order. The failure of the State Fair to enforce any of the provisions, rules, rights or remedies of this premium list or to exercise any options or sanctions herein provided will in no way be construed to be a waiver of such provisions, rules, rights, remedies, sanctions or options. Special rules or conditions are published in each department where necessary. If there is a conflict between the special rules or requirements of any department or division and the general rules and regulations, the special rules or requirements shall apply.

LIABILITY STATEMENT: All exhibitors and exhibits shall comply with the Rules of State Fair. State Fair shall not be liable to exhibitor for lost profit or other financial loss to exhibitor of any type or description including any special, indirect, reliance, incidental or consequential damages which may be caused directly or indirectly by the enforcement of such Rules, or for any time delays, inadequacies of services of State Fair or any use of the premises or by any deficiency or defect therein. Additionally, State Fair is not responsible for any loss, injury or damage caused by exhibitor or exhibitor's animal(s) that may arise directly or indirectly from exhibitor's participation at the Fair. Each exhibitor will be solely responsible for any such loss, injury or damage, whether to person or property, and shall indemnify State Fair, the City of Dallas and their officers, directors and employees against all legal proceedings arising there from.

DISCLAIMER OF WARRANTIES: State Fair expressly disclaims any express or implied warranties (including warranty of merchantability), whether the goods or services are provided by State Fair, its vendors or others (such as drug testing). State Fair does not provide special security or guard services for the livestock area and is not responsible for the acts of third parties. Exhibitor (and exhibitor's parent or legal guardian, if exhibitor is a minor) agree and acknowledge that State Fair will disqualify any exhibitor whose animal tests positive for ANY drug even if the exhibitor (and the exhibitor's parents/guardian) are innocent of any wrongdoing and had no role in the administration of the drug shown by the drug test. Even if the source of the drug is unknown, the State Fair shall be entitled to disqualify the exhibitor. Disqualification will result in the forfeiture of all auction proceeds and/or premiums, and the exhibitor may be prohibited from exhibiting livestock in future State Fair shows.

VETERINARIANS/MEDICATIONS: Animal under the care of a licensed veterinarian and/or taking ANY type of medication, including but not limited to steroids, diuretics, anti-inflammatories, tranquilizers and/or pain killers, are ineligible for competition. Exhibitors with questions regarding medications and/or eligibility should consult the Official State Fair Veterinarian prior to competition. Exhibitor (and exhibitor's parent or legal guardian, if exhibitor is a minor) agree and acknowledge that: (1) they are absolutely and solely responsible for the care and custody of their animals; (2) State Fair shall be entitled to disqualify an exhibitor whose animal(s) test positive for ANY medication, even if the exhibitor and the exhibitor's parents/guardians are innocent of any wrongdoing and did not administer the medication; and (3) the drug test results of the testing laboratories are final and binding upon the exhibitor and the exhibitor's parents/guardians.

PRESS INFORMATION: Members of the State Fair Agricultural Publicity Staff will be glad to furnish any information requested by representatives of newspapers, magazines, radio and television stations. Results of judging will be furnished as quickly as reasonably possible. All reasonable cooperation and assistance will be given to all representatives of the working press covering the State Fair. Facilities for the working press will be available through the State Fair's Public Relations Department.

FIRE REGULATIONS: Smoking is prohibited in and around any buildings, regardless of whether such building is open air or enclosed. No containers containing flammable liquids will be allowed in any buildings.

GUEST ASSISTANCE: It is the intention of State Fair that all visitors be welcomed and treated with courtesy and respect. Should guests experience problems with a State Fair employee or vendor, these concerns should be reported immediately to State Fair Management, so that the matter can be addressed before the Fair concludes.

FIRST AID STATION: State Fair will maintain a completely equipped First Aid Station staffed by registered nurses, paramedics and ambulances to provide emergency treatment and reference facilities for accidents and illnesses occurring in Fair Park. The First Aid Station is located on the Southwest side of Fair Park Coliseum, call (214)421-8723 for assistance. Management assumes no responsibility for accidents in Fair Park.

ENTRY REQUIREMENTS

- 1. SIGNED LIABILITY STATEMENT: Each exhibitor/contestant (and exhibitor's parent or legal guardian, if exhibitor is a minor) must sign a statement acknowledging that he/she understands and will abide by the liability requirements and all Rules of State Fair. If the exhibitor does not sign this statement (contained on the entry application forms), application for entry will be rejected.
- 2. ENTRY ELIGIBILITY: The State Fair does not discriminate against any applicant, volunteer, customer or patron on the basis of race, sex, color, age, disability, religion, citizenship, veteran status, nationality or ethnic origin. Competition in all Pan-American Livestock Exposition (open show) classes is open to the public, except where stated in this premium list. Competition in Youth Livestock Show classes is restricted. Refer to the Youth Livestock Show Special Rules for entry eligibility. Youth Show exhibitors are permitted to enter the Open Show when an additional entry application and entry fee is submitted by the entry deadline. Only animals officially entered will be allowed on the Fairgrounds.
 - a. TAX IDENTIFICATION: Each 4-H Club, FFA Chapter, Youth Exhibitor, and Open Exhibitor <u>MUST</u> complete an IRS Form W-9 and return it with entry applications.
 - **b.** ENTRY REQUIREMENTS: Exhibitor and their exhibits must meet and adhere to the requirements of these Rules and any and all Special Rules listed under the appropriate department(s) and division(s) as printed in this premium list to be eligible for entry.
 - c. **HEALTH REQUIREMENTS**: Please refer to the State Fair of Texas Animal Health Requirements listed in this premium list.
 - **d. FIRMS AND PARTNERSHIPS**: Firms and partnerships entering animals for competition must be in existence at the time of making entry and, in all cases, must be bona fide.
 - e. **REGISTRATION**: All animals in the breeding classes must be recorded in the recognized books of record for their respective breeds and exhibitors must produce a certificate of registry at the request of the management at any time during the Fair. Tattoos, ear tags or other identification marks must match registration certificates. See applicable special rules.
 - f. OWNERSHIP: To be eligible for competition, whether singly or in groups, animals must be the bona fide property of the exhibitor, and all animals entered for competition in the open breeding classes must be entered in the name of the owner and must have been owned prior to entry closing date. If proof of ownership is required, an affidavit must be furnished. Jointly owned animals must be entered and shown under the multi-ownership (all co-owners) in the individual classes. In the group classes, jointly owned animals may be entered and exhibited under the name of one of the co-owners provided he owns a full or part interest in each of the animals in the group entry.

3. INELIGIBLE TO ENTER:

- a. **DISQUALIFIED EXHIBITORS**: State Fair reserves the right to refuse entry of any contestant for violation of these Rules. Contestants who have previously been disqualified from State Fair shows will not be allowed entry until the time expressed to them by the Executive Committee of State Fair.
- **b. DISEASED ANIMALS**: Diseased animals cannot enter the State Fair livestock area or grounds. Animal Health Officials, Superintendents, the Official State Fair Veterinarian, and/or State Fair Management will refuse unloading privileges to animals showing signs and symptoms of disease.
- c. BARREN ANIMALS: Barren animals are not eligible for breeding classes. An affidavit verifying the animal is a breeder must be furnished upon request.

4. ENTRY PROCEDURE:

- a. ENTRY APPLICATION: All applications for entry must be made on current, official State Fair of Texas entry application forms in accordance with instructions on same, giving division, class, and all other necessary information. Exhibitors may also enter online at www.bigtex.com. All youth entries must be submitted online by the CEA/AST. (See Youth Livestock Show Special Rules)
- b. GROUP ENTRIES: Group classes are denoted by a "G" after the class number. An additional entry fee may be required for group classes, see individual department rules and regulations. <u>Group class entries will not be accepted after the registration check deadline</u>. NO ANIMALS WILL BE ALLOWED TO ENTER AT THE SHOW RING. All animals entered in a group class must be shown in their respective individual age class. The dam, sire, or breeder represented MUST be named on the entry application. Limit one entry per class.
- c. **DOUBLE ENTRIES**: If the exhibitor chooses to show in both the youth and open shows, separate fees are required. Only animals entered in the Youth Breeding Shows may enter the open show.
- d. ENTRY ACCEPTANCE: In all cases, the management reserves the right to reject, accept, or accept conditionally an application for entry and does not guarantee space in the exhibition buildings. Rejected entries may be returned to the applicant.
- e. ENTRY SUBSTITUTIONS: Entry substitutions may be made within the same department/division and by the same owner of the original entry. The substitution may be made after the entry deadline without a late fee if the entry information for the substituted animal is provided to State Fair Management at the time of check in. NO SUBSTITUTIONS WILL BE ALLOWED AFTER THE CHECK IN DEADLINE.
- f. **ERRONEOUS ENTRIES**: At the discretion of State Fair Management, exhibits that have been erroneously entered may be transferred to their proper classes prior to judging. State Fair Management will decide the disposition of each case of erroneous entry upon its merits.
- g. **INCOMPLETE ENTRIES**: Incomplete entries are defined as entries made by entry deadline (online, if required) but are missing signatures, W-9's, payment, or other required information and may be accepted conditionally.
- 5. ENTRY DEADLINES: Entries must be postmarked by the U.S., Canadian, or International Postal Service no later than the applicable deadline date. Postal metered date is not acceptable.
 - a. Youth show entries must be submitted <u>online by midnight, August 25th</u>. The following must be also be postmarked on or before September 1.
 - 1. One check per county/chapter
 - 2. One W-9 per exhibitor
 - 3. One Release and Liability Signature form per exhibitor
 - 4. One W-9 per county/chapter
 - 5. One Summary Sheet per county/chapter
 - **b.** Open show entries will be accepted after the September 1, 2015 deadline with additional late fees.
 - c. Contest (public speaking, judging, etc) and rabbit show entries need to be postmarked by September 15,.
 - **d.** Late Fees will be assessed to any entry postmarked after applicable entry deadline (see Miscellaneous Fees). State Fair Management may reject any late entry without explanation.
- 6. ENTRY FEES: All applications for entry must be accompanied by all entry and related fees. If the entry does not have fees enclosed, the application for entry will not be accepted or accepted conditionally. All international exhibitors must pay fees in certified United States currency. Entry fees are not stall fees and do not dictate stall space.

d. COMPLIMENTARY TRAILER PARKING:

The Trailer Parking Lot is locate east of the Pennsylvania Avenue Gate and is monitored by security personnel. State Fair assumes no responsibility for vehicles or trailers parked in this lot. No trailers will be allowed to park on grounds. Official Release will be required to remove trailer from lot (See specific departments/divisions for release times).

10. RETURNED CHECKS: Any exhibitor issuing a check for payment of entries, stalls or passes which does not clear their account for any reason will have five (5) days in which to make payment to keep entries eligible to participate in the Fair shows with a \$35.00 returned check fee assessed.

11. REFUNDS:

- **a.** Entry Fees for competitive events are refundable when written notification of cancellation is postmarked prior to the applicable entry deadline.
- **b.** Admission and parking pass fees are refundable when written notification of cancellation is received prior to the opening day of the Fair. Admission and parking passes must be returned with the written notification.
- c. All refund requests must be made for amounts greater than \$20.00.
- **d.** Refunds will be forwarded to the entry applicant as soon after the close of the Fair as they can be properly processed. Cash refunds are payable by bank check. All refunds, whatsoever, not claimed within 90 days upon receipt, shall be deemed forfeited to State Fair.

COMPETITION

12. JUDGES:

- a. SELECTION OF JUDGES: Judges will be selected by State Fair Management. Judges will be familiar with all Rules of the State Fair.
- **b.** JUDGES' DECISION: The judges' decisions are final. See Rule 13 for protest details.
- c. Interference With Judges: If any exhibitor, in any way, whether in person or by their representative, interferes with the judge(s), or shows any disrespect to them or to show officials, State Fair management may excuse him/her from the ring and disqualify them from further competition; exhibitor premiums that may have been awarded may also be forfeited.

13. PROTESTS:

- **a. FILING**: All protests must be in writing and accompanied by a deposit of \$300.00, cash or certified check, which will be forfeited if protest is not sustained. Such protest must state plainly the cause of the complaint or appeal and must be delivered to State Fair Management immediately after the occasion for such protest.
 - 1. Protests will be accepted prior to, during and within 2 hours immediately following the conclusion of judging.
 - Any protest as to the eligibility on account of age or breeding of animals must be filed with the management prior to the day on which they are to be judged.
 - **3.** No protests will be accepted for over looked entries.
- **b. INVESTIGATION**: Judging procedures will not be interrupted for protest investigation; and depending on the basis of the protest, a decision may be withheld until a thorough investigation is completed.

14. SHOW RING COMPETITION:

- a. Humane Treatment: Exhibitors are to treat animals in a humane manner at all times. Show Management will provide a warning to any exhibitor deemed to be in violation of this basic principle of animal husbandry. Any exhibitor who fails to heed the warning will be disqualified and removed from show grounds. Show Instruments (ex: show sticks, driving sticks, bats, etc.) are to be used for the purpose of directing animals while they are in transit throughout the barn and while they are being exhibited in the show ring.
- **b. COMMUNICATION DEVICES: NO** electronic/communication devices are allowed in the show ring. This includes cell phones, PDA's, laptops, walkie-talkies, and other communication devices.
- **c. ENTRY NUMBER**: Each entry in the Pan-Am and Youth Livestock Shows will be assigned an entry number. This number will identify animals in the show and will correspond with the numbers in the Official Judge's Book and must be displayed by exhibitors when the entries are being judged.
- d. METHOD OF AWARDING: No animal will be awarded a prize unless removed from its stall or pen and exhibited, with entry number, before the judge(s) in the show ring. The management reserves the right to return entries and cancel any class in which, in its judgment, the numbers of entries are insufficient to insure adequate competition. Where there are fewer entries in a class than the number of premiums offered, the judge(s) may, at their discretion, award a prize or prizes of such grade as the animal merits.
- e. TIME OF JUDGING: The Livestock Schedule, as published in this premium list, will be followed as closely as possible. Exhibitors should ascertain at what time the exhibits entered will be judged. Judging will not be

delayed for exhibitors entering the show ring late. Any exhibit not presented promptly at the scheduled time will be ruled out and excluded from competition when the class is called.

- f. JUDGING CONTESTS: When an exhibitor is called upon to furnish one or more animals for any judging contest(s), he or she will cooperate with State Fair Management. Refusing to allow an animal to be used in this manner, without State Fair Management approval, will result in the forfeit of any prizes or such other action as State Fair Management deems necessary. Selection will be made under the direction of the department superintendent(s).
- **g. DISQUALIFICATION**: If an exhibit is disqualified after having won awards or premiums, the exhibits placing below it WILL NOT be moved up to fill the vacated position. There will be no refund of any fees due to disqualification.
- **h. UNWORTHY EXHIBIT**: Judges shall not award a prize to an unworthy exhibit. It is the intention of the management that no premium or distinction of any kind shall be given to any exhibit that is not deserving.
- **15. PHOTOGRAPHS**: Photographs of Champion and Reserve Champion exhibits will be taken by the Official Photographer of State Fair. Exhibitors of Champion and Reserve Champion winners must make themselves and their exhibits available for the taking of official photographs. Exhibitor hereby grants State Fair permission to utilize photograph, image or likeness in whole or in part for use in official State Fair publications and promotions.
- 16. PREMIUM PAYOUT: Total premiums will be paid by State Fair unless otherwise stated. Premiums will be forwarded to designated person(s) as directed, as soon after the close of the Fair as they can properly be processed. Cash premiums are payable by bank check. Checks will be made payable to the exhibitor listed on the entry form. All premiums whatsoever, not claimed within 90 days upon receipt, shall be deemed forfeited to State Fair. State Fair reserves the right to withhold premiums awarded in every case in which it shall appear to the State Fair Management that the Rules have not been complied with, or that fraud or deception has been practiced or attempted.

COMPETITION EXHIBITS

- **17. HEALTH REQUIREMENT:** All animals entering Fair Park must comply with the requirements as determined by the Texas Animal Health Commission. An original Certificate of Veterinary Inspection must accompany animals, be made available to animal health officials and/or show management upon arrival, and kept available with exhibit at all times during the show. (See TAHC Requirements.)
- 18. STALLS/BEDDING: Stall space will only be assigned for animals that arrive on the grounds. Animals entered, but not arriving on the grounds will not receive stall space or first bedding. Assigned stalls will be pre-bed upon arrival or exhibitors will be provided a coupon that may be exchanged for first bedding material through the State Fair of Texas Feed Office on the grounds on the day of arrival only. Only bagged or baled wood shavings or chips and small square baled straw, in very limited quantities for an individual exhibitors use as first bedding, will be permitted on the grounds and the same will be available from the State Fair of Texas Feed Office. All additional bedding must be purchased from the State Fair of Texas Feed Office. Special and specific stall requests must be submitted on the Stall Request Form included in this premium list by September 15. There is no guarantee that any stall request can or will be honored.
- 19. FEED/HAY: Feed grains of all types, along with several kinds of hay, will be available, at reasonable prices, through the State Fair of Texas Feed Office on the grounds. Exhibitors are not allowed to bring large quantities of feed, bedding or hay onto the grounds. However, exhibitors who must use their own feed will be allowed to bring the feed on grounds in limited amounts on a daily use basis.
- **20.** ANIMAL/EXHIBITOR DISQUALIFICATION: In order to foster fair competition, provide a level playing field and protect the safety of the food chain, the showing of unethically fitted livestock, livestock of any ineligible age for exhibition in the class entered, and/or animals being administered unapproved drugs is strictly prohibited. Additionally, any animal that has been administered a drug, even though that drug is FDA approved for its species, is subject to disqualification if that animal tests positive for that drug once it has arrived at State Fair and/or participated in State Fair shows. All animals must remain free and clear of all drug and chemical residues while on State Fair grounds.
 - a. **UNETHICAL FITTING**: Unethical fitting means any attempt to alter the natural appearance, conformation, musculature or weight of an animal by any unnatural means. Animals showing any signs of being unethically fitted will be disgualified. Examples of unethical fitting include, but are not limited to the following:
 - Application of any substance to any part of the animal's body, unless specifically allowed in the department rules of that entry
 - Use of injection
 - Draining of fluids
 - Bruising
 - Feeding of material not conducive to the health of the animal, safety of food or marketability of its carcass
 - Surgical alterations
 - Artificially filling animals by stomach pumping or airing injections

- b. **OVER AGE ANIMALS**: Over age animals will be disqualified.
- c. **UNAPPROVED DRUG USE**: The showing of an animal that during its life has been administered any quantity of any unapproved drug, chemical or medication is strictly prohibited. Such drugs include, but are not limited to, any diuretic, unapproved growth stimulant or other unapproved medication. Unapproved means not approved by the FDA and/or the USDA for slaughter animals of a species, including animals that may be destined for human consumption.
- d. **APPROVED DRUG USE**: If an animal has been administered a drug that is FDA approved for its species, sufficient time must have passed so that the animal does not test positive for that drug upon arrival at the Fairgrounds. Animals must remain free and clear of all drug and chemical residues while on the Fairgrounds and/or participating in State Fair shows. Please note that elimination time (the time it takes for no drug residue to be found in the system) is generally longer than the labeled withdrawal time for most approved drugs.
- е ANIMAL INSPECTION: As condition for participation in the State Fair shows, exhibitor agrees to submit any animal entered by the exhibitor for inspection by any veterinarian or show official appointed by State Fair Management. Exhibitor also agrees to have such animal submitted to any tests requested by State Fair. Exhibitor also agrees that the opinion reached by State Fair or its officials as to whether such animal is unethically fitted or over age shall be final and binding without recourse against State Fair, its officials or any of its appointed veterinarians. Further, State Fair specifically reserves the right to have ultrasound, D.N.A., tissue, blood or urine laboratory analysis made on any animal entered for State Fair competition. The conclusions reached by the veterinarian or laboratory shall be final and binding without recourse against State Fair, its officials or any of its appointed veterinarians. An exhibitor of an animal that is found to be unethically fitted, over age, and/or testing positive for any drug or medication or unapproved chemical may forfeit all titles, awards, auction proceeds, premiums, scholarships, as well as rights and privileges to exhibit livestock in the future at the Fair. Exhibitor waives any cause of action which he/she might have for any action taken under these Rules, and releases State Fair and any appointed veterinarian from any and all claims or demands whatsoever in connection with the inspection or testing of any such animal or any ruling or action taken by reason of the conclusion of such veterinarian.
- f. **UNMANAGEABLE ANIMALS**: State Fair may disqualify any animal deemed unmanageable.
- g. **NON-ADHERENCE TO THE RULES**: Any person found guilty of misrepresentation or not abiding by the Rules in this premium list will be disqualified and denied the privilege of showing at the Fair.
- h. **EMERGENCY TREATMENT**: If an animal requires emergency treatment while on State Fairgrounds, only a licensed veterinarian will be allowed to administer any drug, chemical or feed additive. An exhibitor may choose a licensed veterinarian other than the Official State Fair Veterinarian, but the Official State Fair Veterinarian MUST be notified in advance and he/she MUST be present. Animals which are administered treatments with a withdrawal or extended elimination time period will be disqualified from competition. Furthermore, the Official State Fair Veterinarian, in agreement with State Fair Management, reserves the right to treat any animal if, in the opinion of the Official State Fair Veterinarian; it is in the best interest of the animal's health and well-being to be treated. If the Official State Fair Veterinarian administers treatment to an animal, and therefore uses any medication that does not meet the appropriate withdrawal and/or elimination time, such animal will be determined ineligible for competition.
- i. **TREATMENT COSTS**: All treatment costs are the responsibility of the exhibitor.
- j. **DISQUALIFICATION/CONDEMNATION OF ANIMAL**: State Fair practices a "zero tolerance" policy on all residue violations. State Fair reserves the right to condemn and/or disqualify any animal, either live or slaughtered, found in violation of the Rules, and the exhibitor will forfeit all auction sale and/or premium money if the animal is disqualified. If an animal(s) is disqualified, the class placing will not change. A disqualified exhibitor may forfeit all rights and privileges to exhibit livestock in the future at the Fair, as well as any and all State Fair scholarship opportunities. Disqualifications due to violations of State Fair Rules as stated in this premium list or the Entry Certification, Release and Indemnity agreement and any consequences will be decided by State Fair Management. These decisions may be appealed to State Fair's Executive Committee from whose decision there can be no further appeal.
- **21. POSTMORTEM EXAMINATIONS:** The City of Dallas and State Fair require a postmortem examination of any animal or poultry which dies during the Fair. This examination must be performed by the Official State Fair Veterinarian at the expense of the exhibitor.
- **22. CONDUCT**: Any exhibitors or their representatives not cooperating with State Fair officials in all matters, while on the Fair grounds, will have their entries disqualified and will be ordered to remove their exhibit from the grounds immediately and may lose the opportunity to participate in future competitions.
- **23. GROOMING**: Animals are to be shown in natural conformation and color, except where stated otherwise in this premium list. Any product used externally to alter the conformation and/or appearance of an animal for exhibition is prohibited. This includes, but is not limited to, false hair, artificial color, adhesives, or other similar substances.
- 24. MUZZLES: Muzzles must be cloth, nylon or similar material. NO METAL MUZZLES.
- **25. DRENCHING:** Drench guns may not be used in any stall/pen, aisle or walkway. Stomach pumping, drench tubes or any other method per os (by esophagus) is prohibited.

26. RELEASE: Entries must be on exhibit at the official opening of the Fair or any other time specified in the premium list and shall not be removed from the Fairgrounds prior to the release date printed in the premium list, except at the discretion of State Fair Management.

DISPLAYS AND NON-LIVESTOCK EXHIBITS

- **27. DISPLAYS:** All displays/exhibits must remain in assigned space and out of pedestrian aisles. All curtains, drapes, decorations, merchandise, or material must be Non-Combustible or Flame Proof. Fire Marshalls will inspect exhibits and ask you to remove any materials that they believe is a fire hazard.
- 28. CARE OF EXHIBITS/PROPERTY: All owners or others in charge of livestock, poultry or other property shall care for, guard, protect and preserve the same, as State Fair does not undertake to do so, and it shall not be held responsible for any loss or damage to said property, poultry or livestock. State Fair does not provide special security or guard services for the livestock area and is not responsible for the acts of third parties.
- 29. OBJECTIONABLE EXHIBITS: State Fair Management, in its sole and reasonable discretion, reserves the right to remove from the Fairgrounds any exhibit, animal, stand or display that may be falsely entered, or may be deemed unsuitable or objectionable. State Fair will refund any money already paid by the removed exhibitor which shall exonerate the State Fair from any claims whatsoever on the part of such removed exhibitor.
- **30. ADVERTISING**: No person will be permitted to distribute any literature or advertising materials on the Fair grounds, except from a valid contracted exhibit space. The tacking or posting of any advertisement, bills, etc., other than within the exhibit space as defined by State Fair is strictly prohibited. The distribution of handbills, fliers and heralds will not be permitted. Nothing shall be sold or given away or otherwise disposed of by exhibitors which will in any way conflict with, or which is subject matter of, any privilege or concession granted or sold by State Fair.
- 31. CLEANUP: All stalls, pens and exhibition places must be cleaned before 7:00 a.m. each day and refuse matter disposed of as directed by State Fair Management. For those exhibitors refusing to keep their stalls, pens and/or exhibits clean and neat, State Fair Management reserves the right to have said stalls or pens properly cleaned with the cost to be charged against the exhibitor. Said cost will be collected from the exhibitor before release is issued.
- **32. EQUIPMENT**: Any equipment brought in must be used in assigned stalls or space and must comply with and be used in compliance with all federal, state and municipal occupational safety and health regulations. Some equipment may require a special permit and a fee to be paid before being utilized on grounds.
 - a. SCALES: State Fair will provide scales for the use of exhibitors during shows that classes are broken by weight. NO OTHER SCALES will be allowed on the Fairgrounds.
 - b. FANS: Fans are not allowed in any pedestrian aisle. No rear fans are allowed. No exceptions.
 - c. **GENERATORS**: City of Dallas Fire Prevention Code prohibits liquid or gas fired portable generators or other equipment in livestock facilities in all enclosed structural areas. No liquefied petroleum-fueled or flammable or combustible liquid-fuel generators or other devices will be allowed.
 - d. **GROOMING/TRIM CHUTES**: Chutes will be allowed with appropriate permit. Chutes must remain in assigned stall space and may not be placed in any aisle or walkway.
- **33. DOGS:** Dogs are not allowed on Fairgrounds, except service dogs aiding sight impaired or physically challenged persons, or dogs under contract with State Fair.
- 34. NURSE COWS: Nurse cows are not allowed on Fairgrounds.

STATE FAIR OF TEXAS ANIMAL HEALTH SUMMARY OF REQUIREMENTS Effective: June, 2015 THESE REGULATIONS ARE SUBJECT TO CHANGE AT ANY TIME.

The following summary is a condensed version of the Texas Animal Health Commission regulations. The regulations will supersede this summary if there is a dispute between the two. FOR MORE INFORMATION, contact the Texas Animal Health Commission by calling (512)719-0777 (24 hours) or 1(800)550-8242, ext. 777, or by writing the TAHC, P.O. Box 12966, Austin, TX 78711-2966.

The State Fair of Texas® Youth Livestock Shows are restricted to intrastate entries. The Pan-American Livestock Exposition® and State Fair of Texas Horse Shows are open, interstate shows, accepting entries of livestock, equine and poultry from within Texas, other states, and other countries.

<u>Certificate of Veterinary Inspection</u> The certificate must indicate that the accredited veterinarian found the animals or fowl to be free of symptoms or evidence of communicable disease and that all tests, immunizations or treatments required by the Commission were completed. For certain diseases, a specific statement may be required indicating disease free status. The certificate is required to accompany animals and fowl entering the State of Texas and Fair Park as stated in the following summary of entry requirements.

THE CERTIFICATE IS VALID FOR 30 DAYS FOR ALL SPECIES.

<u>Prior Entry Permit</u> Entry permits are required as noted in the following summary of entry requirements. Permits may be obtained by calling (512)719-0777 (24 hours) or 1(800)550-8242, ext. 777, or by writing TAHC, P. O. Box 12966, Austin, TX 78711-2966. The permit for entry is not required when livestock and ratites enter for the exhibition and return to the state of origin. All poultry entering Texas must be permitted.

CATTLE (BEEF & DAIRY) Texas Origin Breeding Cattle

(not including Youth Market and Prospect Steers)

- 1. Certificate of Veterinary Inspection current, within 30 (thirty) days.
- 2. All dairy cattle must be identified with official ID and recorded on the certificate of veterinary inspection.
- 3. Any bulls changing ownership, more than 18 months, must have a negative trichomoniasis test within 60 days. (Does not apply to exhibition only Bulls)

Out-of-State Origin Cattle

- 1. Must meet the same requirements as Texas Origin Breeding Cattle.
- 2. Negative tuberculosis (TB) test within 60 days for all sexually intact dairy cattle that are 2 months of age or older or originate from an accredited tuberculosis free herd. In addition, all sexually intact dairy cattle originating from a state or area with anything less than a tuberculosis free state status shall be tested negative for tuberculosis in accordance with the appropriate requirements for states or areas for that status, prior to entry with results of the test recorded on the certificate of veterinary inspection.
- 3. All bulls entering Texas for the purpose of participating at fairs, shows, exhibitions and/or rodeos and returning to the state of origin, which are more than (12) months of age and capable of breeding may enter the state without testing for trichomoniasis, but shall obtain a permit prior to entry into the state. Bulls permitted for entry into the State of Texas under the provisions of this subsection shall not be commingled with female cattle or used for breeding. Bulls that stay in the state more than sixty (60) days must be tested negative for trichomoniasis with one official Polymerase Chain Reaction (PCR) test.
- 4. **The Permit for Entry** is not required when cattle enter for exhibition and return to the state of origin, except for exhibition bulls that do not meet TAHC's Trich entry Requirements.
- 5. All sexually intact cattle entering Texas for exhibition purposes and originating from Idaho, Montana or Wyoming must be individually identified and must have a statement on the certificate of veterinary inspection that the animals have never resided in the DSA

<u>EQUINE</u> Texas Origin Equine

1. **Negative equine infectious anemia (EIA) test** (also known as "Coggins Test") within 12 (twelve) months. In state origin equine: foals, under eight months of age, nursing a negative dam are exempt from testing. Test document must be in hand or test results and related information must be shown on the certificate of veterinary inspection.

2.

a. A Certificate of Veterinary Inspection, current, and issued within 30 days, and an EIA test is <u>REQUIRED.</u>

Pre-Fair: August 14-September 20, 2015

b. Exhibitors showing between the dates of August 14- Sept. 20, are required to provide a Certificate of Veterinary Inspection, <u>ONLY</u>, if a horse originates within a 50 mile radius of a specific location that has been identified/quarantined for Vesicular Stomatitis VS/EHV1. An EIA test is still <u>REQUIRED</u> for all horses.

Out of State Origin Equine

- 1. Certificate of Veterinary Inspection, current, issued within 30 (thirty) days or a current, valid equine interstate passport or equine identification card, issued within 6 (six) months.
- 2. Must meet the same requirements as for Texas Origin Equine.

<u>GOATS</u>

Texas Origin Goats & Out of State Origin Goats (not including Youth Market Goats)

- 1. Certificate of Veterinary Inspection, current, within 30 (thirty) days.
- 2. Texas All sexually intact exhibition goats must be officially identified with a Scrapie Eradication Program eartag prior to entry, except registered goats with a registration tattoo and accompanied by registration papers.
- 3. Out of State All exhibition goats must be officially identified with a Scrapie Eradication Program eartag prior to entry, except registered goats with a registration tattoo and accompanied by registration papers along with a scrapie premise ID number.

YOUTH MARKET GOATS

Youth Market Goats are **NOT** required to have a Certificate of Veterinary Inspection.

LLAMAS (Camelidae)

Refer to Exotic Livestock and Ratites

POULTRY Texas Origin Poultry (not including Youth Market Broilers)

- 1. **Negative pullorum-typhoid test** within 30 (thirty) days or from flocks that meet either the Texas Pullorum-Typhoid Program or the National Poultry Improvement Plan (NPIP).
- 2. Poultry must originate from areas where reportable avian diseases are not known to have been active within the last 30 (thirty) days.

Out of State Origin Poultry

NO OUT OF STATE POULTRY ENTRIES PERMITTED.

Youth Market Broilers

Youth Market Broilers are **NOT** required to have a Certificate of Veterinary Inspection.

<u>SHEEP</u> Texas Origin Sheep (not including Youth Market Lambs)

- 1. Certificate of Veterinary Inspection issued within 30 (thirty) days.
- 2. All sexually intact exhibition sheep must be officially identified with a Scrapie Eradication Program eartag.

Out of State Origin Sheep

- 1. Must meet the same requirements as for Texas Origin Sheep.
- 2. All exhibition sheep must be officially identified with a Scrapie Eradication Program eartag prior to entry.
- 3. **Negative ELISA brucella ovis test** within 30 (thirty) days for all breeding rams 6 months of age or older. Each ram shall be individually identified with an individual eartag or registration tattoo. This number, along with the test results and name of the approved laboratory and date of test, shall be entered on the certificate of veterinary inspection.

Youth Market Lambs

Youth Market Lambs are NOT required to have a Certificate of Veterinary Inspection.

SWINE Texas Origin Swine (not including Youth Market Swine)

1. **Certificate of Veterinary Inspection** current, within 30 (thirty) days listing identification and including a statement that they have not been fed garbage, have not been exposed to pseudorabies, have not been vaccinated for pseudorabies, and have not originated from a premises known to be affected by Novel Swine Enteric Coronavirus Disease(s) (SECD), and have not been exposed to SECD within the last 30 days.

2. Leptospirosis vaccination is required on breeding swine, 6 months of age and older, within 30 (thirty) days with Leptospirosis vaccine containing the following strains: Canicola, Hardjo, Icterohaemorrhagiae, Grippotoyphosa, and Pomona.

Out of State Origin Swine

- 1. Must meet the same requirements as Texas Origin Swine.
- 2. Permanent Identification is required on all swine except swine designated to slaughter.

Youth Market Swine

Certificate of Veterinary Inspection is desirable, but not required for this terminal show. All youth market swine entering the grounds must be in good health and disease free.

EXOTIC LIVESTOCK AND RATITES

Exotic Livestock are defined as grass-eating or plant-eating, single hooved or cloven-hooved mammals that are not indigenous to this state and are known as ungulates, including animals from the swine, horse, tapir, camel, llama, rhinoceros, elephant, deer, and antelope families.

Camelidae are defined as members of the family of animals which include camel, llamas, and vicunas. The domestic members of the genus lama include the llama, alpaca, and guanaco.

Ratites are defined as exotic fowl with a flat breast-bone and small or nonexistent wings, such as ostriches, emu, rheas, and kiwi.

Exotic bovidae are defined as non-indigenous members of the family of animals which includes water buffalo, gnu (wildebeest), addax, antelope and nilgai (among others).

Exotic cervidae are defined as non-indigenous members of the family of animals which includes deer, elk, moose, caribou, reindeer and the sub-family musk deer.

Texas Origin Camelidae

Certificate of Veterinary Inspection current, within 30 (thirty) days.

Texas Origin Ratites

1. Certificate of Veterinary Inspection current, within 30 (thirty) days.

2. Individually identified with an implanted electronic device (microchip), tag or band. The identification will be shown on the certificate of veterinary inspection along with the location and name brand of the implanted electronic device. If an animal has more than one implanted microchip, then the location, microchip number, and name brand of each will be documented on the certificate of veterinary inspection; and 3. Tested and found to be serologically negative for Avian Influenza and Salmonella pullorum-typhoid from a sample collected within 30 days of entry. Birds or hatching eggs must originate from flocks that show no evidence of infectious disease and have no history of Avian Influenza in the past six months.

Texas Origin Exotic Bovidae

- 1. Certificate of Veterinary Inspection current, within 30 (thirty) days.
- 2. Negative brucellosis test within the past 30 (thirty) days.
- 3. Negative tuberculosis test within the past 60 (sixty) days.

Texas Origin Exotic Cervidae

- 1. Certificate of Veterinary Inspection current, within 30 (thirty) days.
- 2. Negative brucellosis test within the past 30 (thirty) days.
- 3. **TWO Negative tuberculosis tests** conducted no less than 90 (ninety) days apart the second test must be conducted within 90 (ninety) days prior to the date of movement; and the animals must be isolated from all other members of the herd during the testing period, or;
 - A. Originate from an accredited free herd, or;
 - B. Originated from a qualified herd and have a classified negative 90 (ninety) day tuberculosis test. If the qualifying herd test was administered within 90 (ninety) days of movement, the animal(s) do not require an additional test, or;
 - C. Originate from a monitored herd and have a classified negative 90 (ninety) day tuberculosis test, or;
 - D. Be less than 12 (twelve) months of age, originate and were born in accredited, qualified, or monitored herds and have not been exposed to cervids from a lower status.

Texas Origin Exotic Swine

- 1. Certificate of Veterinary Inspection current, within 30 (thirty) days.
- 2. Negative brucellosis test within the past 30 (thirty) days or originate from a validated free herd.
- 3. Negative pseudorabies test within the past 30 (thirty) days or originate from a qualified free herd.

Out of State Origin Exotic Livestock and Ratites

Must meet the same requirements as Texas Origin Exotic Livestock and Ratites.

DOGS

DOGS ARE NOT ALLOWED ON THE FAIR GROUNDS because of safety and public health regulations. This rule will be strictly enforced and applies to exhibitors and their employees, as well as to State Fair visitors. This rule does not apply to official dog entries in a sanctioned State Fair of Texas competitive and/or entertainment event or to guide dogs for those with sight impairment. A Certificate of Veterinary Inspection current within 30 days is required to accompany all dogs eligible to enter Fair Park. Certificate must state that the dog has had a rabies vaccination within 1 year.

- 1. **RULES/REGULATIONS**: Entries made in this department shall be subject to and each exhibitor agrees to abide by the General Rules and Regulations as published in this premium list.
- 2. ENTRY APPLICATION/FEE: An entry application and fee must be submitted by entry deadline. All fees must accompany online or mailed in applications for entry or mailed in signature forms. This fee is not a stall fee. A show fee in addition to the State Fair of Texas entry fee may be levied by a breed association or group. Late entries will be accepted until September 15, for a late entry fee per head, equal to two times the regular entry fee per head.
- **3.** ENTRY LIMITATION: No exhibitor shall be permitted to show more than two animals or one group of animals in any one class. All animals shown in a group class must be shown in their individual age class.
- 4. ADMISSION/PARKING: No complimentary admission will be available. All exhibitors are requested to purchase a section admission pass good for the duration of each show entered. Complimentary parking passes will be given to exhibitors entering 6 or more head in any one section. Please see "Admission and Parking" in the General Rules Section of this Premium List. When a request for Certified Mail is indicated on the entry application and the certified mail fee is included with all other fees, passes will be mailed to the exhibitor. Livestock personnel at the Animal Health Office will issue prepaid passes, not mailed, to the driver of vehicles with livestock upon arrival.
- 5. OWNERSHIP: Exhibitors entering an animal in any other name rather than the name of the bona fide owner or owners, or showing an animal in a class for which it is not eligible, may, at the sole discretion of the livestock vice president, be barred from further showing, and any or all premiums previously awarded may be forfeited. Animals owned in partnership may be entered in proper classes in one owner's name, but must appear under this ownership name in all classes entered.
- 6. **REGISTRATION**: Each animal shown in this division must be registered. An original certificate of registration must be presented to the superintendent at the registration check and kept available at all times during the show for each animal exhibited. Application for transfer and pending registration will not be accepted.
- 7. TIE OUTS: A limited number of tie out spaces will be sold on a first come first serve basis. Tie outs may be purchased at time of entry or from the Livestock Office. Tie outs will be assigned upon arrival when the exhibitor provides proof of purchase to the superintendent. Cattle will not be removed to tie outs until 7:00 PM daily. Cattle are limited to the assigned tie-out areas. Special provisions may be made for those breeds that have special requests which are submitted to the livestock and/or beef cattle superintendent in writing, prior to the start of the show. Tie-out fees must be paid for, in advance, before using tie-outs.
- 8. FANS: No fans permitted in any pedestrian aisle. No rear fans permitted. No exceptions.
- 9. GENERATORS: No generators permitted.
- **10. GROOMING CHUTES**: Chutes may be brought on the grounds during the beef cattle shows provided a permit is purchased. Fee is to be paid at the time entries are made. Space for chutes will be in stalls or outside cattle buildings. No chutes permitted in any pedestrian aisle.
- 11. RELEASE: Releases will be written upon arrival according to release times specific to each breed.

DEPARTMENT REQUIREMENTS

American Angus Association, 3201 Frederick Blvd., St. Joseph, MO 64506, (816) 383-5100, will participate in premiums offered for open Angus breeding cattle classes according to the premium schedule based on the number of head shown. The premium assistance provided by the American Angus Association for participation in this show is in addition to the premiums offered by the show itself. The Association contributions will be included in the premium checks issued by the show.

- 1. A minimum of fifty (50) head must be shown in the open class division to receive American Angus Association premium participation for the following year.
- 2. Premiums from the association are paid only to registered Angus cattle and only if the registration number is a part of the show report provided to the Association. Therefore, all cattle should be registered at the time of entry to make certain they receive the association's portion of premiums. The association does not pay a percentage on premiums offered in championship classes.
- Exhibitors must have the original registration certificate on each animal available for inspection at the show. Electronically stored registration certificates are NOT accepted – only the original certificates issued by the American Angus Association.
- 4. Any female shown with calf at side, calf must be the cow's most recent natural calf and the calf must be registered by show date and have the original registration certificate at check in.
- 5. Only one person at a time shall lead animals into the show ring.
- 6. Exhibitors who participate in shows that accept premium monies contributed by the American Angus Association are subject to the Association Rules as found in the Breeders Reference Guide of the Association. These rules are found in Part 2; Association Rules. The rules relating directly with the exhibition of Angus cattle are Part 2: Association Rules; Rule 800 Series; including Rule 800-810. These rules can be found at www.angus.org.
- 7. Altering the conformation and/or appearance of an animal for exhibition is prohibited. This includes the covering of white skin, false tail heads (or use of any false hair), with the exception of false tail switches. The use of graphite, powders, hemp or other similar substances used externally are also prohibited. Other prohibited products include those used internally such as steroids, illegal or unlicensed pharmaceuticals or artificial filling. Any animal found to be in violation will be barred from showing.
- 8. At any show for which the American Angus Association appropriates funds toward the payment of premiums, no exhibitors, individuals assisting exhibitors or member owners at such show shall be allowed to use any coloring agents, on any animal exhibited. The Association may adopt and implement various tests designed to monitor this prohibition, including but not limited to a "white towel" or "white glove" test. No aerosol cans or other pressurized containers will be allowed in designated make up areas.
- **9.** All animals exhibited are subject to DNA marker or blood type test to verify accuracy of parentage as covered under the Association Rules and for other testing as required by the individual show.
- **10.** Authorized representatives of the Association have the authority to enforce the rules set forth herein as well as in the Association Rules, including barring of a registered animal from a livestock show at which it is to be shown, if there are reasonable grounds to believe a violation has occurred.

An exhibitor who fails to abide by this rule will be dismissed from the arena and/or forfeit premiums, awards and points from the show.
- **8.** All bulls 20 months of age or older that are exhibited must have passed a fertility examination given by a licensed veterinarian to be eligible to show.

ABBA SPECIAL RULES

- 1. Animals must be registered in the American Brahman Breeders Association to be eligible to compete in association sponsored shows. The registration certificate (or photocopy) for each entry must be available for presentation to the superintendent or manager of the show at the time entries are verified prior to judging.
- 2. The registration number and animal identification number (number branded on animal) of (1) each animal must be entered in an individual class, (2) the sire of each get-of-sire entry and (3) the dam of each produce-of-dam entry must be listed on the entry card of each animal entered.
- 3. Entries that have not complied with rules one (1) and two (2) will not be eligible to show, receive premium monies or earn points in the association's Register of Renown.
- 4. Animals to be eligible to be shown in group classes must be entered and shown in individual classes.
- 5. Entries will be listed numerically according to age (oldest first) in catalogs and judging schedules. <u>Include animal</u> <u>identification number (number brand) as a part of identification.</u> When entering the arena for judging, the handlers will line cattle up numerically in the same order.
- 6. Judges will be allowed to comment on placings in selected classes when conditions permit.
- 7. Each animal will be presented in the show ring in its natural conformation and structure without alteration or modification. Alteration or modification shall be defined to include any surgical or circulatory constriction including banding or other appearance change, save only branding, tattooing, foot trimming or dehorning. Injections of foreign substances for cosmetic purposes shall be prohibited. If to the satisfaction of the ABBA's staff, Officers, Executive Committee or Board of Directors; any animal has had its natural conformation and structure altered or been administered steroids, growth hormones or stimulants; then said animal shall be ruled ineligible to compete until such time the show committee and owner/owners have reviewed the case. Any violators, both owner and fitter will be ineligible to exhibit cattle at ABBA approved shows for 5 years.
- 8. In cases where families, companies, corporations, etc., are operated as a unit under the same management but have cattle also registered in the name of individual partners, said cattle, even though bearing a different ownership brand, are eligible to be shown in competition under the firm name provided they have not been and will not be shown in the name of the individuals.
- 9. For females being shown in the three oldest classes **CURRENT YEAR LESS 3 YEARS** (females calved Sept. 1 August 31, 2012 for Fall Shows), exhibitor must have a certificate of pregnancy issued by a licensed veterinarian and will be presented to show officials at time of check-in or registration paper check. The show reserves the right to perform pregnancy determination by palpation for females in the above classes at any given ABBA approved show if an official protest has been filed. For Fall Shows only the last class of females is required to have a calf at side. The only exemption from this rule will be cows that have already weaned a calf and a registration certificate of the calf <u>MUST</u> be presented to the judge.
- **10.** All bulls will be shown with a nose ring or nose restraint with lead attached. For bulls showing in the oldest class, the exhibitor must have a certificate issued by a licensed veterinarian stating the bull has produced viable semen. This certificate must be available for inspection by the judge on request.
- **11.** No exhibitor shall be permitted to show more than one produce or embryo produce of dam, per dam.
- **12.** Cows that are exhibited with calves at side must be in a lactating stage. Calves must be shown and exhibited with their dams and said calves must not exceed 240 days of age on day of judging. The judge will be made aware the ring steward for those cows whose calves are ineligible to show by this rule.
- 13. Cattle will not be allowed to show if their switches have been balled or glitter applied to their skin.
- 14. In the get-of-sire and produce-of-dam classes, breeders will not be allowed to show cattle of mixed color. They will be entered as to the color division they are assigned by the Color Committee for the show. If so, the following procedure will apply. All grey cattle and solid black cattle will show grey. Red, black and white speckled or red and white speckled cattle will show red. Cattle with questionable colored pigmentation may be entered in the color

division the breeder selects, however, said cattle are subject to inspection by a three member ABBA committee. If the Color Committee disagrees with the breeder, the pedigree of said animal will then be used to aid in the final determination, but color pigmentation will take preference. In those cases, where questionable colored cattle possess both red and grey breeding, then the committee will make the final determination. The decision of the committee is final. Once animals have been classified they will remain in that classification unless they were young at time of classification and it is apparent that they have changed their color. In the get-of-sire and produce-of-dam classes, breeders will be allowed to show cattle of varying color. They will be entered as to the color division of the sire in case of get-of-sire and dam in case of produce-of-dam. In other words, if a get is mixed red and grey and the sire was red; then the get will be entered in the red division show. At split shows where the color committee is not present, a staff member with (2) ABBA directors will clarify questionable colored cattle for that particular show. The final classification will be done by the Color Committee. {Revised 08/99}

- 15. The owner of record of any registered animal entered in an ABBA approved shows and/or his/her agent, exhibitor, fitter, handler and/or representative releases ABBA and its representatives from any and all liability that seller/owner might claim as a result of injury of any kind sustained before, during, or after handling cattle for any ABBA board approved activity.
- 16. For shows to remain approved ABBA point shows, show must maintain 20 head average for previous 2 years.
- **17.** The official ABBA rules and procedures governing showing and exhibiting of registered Brahman cattle supersede any rules printed in any show catalog.
- **18.** In an attempt to insure that all animals receive an equal evaluation at the National and International Shows, classes with more than 30 entries may at the discretion of the Show Management and/or ABBA Officials be split by age as evenly as possible.

Any animal that exceeds the weight & measurement requirements at the International Brahman Show, National Brahman Show or any other designated show where weights & measurements are taken will be ineligible to show at any future ABBA approved shows until they reach the Junior Division. Bothe the exhibitor and owner of the previously disqualified animal that is shown before reaching the Junior Division will be ineligible to show their animals for 13 months following the infraction.

 - a. To be eligible to exhibit, the youth must be three (3) years of age but not eleven (11) on January 1 of the show year. Birth certificates will be required at time of arrival.
 - b. Exhibitors must be current active members of the Miniature Hereford Breeders Association. Siblings may share family membership.
 - c. Steers must be registered in the AHA and meet height restrictions in order to participate.
 - d. Steers that are over the height restriction will show in an OCC (out of class) and will not be eligible for prizes or premiums.
 - e. Steers will be allowed ½ inch over the hip-height chart accepted for use by the MHBA until the animal reaches fourteen months of age. At that point, they must be within the chart range.
- 2. Rules and Regulations: General rules and regulations of individual shows apply to this division as well as those listed.
- 3. Ownership
 - a. Ownership of prospect steers must be established by September 1, 2015.
 - b. Ownership of Market steers must be established by May 1, 2015.
 - c. Animals must be in the name of the exhibitor or their parent/guardian.
- 4. Possession, Care and Feeding
 - a. Animals entered must be in the possession of the exhibitor no later than the above dates. The exhibitor is responsible for the general custody, care and feeding of their animal when possible, or to help when it is not possible to care for the animal unassisted. Family members and fellow participants may help with these tasks.
 - b. All animals in this division MUST be completely broke to lead for the safety of the exhibitor and others in the show ring. Animals not deemed fit will be removed from the show ring and disqualified from the competition.
- 5. Fitting of Animal
 - a. All animals will be fitted and be presented in proper condition for a beef show. Exhibitors are encouraged to help in any way that is safe and possible for them to do so, but not endanger either themselves, their animals, or others in the process.
 - b. Alteration of conformation and structure by prohibited substance or unethical fitting is prohibited. Any violation of this rule will result in immediate disqualification without recourse.
 - c. The injection, use or administration of any drug that is prohibited by Federal, State or Local Law or any drug that is used in a manner prohibited by Federal, State or Local Law will result in immediate disqualification without recourse.
 - d. Any physical or physiological attempt to alter the natural musculature or weight by use of injections or ingested material not conductive to the continued health or marketability of beef carcasses or for deception will result in immediate disqualification without recourse.
 - e. Every participant in consideration of their entry being accepted by the show, specifically represents that no animal entered is misrepresented in any way except trimming of feet and blocking of hair.
- 6. Official weight and height
 - a. The weight recorded at the time of check-in will be the official weight and height of the animal.
- 7. Check weight and height
 - a. The MHBA reserves the right, at its discretion, to check the weight and height of any animal.
- 8. Showing of animals
 - a. Participants in this division are required to show their animal. Participants under the age of 5 will be required to have parental, sibling, or other participant accompaniment in the show ring.
 - b. All participants may have parental, sibling, or other participant accompaniment in the show ring.
 - c. Participants are to handle the majority of the showing, and the use of the show stick. Assistants may help in the control of the animal.
- 9. Show harness
 - a. All Pre-Junior exhibitors will be required to wear a show number harness for each animal shown in a class to hold the number in plain sight.
- 10. Showmanship
 - a. Any exhibitor who shows unassisted may compete in this class.
 - b. Animal must be owned and entered by participant to show in this class.
 - c. All animals' class and OOC may participate in this competition.
- 11. Safety
 - a. The purpose for the Pre-Junior steer classes is to offer the opportunity to young cattlemen and women to
 participate in cow shows despite their lack of age required to show in a Junior Show. In many cases,
 these young people have spent HOURS at the barn with their parents and siblings working "show calves".
 To go to a show and not be allowed to participate can be boring and tiresome for those with less than

developed attention spans. Although the rules and regulations have been set, Safety is the most important factor in this event. We want these young agriculturalist to enjoy their showing days, from the beginning on up, so please, make sure the children and the animals are prepared to participate. Animals can be unpredictable, but the more time the exhibitor spends with the animal prior to the show, the better you can expect it to cooperate when the surroundings change.

- 12. Animal Health
 - a. Animals entered must be within the guidelines of the Livestock Health Requirements. Make sure your animal has all the required paper work complete in order to enter and participate in the show.
 - b. Brand inspections are required from areas within Brand Inspection Areas. Please check carefully the guidelines for each show, as they are similar but somewhat different.

Once this determination has been made and reported to the AHA office, then the owner(s) may remove the scurs. Animals with scurs removed will show in the polled division of the Hereford Shows. Once an animal is confirmed polled or scurred they will retain this designation forever.

SGBI SPECIAL RULES

- All exhibits of Santa Gertrudis breeding cattle must be registered meeting the requirements for registration as outlined in the Santa Gertrudis Rules and Regulations for Registration, and shall be governed by the last revised version of the Rules and Regulations for Approved Santa Gertrudis Open & Junior Shows as approved by the board of Santa Gertrudis Breeders International, PO Box 1257, Kingsville, Texas 78364. A copy may be obtained by contacting the association or viewed at www.santagertrudis.com.
- 2. Each owner must be a bona fide member of SGBI. This means the active or junior member has paid all current dues and fees with no outstanding balances on their account.
- 3. ALL animals accepted for exhibition in an SGBI sanctioned show are subject to inspection at each show between arrival on grounds and prior to entering the show ring. The inspection will be conducted by a committee comprised of two (2) members of the Shows and Exhibits Committee and one (1) from the Breed Standards Committee.
- 4. Heifers 24 months of age or older must have produced a calf or be safe in calf as verified by a graduate veterinarian. If animal is open due to being in an embryo transfer program, this fact must be verified by a written statement signed by a licensed embryo technician.
- 5. A cow shown with calf at side:
 - a. Calf must be her natural calf meeting the Standard of Excellence.
 - b. Calf must be registered if older than 30 days. If calf is less than 30 days of age it is subject to registration.
- 6. All senior bull classes (late junior yearling bull and over) must have either a nose ring or a nose clip for show purposes.
- 7. All animals must be individually identified by tattoo and/or numerical fire or freeze brand.
- 8. All animals must be exhibited with the hair brushed down on the entire body, legs, and tail with no foreign objects attached to the animal in a manner as to alter the animal's conformation or change its appearance. *Exhibitors failing to abide by this rule will not be allowed to show. Specifically, all hair must be brushed down slick; head clipped smooth; underline clipped blending sides; udder and teats clipped with no long hair to emphasize udder; ears clipped as to environmental and local standards; neck and brisket clipped; body clip using common sense as to season; leg hair clipped (no steer or Brahman clips) and do not leave long from hock or knee to hoof; tailhead clipped; pull switch or brush out (no ball, etc.); trim tail (no shear except back side). Fitting handbook should be studied.
- **9.** Each animal exhibited must be exhibited with the correct age and shown in the class corresponding with their correct age. SGBI reserves the right to tooth animals without prior notice to the breeders in order to verify age of cattle.
- **10.** Animals are to be presented in descending order according to age.
- 11. Polled classes will be entered at the same time as class entries are required by each show.
- **12.** To be eligible to show in Best of Polled, animals must be slick polled with no scurs, no scars, no dehorning and with no evidence of horny tissue.
- **13.** There must be at least 5 exhibitors and 25 head of cattle, or a minimum of 50 head of cattle, to constitute a recognized Santa Gertrudis Show.
- 14. Shows in which 50 head or less are entered, all early and late classes may be combined at discretion of show officials.
- **15.** Classes with over 30 entries should be divided into sections and section winners return for final placing.
- **16.** The judge must be an SGBI approved judge.

- 17. Dress for exhibitors participating in SGBI sanctioned Open and Junior shows shall be of neat and clean clothing of collared shirts with sleeves, belts, no midriffs showing and appropriate footwear no tennis shoes. Exhibitors may wear hats or go bareheaded no caps.
- 18. Each animal shall be presented in the show ring in its natural conformation and structure without alteration or modification. Alteration or modification shall be defined to include any surgical, chemical, electrical, pharmaceutical or other appearance change, save only branding, tattooing, foot trimming or dehorning. Additionally, no pumping or filling of an animal with a liquid diuretic or any other substance is allowed. ALL animals and exhibitors found to be in violation of this rule will be banned for life from showing at SGBI approved shows.
- **19.** If entries are not properly fitted and good herdsmanship followed, the owner may be asked to not display their cattle until adhering to the proper procedures in herdsmanship paper.
- **20.** Every exhibitor, in consideration of his/her entry being accepted, agrees to submit any animal so entered by him/her to inspection and agrees to have such animal submitted to any tests as may be designated and requested by the Shows and Exhibits Committee, or the authorized representatives of the relevant show or fair, and agrees that the conclusions reached by the committee/representative as to whether such animal is unethically fitted or over age, shall be final, without recourse, against SGBI and designated personnel. Any false representation, interference or unprofessional conduct on the part of any exhibitor will be dealt with by the Shows and Exhibits Committee according to the equities of the case.
- 21. Any person who furnished the birthday of an animal to SGBI either on the IPRA or some other document (whereby that birthday information is transferred to the registration certificate) and that animal is exhibited in an AGBI approved show with an incorrect age and the age determined by the SGBI designated veterinarian exceeds the age listed on the registration certificate by more than thirty (30) days, the person furnishing the birthday above and such person furnishing said information to SGBI for inclusion on the registration certificate shall be barred from showing in an SGBI approved show for a period of six (6) months for the first offense, one (1) year for the second offense and for life for the third offense. However, the animal, if transferred to another owner, may be placed in the correct class and be shown again.
- 22. For and in consideration of the opportunity to participate in any SGBI approved show, each exhibitor hereby releases SGBI, its officers, directors and representatives from negligence, any and all claims, suits and judgments, either past, present or future, arising from or connected with the administration or use of such test or examination and the resulting decision therefrom.
- **23.** Any exhibitor desiring to dispute or challenge the results of any text, exam, or show rule enforcement, as applied to his/her animals, shall do so in accordance with the procedures established by the rules.
- 24. APPEALS:
 - a. The Chairman of the Shows and Exhibits Committee and the Vice President of Youth Activites in conjunction with the person(s) responsible for coordinating the individual shows will continue to be primarily vested with authority to determine whether animals entered shows meet the standards formally approved by the Breed Standards Committee.
 - b. In the event the Vice President of Youth Activities or individual show coordinating official disqualifies an animal from participating in a youth show and the exhibitor wants to appeal the disqualification, the appeal process outlined below must be followed.
 - c. In the event the Chairman of Shows and Exhibits or individual show coordinating official disqualifies an animal from participating in a sanctioned show, and the exhibitor wants to appeal the disqualification, the appeal process outlined below must be followed.
 - d. Additionally, any exhibitor participating in an individual youth show or other SGBI sanctioned show that wants to appeal a breed standards disqualification decision by either the Vice President for Youth Activities/youth show coordinating official or the Chairman of Shows and Exhibits/show coordinating official must follow the appeals process outlined below.

APPEALS COMMITTEE

The appeals committee will be comprised by the following three (3) members – Vice President of Breed Improvement, the Vice President of Marketing and Promotions and the Executive Director of SGBI. All three (3) members must be present to constitute a quorum. All decisions rendered by the Appeals Committee will be binding and final for all appeals submitted to the committee.

APPEALS PROCEDURE

- a. All qualification/disqualification appeals and appropriate supporting documentation submitted by exhibitors must be submitted in writing to the Executive Director of SGBI. The written appeal must be accompanied by a \$200 process fee. No waivers will be granted to the requirements for written appeals and the up front \$200 fee.
- b. Exhibitors must file written appeals postmarked or via e-mail within five (5) business days following the date of the show governing the qualification/disqualification decision by the primary officials (Vice

President of Youth Activities/show coordinating official or Chairman of Shows and Exhibits/event coordinating official).

- c. The Executive Director will be responsible for coordinating meetings of the Appeals Committee and forwarding copies of the appeal and supporting documentation to the other committee members.
- d. The Appeals Committee will render a final decision within five (5) business days following receipt of the written appeal, appropriate supporting documentation and the \$200 fee.
- e. In the event an exhibitor appeals a disqualification decision by the primary official and the Appeal Committee approves the exhibitor's appeal, the animal covered by the appeal will be qualified to participate in all future SGBI sanctioned events.
- f. In the event an exhibitor appeals a disqualification decision by the primary official and the Appeals Committee disapproves the exhibitor's appeal, the animal covered by the appeal will be disqualified from participating in future SGBI sanctioned events. Additionally, any points or awards previously given to the owner of the animal will be forfeited.
- g. In the event an exhibitor appeals a qualification decision by the primary official and the Appeals Committee rules that the animal covered by the appeal does not meet breed standards, the covered animal will be disqualified from participating in future shows and the owner of the animal will forfeit any points and awards previously granted.

25. PROCEDURES TO FILE PROTEST:

- a. File protest with show that infraction occurred. Follow their protest rules.
 - b. File the same protest with the Shows and Exhibits Committee. Contact the chairman.
 - c. Three (3) exhibitors must sign the protest.
 - d. All protests must be in writing and accompanied by a deposit of \$100, cash or certified check, which will be forfeited if protest is not sustained. Such protest must state plainly the cause of the complaint or appeal and must be delivered to the Shows and Exhibits Committee within twenty four (24) hours after the occasion for such protest.
 - e. Order of hearing a protest:
 - i. Chairman of Shows and Exhibits Committee
 - ii. Action by Shows and Exhibits Committee
 - iii. Final action by Board of Directors
 - iv. Follow appeal procedure as outlined in Rules and Regulations.
- f. All rules and regulations that have been properly protested to the Shows and Exhibits Committee shall be subject to the following penalties:
 - i. Loss of premium money.
 - ii. Loss of awards
 - iii. Suspension from showing the subject animal as deemed necessary. Penalty may be for one (1) show, two (2) shows or three (3) shows, or as long as deemed necessary for the offense.
 - iv. Suspension of the exhibitor being the same as the other SGBI Rules and penalties.
- **26.** Failure to adhere to each show's specific rules shall also be subject to these penalties. Proper protest procedures must be adhered to according to that particular show's rules. SGBI will follow each show's rules, and any action taken by a show will be upheld by SGBI in relation to its bearing on our point show system.
- 27. DISQUALIFICATIONS: An exhibitor who has been disqualified from competition in any livestock show or has had a premium withheld or withdrawn on the grounds of rule violation(s) will not be allowed to compete in other shows. This shall include, but is not limited to, disqualification for fraud, misrepresentation, unethical fitting or deception. Judging procedures will not be interrupted for protest investigation; and depending on the basis of the protest, a decision may be withheld until a thorough investigation is completed. No complaint or appeal that a judge overlooked an animal will be considered. If any exhibitor, in any way, whether in person or by their representative, interferes with the judge(s), or shows any disrespect to them or to show officials, the existing show officials may excuse him/her from the ring and exclude them from further competition; exhibitor premiums that may have been awarded may also be withheld. If an animal is disqualified after having won awards/premiums, the animals placing below him/her may be moved up (at the option of the Shows and Exhibits Committee) to fill the vacated position.

28. RULES FOR HIGH POINT AWARDS:

- a. For each point show, 1ST=2 pts; 2ND=1 pt; Division Champion= 3 pts; Res. Division Champion=2 pts; Grand Champion= 5 pts; and Res Grand Champion= 4 pts; Best of Polled=1 pt, but does not count toward overall points
- b. Get of Sire and Produce of Dam points go toward Exhibitor/Breeder of the Year Awards.
- c. Points will stay with animal if sold.
- d. The Sire and Dam of the Year should have points from at least two (2) different offspring.
- e. All points earned at the National Open Show are to be doubled.

29. Conduct in the Show Ring:

If any exhibitor/owner/showman interferes in any way with the judge or shows disrespect to him, or to the show

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in the ring, the exhibitor/owner/showman may be dismissed by the judge or show management from the ring. The management may withhold premium monies that may have been awarded.

DAIRY DEPARTMENT REQUIREMENTS

- 1. RULES/REGULATIONS: Entries made in this department shall be subject to and each exhibitor agrees to abide by the General Rules and Regulations as published in this premium list.
- 2. ENTRY APPLICATION/FEE: An entry application and fee of \$30 per head must be submitted by entry deadline. All fees must accompany online or mailed in applications for entry or mailed in signature forms. This fee is not a stall fee. A show fee in addition to the State Fair of Texas entry fee may be levied by a breed association or group. Late entries will be accepted until registration check in deadline, for fee per head equal to two times the regular entry fee per head. The State Fair of Texas reserves the right to use any Dairy Cattle for the Dairy Judging Contest.
- 3. ENTRY LIMITATION: No exhibitor shall be permitted to show more than two animals or one group of animals in any one class. All animals shown in a group class must be shown in their individual age class.
- 4. YOUTH SHOW: Youth Show exhibitors are permitted to enter the Open Show when an additional entry application and entry fee are submitted by the entry deadline.
- 5. ADMISSION/PARKING: No complimentary admission passes will be available. All exhibitors are requested to purchase a section admission pass good for the duration of each show entered. Complimentary parking passes will be given to exhibitors entering 6 or more head in any one section. Please see "Admission and Parking" in the General Rules Section of this Premium List. When a request for Certified Mail is indicated on the entry application and the certified mail fee is included with all other fees, passes will be mailed to the exhibitor. Livestock personnel at the Animal Health Office will issue prepaid passes, not mailed, to the driver of vehicles with livestock upon arrival.
- 6. OWNERSHIP: Ownership will be defined by the Registration Certificate. Pending transfers will not be accepted. Animals owned in partnership may be exhibited in one owner's name but such ownership must be declared by the exhibitor at the time registration certificates are checked by the superintendent. Where animals in a herd are registered in the name of members of a family residing on the same farm, and, where the herd is operated as one milking unit, or, if more than one milking unit, is legally incorporated and/or animals are registered with the same prefix, all entries will be considered as a single exhibitor and/or as a single breeder for purposes of substitutions, group class requirements and Premier Exhibitor and Breeder Awards. Animals registered in the name of different members of a family which meet the above requirements may be exhibited under the farm name EXCEPT animals entered in both the Open and Youth shows must be entered in the Youth's name in both shows. If it is necessary to change the ownership in the judges book to conform to registration certificate (except for animals owned in partnership), a \$10.00 fee will be charged.
- 7. **REGISTRATION**: Each animal shown in this division must be registered. An original certificate of registration must be presented to the superintendent at the registration check and kept available at all times during the show for each animal exhibited. Application for transfer and pending registration will not be accepted.
- 8. MILK OUT: A milk out may be requested by an exhibitor provided such request is made to the Superintendent prior to the judge lining up the class. Judge is not required to honor request.
- 9. PREMIER EXHIBITOR DEFINED: The award to be made to the exhibitor winning the most points on, not to exceed six, animals owned and exhibited by the exhibitor in the open single classes. Point system listed below.

STATE HERD REQUIREMENTS

A qualifying State Herd entry submitted by the state secretary must include:

- 1. A list of names and addresses of exhibitors.
- 2. The names of people in charge of the herd at the show.
- 3. The name of the person designating the animals that shall constitute the group for the State herd class.
- When the state herd enters the judging ring, this person shall present the superintendent with a written list which shall include the name, registration number, date of birth and owner of each animal as well as the registration certificate of each animal. The list will be retained in the judge's book.

The State Herd shall consist of six animals, properly entered in the show, representing the best of the breed from their respective state and shall be composed of the following animals:

a. Two females shown in classes eligible to show for Junior Champion Female

Two females shown in class eligible to show for Senior Champion Female

Two females any age.

- b. The six animals in the state herd must be owned by not less than three exhibitors, from one state, with no exhibitor furnishing more than three animals and all animals in which a breeder owns a partnership interest will be counted in these three.
- c. All animals from a herd or farm, regardless of ownership, shall be counted in the three head allowed one exhibitor. Any partnership or syndicate animals must be shown in the herd of the state in which they are usually housed.
- d. Cattle owned by state institutions will be allowed to show in the state herd class, but all institutions in a state will be considered one exhibitor and allowed to show not more than three head in a state group.
- e. No entry fee required. Must be entered with the superintendent's at check in.

f. One entry per state.

THE PUREBRED DAIRY CATTLE ASSOCIATION SHOW RING CODE OF ETHICS

Adopted April 3, 2004

The showing of registered dairy cattle stimulates and sustains interest in the breeding of registered dairy cattle. It is also an important part of the promotion, merchandising and breeding program of many breeders. For these reasons, the Purebred Dairy Cattle Association (PDCA) believes that it is in the best interest of all breeders of registered dairy cattle to maintain a reputation of integrity in dairy cattle shows and to present a wholesome and progressive image of dairy cattle in the show ring.

PDCA endorses this Show Ring Code of Ethics for all dairy breed shows and pledges its full cooperative support for its enforcement to show management, show judges, and the national breed associations.

The application of this Code of Ethics provides for absolute responsibility for an animal's condition by an owner, exhibitor, fitter or participant whether or not he or she was actually instrumental in or had actual knowledge of the treatment of the animal in contravention of this Code of Ethics. Dairy cattle exhibitors shall, at all times, deport themselves with honesty and good sportsmanship.

It is recognized that there are certain practices in the proper care and management of dairy cattle that are necessary in the course of moving dairy cattle to and between shows that are advisable to keep them in a sound, healthy state so they might be presented in the show ring in a natural, normal condition. At all times, exhibition livestock shall be treated in a humane manner and in accordance with dairy quality assurance practices so as to protect the health, safety and welfare of the livestock and the consuming public. No person shall present for exhibition or exhibit an animal which he or she knows, or has reason to suspect, is affected with or has been exposed to a dangerously contagious or infectious disease, or illegal or non-approved use of drugs, medication and/or prohibited substance, or residue.

The position of the Purebred Dairy Cattle Association is that all animals presented for exhibition shall be in their natural conformation and structure, free of any alteration or modification by injection or internal or external administration of any substance or by any involvement in unethical fitting.

Grooming and Preparation

Dairy cattle exhibitions are conducted under standards for evaluating conformation established by the PDCA *Unified Score Card* (2009), with specific breed characteristics taken into consideration by the show judge. In this connection, animals will be groomed and prepared for the judge's evaluation in order to display the animal's natural contour, conformation, performance and mobility. Specifically:

1. External applications of cosmetics that affect only appearance may be used, including by way of example hoof polishes and false switches.



2. The maximum allowable length of naturally growing hair anywhere on the topline is not to exceed 1". Exhibitors will be required to comply with this rule before the animal is allowed to enter the ring.

3. Addition of foreign objects, including but not limited to hair or hair substitutes, cloth or fiber, to change the natural contour or appearance of the animal's body is prohibited.

4. Externally sealing the teat end with a preparation that does not harm the animal's skin is permissible. Natural teat placement will be given preference over artificially positioned teats.

Violations: False, Deceptive or Unacceptable Practices

These practices are violations of the Code of Ethics and will be reported to show management and may be reported to the respective national breed associations:

- 1. Misrepresenting the age and/or milking status of the animal for the class in which it is shown.
- 2. Treating the animal, particularly the udder, internally or externally:
 - a. with an irritant or counter-irritant,
 - b. using a device to artificially create or enhance the udder crease,

c. using other substances as detected by testing that causes changes in the udder to artificially improve the conformation.

d. plugging of teat canal with foreign substances.

- 3. Surgical or unethical insertion of any matter under the skin or into body cavities, performed to change the natural contour or appearance of the animal's body (e.g., administration of fluid via a stomach tube or other similar apparatus to fill the rumen), though not to preclude practices required or involved in normal management.
- 4. Criticizing or interfering with the judge, show management or other exhibitors while in the show ring or other conduct detrimental to the breed or the show.
- 5. Challenging, threatening or interfering with an ethics committee appointed by show management to monitor the animals on exhibit on the show grounds.

Exhibitor Responsibility

The act of entering an animal in a livestock show is the giving of consent by the owner, exhibitor, fitter and/or absolutely responsible person (hereinafter referred to as "Exhibitor") for show management to obtain any specimens of urine, saliva, blood, milk, or other substances from the animal to be used in testing. Materials may also be collected by ultrasound and photographic methods and by direct examination of animal.

The act of entering an animal is the giving of consent by the owner, exhibitor, fitter and/or absolutely responsible person (the "Exhibitor") to have disciplinary action for violation of this Show Ring Code of Ethics taken by show management, the state in which the show occurs, and/or the national dairy breed association without recourse.

Show Ethics Committee

Each show should have an Ethics Committee. The make-up of this committee should include official breed representatives, representative(s) of show management (e.g., dairy cattle show superintendent, General Manager), the official show veterinarian, and Extension representative.

The Ethics Committee will be responsible for monitoring violations of the Show Ring Code of Ethics. The Ethics Committee will investigate the report of any violation and determine the accuracy of the allegation. The Ethics Committee will have the authority to inspect animals and related material to determine if violations have occurred.

Violations: Reporting and Investigation

Complaints of alleged violations can be reported to the breed superintendent, the show superintendent, show management, and/or the Ethics Committee.

Before An Animal is Shown

If the Ethics Committee suspects that a violation of the Show Ring Code of Ethics will occur if the animal is shown, and that violation is reasonably well established before the animal is shown, the Ethics Committee will submit a report to show management.

Show management will discuss the violation with the Exhibitor:

- 6. If, at the Exhibitor's discretion, the animal in question is not shown, no violation will have occurred.
- 7. If the Exhibitor wishes to challenge that a violation occurred, he/she/they will have opportunity to appeal to the Ethics Committee. If its decision is not changed, the Exhibitor will be denied opportunity to exhibit the animal in question.

During and After An Animal is Shown

All animals are subject to examination during judging. The judge and Ethics Committee are instructed to examine the top five (5) animals in each class closely for violations of the Show Ring Code of Ethics. When a violation may have occurred, a milkout may be called for. This call may be by breed association rule, or by request of an authorized representative of the national breed association, the judge, the Ethics Committee, or show management.

If an animal is exhibited and a violation of the Show Ring Code of Ethics is subsequently suspected, investigated, and determined to have occurred, the violation will be reported to the Ethics Committee and show management for action. The Exhibitor will be notified of the violation and the supporting evidence and invited to defend or explain the allegations.

Violations are subject to the disciplinary provisions of show management, the state in which the show occurs, and the national dairy breed association. Sanctions may include any one, or combination of the following:

- a. forfeiture or return of awards, prizes, premiums or proceeds;
- b. written letter of reprimand to the owner, exhibitor, fitter and/or absolutely responsible person (the "Exhibitor");
- c. disqualification of the exhibition livestock from an exhibition;
- d. disqualification of the Exhibitor from the show;
- e. publication of offense.

Disqualification may include any or all shows and classes and may be for any number of years. History: Adopted by PDCA in March 1969, revised March 1971, February 1977, February 1981, February 1986, February 1988, February 1989, February 1992, February 1993, November 1995, April 2002; April 2004.

DEPARTMENT REQUIREMENTS

- 1. **RULES/REGULATIONS**: Entries made in this division shall be subject to and each exhibitor agrees to abide by the General Rules and Regulations and Pan-Am Department Requirements as published in this premium list.
- 2. ELIGIBILITY: All goats must be registered in the herdbook of American Boer Goat Association 30 days prior to arriving at the show. Original registration certificates are required, though a copy of a Registration Application, stamped with the date received by ABGA, can be accepted for kids less than 3 months of age. Animals must be registered in the name of the exhibitor and must have been owned by the exhibitor on or before September 1, 2015. Throughout the ABGA and JABGA Show rules the term exhibitor is defined as the owner of the animal listed in the ABGA registry shown on entry deadline. All goats must be appropriately identified and comply with USDA Scrapie Eradication Program Guidelines. Call 1-866-USDA TAG (873-2824) or visit the following website for more information:

- 3. ENTRY LIMITATION: No exhibitor shall be permitted to show more than two animals or one group of animals in any one class. All animals shown in a group class must be shown in their individual age class.

If the animal has a microchip as its permanent identification, the exhibitor is responsible for providing a microchip reader.

STATE FAIR OF TEXAS® YOUTH LIVESTOCK SHOW AND CONTESTS

SPECIAL RULES

The State Fair of Texas® (State Fair) encourages a practical interest among young people in the responsibilities and practices of feeding and raising livestock and competing agricultural contests. The purpose of the Youth Livestock Division of State Fair is to encourage and promote the educational aspects of agriculture/livestock projects conducted only by youth exhibitors under the proper supervision and direction of an Agriculture Science Teacher (AST) or a County Extension Agent (CEA). State Fair recognizes that the Texas AgriLife Extension, through 4-H Clubs, and the Texas Education Agency, through FFA Chapters, provides a valuable service to the public in educating Texas students in the principles of successful production livestock and agricultural knowledge. In order to encourage participation in the 4-H Clubs and FFA Chapters throughout the state, State Fair includes as a part of its annual fair and exposition, the youth livestock division which is a special exhibition for Texas 4-H club and FFA chapter members.

1. RULES/REGULATIONS: Entries made in the Youth Livestock Show and Contests shall be subject to and each contestant agrees to abide by the General Rules, Youth Livestock Show and Contest Special Rules, and any applicable special requirements as published in this premium list (collectively, the "Rules"). In the event of any conflict between the Youth Livestock Show Special Rules and the General Rules, the provisions of these Special Rules shall apply. Additionally, any conflict between any applicable additional special requirements and the Youth Livestock rules, the additional special rules shall apply.

2. PARTICIPATION:

a. ELIGIBLE EXHIBITORS: Participation in the Youth Livestock Show is limited to Texas residents only, who are members of a Texas 4-H Club or Texas FFA Chapter (except where stated otherwise) who have continuously owned and personally fed and cared for their animal under the direct supervision of a CEA or AST. Exhibitors must be enrolled in, and attending, public, private or home school elementary or secondary schools in Texas and they must be at least 8 years old and in the third grade, but not more than 18 years old on August 31. Exhibitors must be bona fide residents of the State of Texas. ALL EXHIBITORS MUST BE QUALITY COUNTS CERTIFIED.

b. **INELIGIBLE EXHIBITORS**:

- 1. If an exhibitor is suspended under the Texas Education Code 33.081 "No Pass, No Play", then that exhibitor/competitor and their animal are not eligible for competition.
- 2. Exhibitors who have been disqualified from competition at State Fair or any other livestock show or have had a premium withheld or withdrawn are not eligible for competition. This shall include, but is not limited to, disqualification for fraud, misrepresentation, unethical fitting, tampering or deception.
- 3. Exhibitors who have had a Grand Champion market beef steer, pen of market broilers, market goat, market lamb, or market barrow at any prior State Fair Youth Livestock Show are not eligible to compete in the division in which their prior Grand Champion was exhibited.

3. ENTRY PROCEDURE:

- h. Entry Application: All applications for entry must be made through the online entry procedures located at <u>www.bigtex.com</u> by 12:00 A.M. midnight, August 25th. Payment along with entry authorization signatures must be submitted by AST/CEA on a school/county check, cashier's check, or money order and postmarked on or before September 1 to the State Fair of Texas, Livestock Office, PO Box 150009, Dallas, TX 75315.
- i. **ENTRY CERTIFICATION**: The Certification, Release, and Indemnity portion of each entry application must be signed by the youth exhibitor, a parent or guardian, <u>AND</u> the CEA or AST. By signing the certification portion of the entry application, each party acknowledges that they have read, understood and will abide by all the Rules. Additionally, by signing the entry application, the youth exhibitor and the parent or guardian certify that the entry has not been administered any substance not approved by the U.S. Food and Drug Administration (FDA) and/or the U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) for food animals. Furthermore, the exhibitor and parent/guardian certifies that the entry is free and clear of ALL drug and chemical residue, regardless of whether such drug is FDA or USDA approved or whether the withdrawal or elimination periods have been met.
- j. **HEALTH REQUIREMENTS:** Health papers are not required on Youth Market Barrows, Lambs, Goats or Broilers. Health papers are required on animals entered in the Youth Breeding Shows. See Animal Health Section of this premium list.
- k. **ENTRIES:** Entries may not be made in joint or multiple names.
- I. **CLUB/CHAPTER ENTRIES**: Entries made by 4-H Clubs and FFA Chapters will only be accepted in Youth Dairy Herd classes and Contests, where allowed.
- m. **ENTRY LIMITATIONS**: No exhibitor will be allowed to show more than two market beef steers, three pens of three broilers each, one market goat, one market lamb, and one market barrow.
- n. **INCOMPLETE ENTRIES**: Incomplete entries include entries made online by midnight, August 25 that are missing signatures, W-9's or other required information. Those incomplete entries will be accepted conditionally

and will not be assessed the late fee(s) provided, however, that all information is received by State Fair's Livestock Office prior to show time. Otherwise, prizes and premium money may be withheld, or the entry may be disqualified.

 LATE ENTRIES: Late entries are defined as entries not received online by 12:00 A.M. midnight, August 25. Entries made after midnight, August 25 must be mailed to State Fair's Livestock Office. See General Rules for fee amounts.

4. OWNERSHIP:

- a. All animals must be exhibited, shown, and sold by their owner. (Exception: see Rule 5)
- b. The exhibitor must own their animal at the beginning of and throughout the feeding period and must feed, care for and exhibit their animal entered without any aid or assistance during the entire feeding period except from parents, CEA, AST or other youth exhibitors and leaders from their county/chapter. All youth animal exhibits must be owned and continuously cared for by the exhibitor from June 30 through the show date of the Fair. Exception: market broilers must be owned and continuously cared for from hatch date to the show date of the Fair.



- c. JOINTLY OWNED ANIMALS: Animals owned in joint names are not eligible to compete.
- d. SUBSTITUTE EXHIBITORS: A substitute exhibitor may be used, at the sole and reasonable discretion of the department superintendent, by submitting a substitute exhibitor form and meeting one of the following conditions: a) when an exhibitor has more than one entry in the Youth Livestock Show showing at the same time; or b) when an exhibitor is sick or injured (must be accompanied by a signed statement from a certified medical doctor). When one of the before conditions exists, the department superintendent may use his own discretion as to whether a substitute showman will be allowed. If a positive decision is rendered by the department superintendent, the substitute showman must be from the same county/chapter as the original exhibitor. The substitute must also meet all requirements of a youth livestock show exhibitor. If only one exhibitor is present from a county/chapter, the department superintendent can approve a substitute from another county. An exhibitor may be used as a substitute only one time per market department. The department superintendent will require positive identification of the substitute and will require documentation in any of the above conditions. Substitute exhibitors must be verified by BOTH department superintendents and forms must be turned in at Reg. Check/Weight Card turn in.
- 5. STALLING UPON ARRIVAL: Youth Market entries are stalled upon arrival. To pen together, groups MUST arrive together at the staging area. No pen assignments will be made for animals in trailers coming later. Animals will be counted on trailers. Livestock officials reserve the right to deny stall requests.
- 6. ZERO TOLERANCE: In order to foster fair competition, provide a level playing field and protect the safety of the food chain, the showing of unethically fitted livestock, livestock of any ineligible age for exhibition in the class entered, and/or animals being administered unapproved drugs is strictly prohibited. Additionally, any animal that has been administered a drug, even though that drug is FDA approved for its species, is subject to disqualification if that animal tests positive for that drug once it has arrived at State Fair and/or participated in State Fair shows. All animals must remain free and clear of all drug and chemical residues while on State Fair grounds.
 - ANIMAL INSPECTION: As condition for participation in the State Fair shows, exhibitor agrees to submit any k. animal entered by the exhibitor for inspection by any veterinarian or show official appointed by State Fair Management. Exhibitor also agrees to have such animal submitted to any tests requested by State Fair. Exhibitor also agrees that the opinion reached by State Fair or its officials as to whether such animal is unethically fitted or improperly aged shall be final and binding without recourse against State Fair, its officials or any of its appointed veterinarians. Further, State Fair specifically reserves the right to have ultrasound, D.N.A., tissue, blood or urine laboratory analysis made on any animal entered for State Fair competition. The conclusions reached by the veterinarian or laboratory shall be final and binding without recourse against State Fair, its officials or any of its appointed veterinarians. An exhibitor of an animal that is found to be unethically fitted, improperly aged, and/or testing positive for any drug or medication or unapproved chemical may forfeit all titles, awards, auction proceeds, premiums, scholarships, as well as rights and privileges to exhibit livestock in the future at the Fair. Exhibitor waives any cause of action which he/she might have for any action taken under these Rules, and releases the Fair and any appointed veterinarian from any and all claims or demands whatsoever in connection with the inspection or testing of any such animal or any ruling or action taken by reason of the conclusion of such veterinarian.
 - I. **UNETHICAL FITTING**: Unethical fitting means any attempt to alter the natural appearance, conformation, musculature or weight of an animal by any unnatural means. Animals showing any signs of being unethically fitted will be disqualified. Examples of unethical fitting include, but are not limited to the following: Application of any substance to any part of the animal's body, unless specifically allowed in the department rules of that entry; Use of injection; Draining of fluids; Bruising; Feeding of material not conducive to the health of the animal, safety of food or marketability of its carcass; Surgical alterations
 - m. **PUMPING**: Artificially filling animals by stomach pumping or airing injections
 - n. **IMPROPERLY AGED ANIMALS**: Animals will be disqualified if their age is misrepresented or improperly recorded.

- o. UNAPPROVED DRUG USE: The showing of an animal that during its life has been administered any quantity of any unapproved drug, chemical or medication is strictly prohibited. Such drugs include, but are not limited to, any diuretic, unapproved growth stimulant or other unapproved medication. Unapproved means not approved by the FDA and/or the USDA for slaughter animals including animals that may be destined for human consumption.
- p. **APPROVED DRUG USE**: If an animal has been administered a drug that is FDA approved for its species, sufficient time must have passed so that the animal does not test positive for that drug upon arrival at the Fairgrounds. Animals must remain free and clear of any measurable quantity of all drug and chemical residues while on the Fairgrounds and/or participating in State Fair shows. Please note that elimination time (the time it takes for no drug residue to be found in the system) is generally longer than the labeled withdrawal time for most approved drugs.
- q. **UNMANAGEABLE ANIMALS**: State Fair may disqualify any animal deemed unmanageable.
- 7. NON-ADHERENCE TO THE RULES: Any person found guilty of misrepresentation or not abiding by the Rules in this premium list will be disqualified and denied the privilege of showing at the Fair.
- 8. EMERGENCY TREATMENT: If an animal requires emergency treatment while on the Fairgrounds, only the Official Show Veterinarian or his appointee will be allowed to administer any drug, chemical or feed additive. Animals which are administered treatments with a withdrawal or extended elimination time period will be disqualified from competition. Furthermore, the Official State Fair Veterinarian, in agreement with State Fair Management, reserves the right to treat any animal if, in the opinion of the Official State Fair Veterinarian, it is in the best interest of the animal's health and well-being to be treated. If the Official State Fair Veterinarian administers treatment to an animal, and therefore uses any medication that does not meet the appropriate withdrawal and/or elimination time, such animal will be determined ineligible for competition. All treatment costs are the responsibility of the exhibitor.
- 9. DISQUALIFICATION/CONDEMNATION OF ANIMAL: State Fair practices a "zero tolerance" policy on all residue violations. State Fair reserves the right to condemn and/or disqualify any animal, either live or slaughtered, found in violation of the Rules, and the exhibitor will forfeit all auction sale and/or premium money if the animal is disqualified. If an animal(s) is disqualified, the class placing will not change. A disqualified exhibitor may forfeit all rights and privileges to exhibit livestock in the future at the Fair, as well as any and all State Fair scholarship opportunities. Disqualifications due to violations of State Fair Rules as stated in this premium list or the Entry Certification, Release and Indemnity agreement and any consequences will be decided by State Fair Management. These decisions may be appealed to State Fair's Executive Committee from whose decision there can be no further appeal.
- **10. USDA WHOLESOME MEAT ACT**: The United States Department of Agriculture Wholesome Meat Act applies to the sale of market livestock and poultry which are sold during the State Fair of Texas, which includes but is not limited to the following:
 - a. Animals must be in good health and carcasses free of drug, chemical or foreign substance residues;
 - b. Drug label directions for use and withdrawal periods must be followed; and
 - c. If drug or chemical residues are found in tissue of carcasses, the entire carcass may be condemned.

YOUTH LIVESTOCK SHOW BEEF HEIFERS

DEPARTMENT RULES

- 1. **RULES/REGULATIONS**: Entries made in this department shall be subject to and each exhibitor agrees to abide by the General Rules and Regulations and Youth Livestock Show Special Rules.
- 2. ENTRY LIMITATION: There is no entry limitation for beef heifers. All animals shown in a group class must be shown in their individual age class.
- **3. OPEN SHOW**: Youth Show exhibitors are permitted to enter the Open Show when an additional entry application and entry fee is submitted by the entry deadline.
- 4. TIE OUTS: A limited number of tie out spaces will be sold on a first come first serve basis. Tie outs may be purchased at time of entry or from the Livestock Office. Tie outs will be assigned upon arrival when the exhibitor provides proof of purchase to the superintendent. Cattle will not be removed to tie outs until 7:00 PM daily. Cattle are limited to the assigned tie-out areas. Special provisions may be made for those breeds that have special requests which are submitted to the livestock and/or beef cattle superintendent in writing, prior to the start of the show. Tie-out fees must be paid for, in advance, before using tie-outs.
- 5. FANS: No fans permitted in any pedestrian aisle. No rear fans permitted. No exceptions.
- 6. GENERATORS: No generators permitted.
- 7. GROOMING CHUTES: Chutes may be brought on the grounds during the beef heifer shows provided a permit is purchased. Fee is to be paid at the time entries are made. Space for chutes will be in stalls or outside cattle buildings. No chutes permitted in any pedestrian aisle.
- 8. **GROOMING**: This is a blow and go show. Clipping, electric or manual will be permitted on the grounds. Animals are to be shown in natural conformation and color. Grooming materials leaving any color residue are not permitted.
- 9. REGISTRATION: Each animal shown in this division must be registered. An <u>original</u> certificate of registration must be kept available at all times during the show for each animal exhibited. Application for transfer and pending registration will not be accepted. All heifers must be exhibited in the designated breed division in which they are validated under.



- 10. VALIDATION: To be eligible, heifers must be validated with and adhere to all the rules of the Texas 4-H and FFA Breeding Heifer Validation Program administered by the Texas A&M AgriLife Extension Service and the Texas Education Agency, Department of Agriculture Education. Exhibitors need to check with their local County Extension Agent or Agriculture Science Teacher for local/county validation deadlines. http://texasyouthlivestock.com/heifer-validation/
- 11. SPONSORED ENTRIES (scramble heifers): Youth exhibiting animals sponsored by other shows or organizations which are retaining the registration papers must obtain a photocopy of the registration papers, or the papers themselves. In case of photocopies, both sides of the papers must be copied and presented to the Superintendent. Name of show or organization must be officially shown on the papers by letterhead or official seal/logo. If the rules of the sponsoring organization prevent the transfer of registration papers to the exhibitor until certain obligations are met, a notarized certification must (1) state this fact and (2) give date the animal was awarded to the exhibitor. The date of awarding must be not later than the ownership deadline.

12. OWNERSHIP Animals must be owned by and registered in the name of the exhibitor not later than June 30 of the current year.

*Bred-and-Owned Heifers are a partial exception to the Ownership rule. Bred-and-owned heifers must be recorded with the respective breed association and exhibitor have in hand (at check-in time) a valid, original certificate of registration dated on or before August 25 with the exhibitor listed as the only breeder and owner.

13. RELEASE: Releases will be written upon arrival according to release times specific to each breed.

DEPARTMENT REQUIREMENTS

American Angus Association, 3201 Frederick Blvd., St. Joseph, MO 64506, (816) 233-3101, will participate in premiums offered in individual classes for junior Angus heifers, as included in its standard show classifications, according to the premium schedule based on the number of head shown. The premium assistance provided by the American Angus Association for participation in this show is in addition to the premiums offered by the show itself. The Association contributions will be included in the premium checks issued by the show.

- 1. **GROOMING**: This is a blow and go show. Clipping, electric or manual, will be permitted on the grounds.
- 2. Animals are to be shown in natural conformation and color. Grooming materials leaving any color residue are not permitted.
- 3. A minimum of fifteen (15) head must be shown in the junior Angus heifer classes to receive American Angus Association premium participation. The show is not required to have all classes to be eligible for premiums.
- 4. Separate classes for bred and owned heifers may be held if the size of the show merits a separate class.
- 5. Any female shown with a calf at side: the calf must be the cow's most recent natural calf, and the calf must be registered by show day and have the original registration certificate at check in.
- 6. To be eligible for Association premiums heifer entries must be recorded in the sole name of the junior exhibitor and the issue date on the registration certificate must conform to the individual show's requirements regarding ownership. The Association's contribution is included in the total premiums listed in each class.
- 7. Premiums from the Association are paid only to registered Angus cattle and only if the registration number is a part of the show report provided to the Association. Therefore, all cattle should be registered at the time of entry to make certain they receive the Association's portion of premiums. The Association does not pay a percentage on premiums offered in championship classes. An animal may only be counted one time toward the total count for premium participation by the Association.
- 8. Exhibitors must have the original registration certificate on each animal available for inspection at the show. Electronically stored registration certificates are NOT accepted only the original certificates issued by the American Angus Association. Any animal, upon check-in, which does not have a legible permanent identification mark (ear tattoo marks, freeze-branded marks or hot-branded marks) corresponding to the permanent identification mark on the registration certificate is ineligible to show. Once disqualified due to an incorrect or illegible permanent identification mark, animals cannot be re-tattooed and rechecked at the show.
- 9. Only one person at a time shall lead animals into the show ring.
- 10. Exhibitors who participate in shows that accept premium monies contributed by the American Angus Association are subject to the Association Rules as found in the Breeder's Reference Guide of the Association. These rules are found in Part 2; Association Rules. The rules relating directly with the exhibition of Angus cattle are Part 2: Association Rules; Rule 800 Series; including Rule 800-810. These rules can be found at www.angus.org.
- 11. Altering the conformation and/or appearance of an animal for exhibition is prohibited. This includes the covering of white skin, false tail heads (or use of any false hair), with the exception of false tail switches. The use of graphite, powders, hemp or other similar substances used externally are also prohibited. Other prohibited products include those used internally such as steroids, illegal or unlicensed pharmaceuticals or artificial filling. Any animal found to be in violation will be barred from showing.
- 12. At any show for which the American Angus Association appropriates funds toward the payment of premiums, no exhibitors, individuals assisting exhibitors or member owners at such show shall be allowed to use any coloring agents, on any animal exhibited. The Association may adopt and implement various tests designed to monitor this prohibition, including but not limited to a "white towel" or "white glove" test. No aerosol cans or other pressurized containers will be allowed in designated make up areas.

- 13. All animals exhibited are subject to DNA marker or blood type tests to verify accuracy of parentage as covered under the Association Rules and for other testing as required by the individual show.
- 14. Authorized representatives of the Association have the authority to enforce the rules set forth herein as well as in the Association Rules, including the barring of a registered animal from a livestock show at which it is to be shown, if there are reasonable grounds to believe a violation has occurred.

Animals will not be shown that have any foreign object(s) attached to it in any manner nor will animals be allowed to be shown that have their natural color altered in a manner so as to change the conformation or appearance. Exhibitors failing to abide by this rule will be dismissed from the arena and/or forfeit premiums, awards and points won by same exhibitors. (4/19/08)



GENERAL RULES

The **2015 Texas** Junior Red Angus Association Futurity will be held in conjunction with the **2015 State Fair of Texas**. The State Fair of Texas Junior Red Angus show will serve as the official Texas Junior Red Angus Association State Show.

I. 2015 Pan American Livestock Exposition Open Red Angus, October 9, 2015

A. This show will follow and comply with all State Fair of Texas Rules and entry deadlines. Visit <u>www.bigtex.com</u> for complete premium list. **To participate in the show you must enter through the State** Fair of Texas by September 1, 2015. Entry Fee \$30/per head

II. 2015 Texas Red Angus Junior State Bred and Owned Female and Bull Show & Showmanship, October 9, 2015

A. This show will follow and comply with all State Fair of Texas Rules and entry deadlines. Visit <u>www.bigtex.com</u> for complete premium list. **To participate in the show you must enter through the State Fair of Texas by August 25, 2015. Entry Fee \$30/per head**

B. All cattle must be BRED AND OWNED by the Junior Exhibitor and must be entered to show in the State Fair of Texas Junior or Pan American Livestock Exposition Open Red Angus show.

III. 2015 State Fair of Texas & Texas Red Angus Youth State Show and Texas State Junior Show, October 10, 2015

A. This show will follow and comply with all State Fair of Texas Rules and entry deadlines. Visit <u>www.bigtex.com</u> for complete premium list. **To participate in the show you must enter through the State Fair of Texas by August 25, 2015. Entry Fee \$30/per head**

IV. Futurity Contest Registration, Entry, and Fees

A. Individual entry forms and required fees for the Texas Junior Red Angus Association contests must be postmarked by the entry deadline of **September 18**. If postmark is after September 19 a late fee of \$10 per exhibitor will be incurred. The areas of competition in which an individual will participate must be designated at the same time.

B. Fees are located on the entry form. Entry fee of \$25 enters the junior into the futurity and to each contest.

C. All checks will be written to the *Texas Junior Red Angus Assoc.* and must accompany the entry form.

D. All entries will be returned to address designated on entry form.

V. Eligibility

A. Participants in the State Futurity Contests must be paid members of the Junior Texas Red Angus Association.

B. Contest participants must not have reached their 21st birthday prior to September 1, 2015.

COMPETITION AND AWARDS

I. Novice, Junior, Intermediate, and Senior Division Eligibility

A. Contestants 8 years and under who have not reached their 8th birthday by September 1, 2015, and are not eligible 4-H members must compete in the Novice division. Novice contestants may participate in all contests except the cattle shows. Contests will be age appropriate.

**Novices who participate in showmanship may be accompanied by an adult in the showing. **

B. To compete in the Junior Division, a contestant must be 8 years old prior to September 1, 2015, and not have reached their 13th birthday prior to September 1, 2015.

C. To compete in the Intermediate Division, contestants must be 13-16 years old on September 1, 2015,

and not have reached their 13th birthday prior to September 1, 2015.

D. To compete in the Senior Division, contestants must be 17-21 years old on September 1, 2015, and not have reached their 21st birthday prior to September 1, 2015.

II. Individual Competition

A. At the Futurity, overall competition will be determined by points won in four events: Cattlemen's Quiz Public Speaking, Photography, Sales Talk, and Skill-A-Thon.

B. The top 15 competitors in the Cattlemen's Quiz, Public Speaking, Photography, Sales Talk, and Skill-A-Thon, will receive points, with the highest score receiving 15 points and each subsequent score receiving one less point down to one point for fifteenth place.

C. To compete in the overall contest and be eligible for awards, a contestant must compete in four of the five following events: Cattlemen's Quiz Photography, Public Speaking, Sales Talk, and Skill-A-Thon. Contestants must compete in either sales talk or public speaking to be eligible for overall competition.

D. Contestants are required to wear the official Futurity shirt during the contests.

III. Ties

A. Ties will be broken by comparing scores in the order of the following events: Cattlemen's Quiz, Judging Contest, and Public Speaking.

IV. Recognition and Awards

To receive awards, contestants must attend the awards ceremony and dinner on Saturday, October 11, 2015. The only exceptions must be approved by the TJRAA Board. Approval for early release must be brought to TJRAA Board's attention by the completion of contestant check-in.

A. Awards will be presented to winners in the Novice, Junior, Intermediate, and Senior Divisions in each event.

B. Overall competition – The top individuals in the Novice, Junior, Intermediate, and Senior Divisions will receive an award.

V. Conduct and Disciplinary Action

A. All TJRAA members in attendance at the TJRAA Futurity are expected to conduct themselves in a manner becoming to a member of the TJRAA.

B. Violations of the above standard include, but are not limited to: misrepresentation of animals, vandalism, theft, fighting, unsportsmanlike conduct, and failure to comply with the directives of Futurity officials, possessing or being under the influence of intoxicating beverages or other prohibited substances, or willful violation of rules.

C. TJRAA Board Members and Advisers, upon finding an individual in violation of conduct, may take action as deemed necessary.

VI. Liability Provisions

A. All contestants must supply a signed release statement from a parent or legal guardian before being allowed to participate. The release statement is provided on the individual entry form.

B. The Texas Junior Red Angus Association and/or any of its employees are not responsible for accidents or theft that may occur during the Futurity.

CONTEST RULES

Cattlemen's Quiz

The quiz will consist of multiple choice and true/false questions.

One and one half hour will be allotted for contestants to complete the quiz.

Notes, books, and reference materials are not permitted in the testing area. All materials will be provided, including a Sire Summary, quiz questions, answer sheet, and pencils.

Conferring with other contestants, use of cell phones, or any other form of cheating will be grounds for disqualification of contestants.

Ties will be broken according to pre-designated tie breaking questions.

Primary resources for questions used on the quiz will be derived from the Texas 4-H Beef Bowl Quiz and Texas 4-H Managing Beef Cattle for Show. Both of these documents are located on the junior section of http://www.texasredangus.org

Public Speaking

The junior age division will be doing a prepared speech, while Intermediate and Senior age divisions will participate in extemporaneous speaking.

Contestant speaking order will be selected in a random drawing. Contestants are free to choose their subject matter. However, speech topics should pertain to the Red Angus breed, or the beef industry.

Contestants should present prepared speeches composed of original material. Contestants MAY NOT repeat a speech previously used in this contest. If sources of information are used in speech preparation, the source should be cited. In speeches that address technical or scientific matter, resource information should be given. The speaker must give credit when he/she quotes directly the words or writings of another individual.

Extemporaneous contestants will be given 30 minutes to prepare a speech on one of three randomly selected Red Angus and beef topics. Materials will be provided on the topics to develop speeches.

Speeches will be 3 to 5 minutes in length. Time elapsed will be posted during the speech so contestants are aware of timing. Speakers, who finish before 3 minutes have elapsed, or after 5 minutes have passed, will be penalized 1 point for each second over/under. Following the speech, time is allowed to judges to ask questions.

Following each speech, the panel of judges will be allowed to ask relevant questions to participants in ALL DIVISIONS.

Contestants are permitted to use notes, but excessive reference to note cards may result in point deductions by the judge.

No props, visual aids, music, etc. will be permitted.

At the conclusion of each speaker, judges will total scores for that speaker. The scores shall then be averaged and a ranking of contestants determined at the conclusion of the contest.

Skill-A-Thon

The purpose of this contest is to assess practical skills related to the beef industry and Red Angus cattle.

Contest may include a visual identification via Power Point, identification of the actual equipment, or a combination of the two,

Contest may include but is not limited to: identification, practical usage, beef industry problem solving, and practical application of ARA materials.

Contestants may not bring notes, books, or reference materials into the contest area.

While the contest is in progress, there shall be no conferring between contestants, use of cell phones, use of notes, or any other form of cheating. Any violation will be grounds for disqualification from the contest.

Ties will be broken by clearly marked tie-breaker questions. If a tie still remains, the tie will be broken according to placing on the Cattlemen's Quiz.

Sales Talk

The Sales Talk uses a live setting complete with animal or a photo (no larger than 8x10) and potential buyers. The purpose of this contest is to evaluate the effectiveness of the presentation and the contestant's ability to merchandise cattle.

Contestants may use any entry or photo (no larger than 8x10) of a Red Angus animal as the subject of the Sales Talk. Contestants may use a heifer/cow other than their own. The contestant may hold or tie the heifer/cow, or have another contestant hold the heifer/cow during the talk. The heifer/cow is not to be fitted.

Before the talk, contestants will be required to provide judges with a registration certificate for the animal being "sold". The judges will use the registration certificate to evaluate the accuracy of pedigree and performance information provided by the contestant and to also ask questions. The certificate will be returned to the contestant at the end of the talk.

Contestants will be judged on their knowledge of the animal they are selling (25%), ability to relate important information about the heifer/cow (organization and style-25%), poise and delivery (25%), and overall effectiveness in convincing the judge to buy the animal (25%).

A contestant's score will be reduced 10% if additional materials are presented to the judges other than those listed in the above rules.

Sales Talk will be 5-7 minutes in length. Time elapsed will be indicated during the contest so that contestants are aware of time constraints.

Photography Contest

1. All work must be that of the entrant.

2. Photos are to be 8x10-inch (in.) color or black-and-white prints mounted on a 10x14-in.black foam core. Photos should not be matted or framed. Mount the completed 3x5 index card with the contestant name, age division, entry division and photo title on the back side, in the upper left-hand corner of the form core.

3. Photos must be taken by the contestant during the past year. Photo cannot be altered or image-enhanced in any way.

4. There will be four subject categories: Angus Cattle, Landscapes, People and Around the Farm or Ranch. Contestants may enter only one photo per category. Each entry may apply to no more than one subject category. The contestant should declare what subject category the photo is to be judged, as the photograph is representative of the contestant's interpretation of the category. Judges, however, reserve the right to move an entry to a more suitable category. Should the contestant already have a photograph in the more suitable subject category, judges are empowered to disqualify a photograph from competition. Further explanation of the subject categories is listed below.

- Red Angus Cattle Photographs that highlight Red Angus cattle on the farm or ranch or at an Red Angus event. The cattle should be the dominate focus of the picture.
- Landscape Photographs that focus on scenery around the farm or ranch. Red Angus cattle should be included in the photo.
- People Photographs that show a Red Angus junior and/or family, friends, fellow junior members, etc., either involved in activities on the farm or ranch or at a Red Angus event.
- Around the Farm or Ranch Photographs that highlight activities and scenes around the farm or ranch.
- 5. A maximum of two entries per contestant is allowed, with only one entry per division. Only one photo will go towards the points for the overall competition.

- 2. Entries must have a legible firebrand or legible ear tattoos depending upon their respective association. Scurs, brindling and white in front of the navel are prohibited. Artificial coloring, false tails or tail heads are prohibited.
- 3. Females 24 months of age or older must have a certificate of pregnancy issued by a licensed veterinarian available for inspection or have a calf at side and be lactating with the exception of those in an embryo donor program, may be open within 90 days of the show date, after 90 days they must be bred. A veterinarian's certificate of such embryo work must be present. - 1. **RULES/REGULATIONS**: Entries made in this department shall be subject to and each exhibitor agrees to abide by the General Rules and Regulations and Youth Livestock Show and Events Special Rules.
- 2. ENTRY LIMITATION: No exhibitor shall be permitted to show more than two market beef steers. If both steers place high enough to make the sale, ONLY the highest placing steer will sale. Only exception to this rules is if exhibitor has BOTH the Grand and Reserve Grand Champion Steers.
- 3. **OWNERSHIP**: All entries must be owned and continuously cared for by the exhibitor from June 30 through the show date of the Fair.
- 4. **VALIDATION**: This show will adhere to the Texas 4-H/FFA Steer Validation Program. Failure to abide by these rules will result in disqualification.
- 5. **ASSISTANCE**: Market steers may be led through the sifting procedure by owner, another qualified youth exhibitor, or parent/adult leader from the exhibitor's chapter or county. Parents or other adults will not be allowed to assist youth exhibitors during judging of classes.
- 6. **PROCESSING**: Market steers will be classified and hair checked by division in the same order as listed in the premium list. Market beef steers must meet the following requirements or automatically be sifted:
 - a. Be slick shorn to no more than 1/4" on any location of the body, excluding tail switch.
 - b. Be free of grubs or grub damage.
 - c. Be dehorned and show no secondary horn growth in excess of one inch.
 - d. Be trained to lead easily and handle properly through processing and in the show ring.
 - e. Market beef not shorn will be disqualified from showing.

Decisions of official veterinarians, classifiers, and/or sifters is final and no protests will be considered by show management.

- 7. SHOW WEIGHTS: Exhibitors will turn in the official show weight for their steer. Steers weighing less than 1,000 pounds will be sifted. Exhibitors must completely enter the State Validation Tag Number and Weight on the Class Card provided in the Exhibitor's Packet. This card must be presented to Superintendents at classification and hair check. Upon completion of classification, the exhibitor will check in at the designated kiosk and will be given the Exhibitor Receipt and Consignee Receipt sections of their class card. Exhibitors must have the remaining portions of the class card to show and/or consign their animals. NO FURTHER CHANGES WILL BE MADE AFTER SHOW WEIGHTS ARE ENTERED.
- 8. EAR TAGS: Steers must have a Texas State Validation ear tag. Only validation tags will be allowed. All other tags must be removed prior to arrival. If an animal is missing the Texas State Validation ear tag upon arrival, it is the exhibitor's responsibility to notify the Superintendent immediately.
- 9. **TIE OUTS**: A limited number of tie out spaces will be sold on a first come first serve basis. Tie outs may be purchased at time of entry or from the Livestock Office. Tie outs will be assigned upon arrival when the exhibitor provides proof of purchase to the superintendent. Cattle will not be removed to tie outs until 7:00 PM daily.
- 10. **GROOMING**: All animals must be shorn before arrival on the grounds. Animals are to be shown in natural conformation and color. Grooming materials leaving any color or other residue are not permitted.
- 11. **RE-WEIGH**: After judging of each class is completed, all placing steers will be re-weighed. Any animal weighing more than 105% of the weight turned in will be disqualified. Animals remaining qualified after weigh-back will advance in placing if animals placing higher are disqualified. The State Fair of Texas reserves the right to weigh back any animal.
- 12. SHOW AND SOLD BY RULE: Exhibitors qualifying for the Youth Livestock Auction of Champions must be present sale day to sell their project and receive the proceeds. Any exhibitor not present sale day will FORFEIT ALL SALE AND PREMIUM MONIES. If the exhibitor has met the qualifications for a substitute

exhibitor during the show itself, THEY are the only one allowed to also walk through the Sale Ring with that animal.

- 13. AUCTION OF CHAMPIONS: A total of 56 steers will be in the premium auction. All first place, breed and reserve breed champions will sell. The number of steers qualifying within each breedtype division for the premium auction will be pro rated based on the percentage that each division makes up of the total number shown. Within a division, sale priority will be determined in the following order: class furnishing Division Champion, class furnishing Division Reserve Champion, heaviest class to lightest class. - 2. ENTRY LIMITATION: No exhibitor shall be permitted to show more than one market barrow. All animals entered must be physically neutered males.
- **3. STALLING**: Barrows may be stalled with other Counties/Chapters. There will be approximately 3-5 barrows per pen. BRING dividers, they will not be provided for you.
- 4. **OWNERSHIP**: All entries must be owned and continuously cared for by the exhibitor from June 30 through the show date of the Fair.
- **5. VALIDATION**: This show will adhere to the recommendations of the Texas 4-H/FFA Barrow Validation Program. Failure to abide by these rules will result in disqualification.
- 6. ASSISTANCE: Parents or other adults will not be allowed to assist youth exhibitors during judging of classes.
- 7. SHOW WEIGHTS: Exhibitors will turn in the official show weight for their barrow. Show weight will be no less than 230 pounds and not exceed a maximum of 280 pounds. All barrows outside this range will be sifted. Exhibitors must completely enter the State Validation Tag Number, Breed and Weight on the Class Card provided in the Exhibitor's Packet. This card must be presented to Superintendent. Breeds must be declared at this time. Upon completion of Class Card, the exhibitor will be check in using a designated kiosk and will be given the Exhibitor Receipt and Consignee Receipt sections of their class card. Exhibitors must have the remaining portions of the class card to show and/or consign their animals. NO FURTHER CHANGES WILL BE MADE AFTER SHOW WEIGHTS ARE ENTERED.
- 8. EAR TAGS: Barrows must have a Texas State Validation ear tag. Only validation tags will be allowed. All other tags must be removed prior to arrival. - 13. AUCTION ANIMAL RELOCATION: All drug tested barrows need to be relocated to the Sale Pens 30 minutes after show. Exhibitors that make the sale with lower placed animals will deliver their animals directly to the consignment truck. BERKSHIRE

- 1. Black and white with erect ears exhibiting Berkshire character.
- 2. A Berkshire must have white on all four legs, face and tail (unless tail is docked). One of the white leg points may also be missing.
- 3. Must be ear notched within seven days of birth.
- 4. A Berkshire must NOT have a solid white or a solid black face from ears forward.
- 5. A Berkshire must NOT have a solid black nose (rim of nose).
- 6. White is allowed on the ears, but NO solid white may appear on the ears.
- 7. Occasional splash of white may appear on the body.

POLAND CHINA

- 1. Must possess Poland China Breed characteristics.
- 2. Must be ear notched within seven days of birth.
- 3. Must be black with six white points (face, feet and switch) Note* (tail docking is permissible) with an occasional splash of white on the body. A hog may not possess more than one solid black leg and be determined as Poland China.
- 4. Must have ears down.
- 5. Must not have evidence of a belt formation.
- 6. Cannot have red or sandy hair and/or pigmentation.
- 7. Hogs that have weighted ear tags or evidence of tampering of ears with possible ear tags are ineligible.

SPOTTED SWINE

- 1. Must be black and white.
- 2. Must possess Spotted Breed character.
- 3. Must be ear notched within seven days of birth.
- 4. Ears cannot be erect.
- 5. Any red tinted or brown spots are ineligible.
- 6. No solid black head from ears forward.
- 7. No distinct white belt pattern (hair or skin) encircling and extending down and onto each shoulder.
- 8. Any signs of weighted ear tags or evidence of passed existence of such tags are determined not to be permissible and are grounds for disqualification.

CHESTER WHITE

- 1. Must possess Chester White Breed characteristics.
- 2. Must be ear notched within seven days of birth.
- 3. Must be solid white in color, no color on the skin larger than a silver dollar, no colored hair.
- 4. Any skin pigmentation other than white that exceeds five in number are disqualified.
- 5. Ears must be down and medium size.
- 6. Any signs of weighted ear tags or evidence of past existence of such ear tags are determined to be not permissible and are grounds for disqualification.

LANDRACE

- 1. Must be white in color and possess Landrace Breed character. (ears must be down)
- 2. Must be ear notched within seven days of birth.

- 3. Must NOT allow any color hair other than white.
- 4. Must NOT allow more than three spots of skin pigmentation.
- 5. Must NOT allow any spot of skin pigmentation larger than one U.S. minted quarter.

DUROC

- 1. Must be red in color and possess Duroc Breed character. (ears must be down and medium size.
- 2. Must be ear notched within seven days of birth.
- 3. Must NOT have any white hair located on the animal.
- 4. Must NOT have any black hair.
- 5. Must NOT have more than three black spots on the skin and none of these spots can be larger than two inches in diameter.
- 6. Must NOT have any shading or indication of a belt.

HAMPSHIRE

- 1. Must be black in color with a white belt starting on the front leg. The belt may partially or totally encircle the body.
- 2. Must possess Hampshire Breed character. (ears must be erect and not rounded)
- 3. Must be ear notched within seven days of birth.
- 4. Must NOT have any white hair or indications of streaking on the forehead.
- 5. Must NOT have any red hair.

YORKSHIRE

- 1. Must be white in color and possess Yorkshire Breed character. (ears must be erect)
- 2. Must be ear notched within seven days of birth.
- 3. Must NOT have any colored hair other than white.
- 4. Must NOT have colored skin pigmentation larger than one U.S. minted silver dollar.
- 5. Must NOT have masking above the eyes larger than a silver dollar.

DARK CROSSBRED

Barrows with black pigmentation (NOT BLUE) comprising at least <u>20%</u> of the total body and classed out Durocs shall be considered a Dark Cross. The barrows may be black, black patched or spotted black. Barrows with blue pigmentation are NOT considered Dark Crosses.

DORPER

Acceptable Breed Characteristics

- 1. Must be a Dorper, White Dorper, or a cross among these two breeds.
- 2. Conformation long, deep, wide body with well sprung ribs and excellent muscling. Relationship between body depth and hip height should be in equal proportion. Avoid extremely leggy, shallow bodied lambs.
- 3. Head should be strong, bold, with a deep jaw.
- 4. Polled or small horns or scurs.
- 5. Must have at least 1/3 hair primarily on belly, forearm, and britch. Lambs should be shorn with blades that leave enough stubble to be able to distinguish hair and/or wool. Classifiers have the authority to disqualify lambs that have been clipped too close to make this distinction.
- 6. Moderate size ear with no wool covering.
- 7. No wool below the knees and hocks.
- 8. Solid brown, red, rust colored head.
- 9. No wool forward of poll.

10. Color: Dorper - white sheep with black head or black head and neck. White Dorper - white sheep.

Discriminatory Breed Characteristics

- 1. Tall, leggy, shallow bodied, narrow, light muscled lambs.
- 2. Excessive wool covering more than 2/3 of body (belly, forearm, and britch).
- 3. Heavy horns.
- 4. Long, pendulous ears.
- 5. Long, narrow muzzle.
- 6. Wool forward of poll.
- 7. Excessive coloring on the body (paints).
- 8. Excessive speckling in the fleece or on the body.

Absolute Disqualifications

- 1. All wool or very little evidence of hair on belly, forearm, or britch.
- 2. Wool below the knees or hocks
- 3. Wool on the ears.
- 4. Lambs with predominately solid black bodies.
- 5. Lambs with significant speckling on face, ears, or legs.
- 6. Strong breed characteristics of breeds other than Dorper or White Dorper.
- 7. Surgical alterations other than re-docking.
- 8. Steep hip or tendency to show callipyge gene.

FINEWOOL

Acceptable Breed Characteristics

- 1. Rambouillet, Delaine, Debouillet, or a cross between these breeds.
- 2. Silky, white face.
- 3. Silky ears, medium to moderate in length.
- 4. Soft pelt.
- 5. Yellow to white hooves (neutral)

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- 6. Black pads on hooves and black dew claws.
- 7. Nose should be neutral to pink in color.
- 8. May be polled or horned.

Discriminatory Breed Characteristics

- 1. Moderate amounts of brown or black spots in the skin and/or wool.
- 2. Moderate freckling or pigmented skin (brown or black) on the ears, eyes, nose, and lips.
- 3. Moderate amount of black streaking in the hooves.
- 4. Black eyelashes.
- 5. Birthmarks.

Absolute Disqualifications

- 1. Excessively coarse britch and/or harsh pelt.
- 2. Excessive coarse, chalky, white hair on the face, in the flanks, and/or down the front and/or rear legs.
- 3. Excessive brown or black spots in the skin and/or wool.
- 4. Excessive freckling or pigmented skin (brown or black) on the ears, eyes, nose, and lips.
- 5. Brown or black spots in hairline above hooves.
- 6. Solid black hooves.
- 7. Black lambs.
- 8. Surgical alterations other than re-docking.
- 9. Steep hip or tendency to show callipyge gene.

FINEWOOL CROSS

Acceptable Breed Characteristics

- 1. Must be a cross with evidence of at least 50% finewool breeding (not showing evidence of Dorset breed type) and the remaining percentage exhibiting predominance of Hampshire and/or Suffolk breeding.
- 2. Soft pelt which is characteristic of 1/2 blood wool (60's-62's spinning count).
- 3. Face and ears should be soft and silky.
- 4. Mottling and/or some spotting on the face and ears and on legs below the knees and hocks.
- 5. Light brown face and ears with little to no mottling.
- 6. Wool must be present below the hocks on the rear legs; wool below the knees on the front legs is not necessary.
- 7. Reddish, rust colored legs are acceptable.
- 8. White, ring-eyed crosses are acceptable if pelt is acceptable.
- 9. Birth marks are acceptable.

Discriminatory Breed Characteristics

- 6. Evidence of Dorset breed type (head and ear shape of Dorset)
- 7. Surgical alterations other than re-docking.
- 8. Steep hip or tendency to show callipyge gene.

<u>SOUTHDOWN</u>

Acceptable Breed Characteristics

- 1. Hair color on muzzle should be mouse colored, gray to brown.

Absolute Disqualifications

Grooming tables are not allowed in any aisle or walkway. Animals are to be shown in natural conformation and color. Grooming materials leaving any kind of residue are not permitted.
- **11. RE-WEIGH**: All goats placing high enough for sale consideration will be re-weighed. Goats with weights more than 5 pounds above or below the weight turned in will be disqualified. The State Fair of Texas reserves the right to weigh back any animal.
- 12. SHOW AND SOLD BY RULE: Exhibitors qualifying for the Youth Livestock Auction of Champions must be present sale day to sell their project and receive the proceeds. Any exhibitor not present sale day will FORFEIT ALL SALE AND PREMIUM MONIES. If the exhibitor has met the qualifications for a substitute exhibitor during the show itself, THEY are the only one allowed to also walk through the Sale Ring with that animal.
- **13.** AUCTION OF CHAMPIONS: A total of 36 goats will be in the premium auction. The 1st, 2nd, 3rd, and 4th place goats in each class ARE <u>REQUIRED</u> TO SELL. Auction lot numbers will be given at 10:00 AM Auction morning. See youth auction caps.
- 14. CLASSES AND DIVISIONS: All animals will be weighed and divided into classes as equal in number as possible in three divisions. Each division will have three (3) classes, nine (9) classes total.

DEPARTMENT REQUIREMENTS

- 1. **RULES/REGULATIONS**: Entries made in this department shall be subject to and each exhibitor agrees to abide by the General Rules and Regulations and Youth Livestock Show and Events Special Rules.
- 2. ENTRY LIMITATION: No exhibitor shall be permitted to show more than two pens of three broilers each. All broilers must be ordered from Texas A & M AgriLife Poultry Science Extension Unit.
- 3. BROILER CHICK ORDERS: Broiler chicks must be ordered through Texas A&M University's Poultry Science Department before June 30, 2015. Exhibitors may only order 25, 50, or 75 chicks per exhibitor, and may only exhibit birds from their individual wing band numbers. Broiler pick up is on Thursday, January 29, 2015, at the Louis Pearce Pavilion on the Texas A&M University Campus. All birds must be picked up by 3 p.m. Chicks will be straight run. To order birds, visit Texas A&M Poultry Science website.
- 4. HATCH DATE: Broilers will be approximately 6 weeks of age at show date.
- 5. WINGBANDS: All chicks will be wing banded. The person picking up the chick order at TAMU is responsible for checking and confirming wing bands at the time of pickup. No broiler will be accepted at the State Fair without the original wing band properly in place. Exhibitors are requested to consult with their CEA/AST in the proper management methods of rearing wing banded birds. Each broiler must have the original wing band in place.
- 6. **OWNERSHIP**: All entries must be owned and continuously cared for by the exhibitor from hatch date through the show date of the Fair.
- 7. SUBSTITUTIONS: No substitutions will be allowed in this department.
- 8. FEED: Each exhibitor is required to provide (2) 16oz or smaller containers per entry, as well as their own feed & fresh water until birds are sifted/shown.
- 9. LITTER: Litter will be furnished by the Show.
- 10. SHOW LOCATION: Loading and unloading of broilers will be done at Cattle Barn II.
- **11. SIFTING**: Pens of broilers will be sifted and scored at upon arrival. All entries must be of U.S. Grade A live market quality to be accepted. A pen may be sifted for the lack of uniformity. Any broiler which has no wing band, regardless of reason, will be sifted. Sick or diseased broilers will be refused entry and if discovered during the show, will be removed. Any broiler with reduced comb growth or other secondary sex characteristics, which indicate the presence of a hormone, will be sifted. Sifted birds will be marked at time of sifting. The fair assumes no responsibility for birds or coops.
- 12. JUDGING PROCEDURES: Birds will be split-shown by sex. Eligible youth are required to show/hold all birds County Agents and Agricultural Science Teachers are responsible for having youth holders at judging. Otherwise, broilers will not be considered for premiums.
- **13. METHOD OF AWARDING**: No exhibitor will be awarded more than one place in the top 10 blue ribbon pens.
- 14. TERMINAL SHOW: This is a terminal show for all broilers shown/sifted.

- 2. ENTRY LIMITATION: There is no entry limitation in the Prospect Steers.
- **3. OWNERSHIP**: All entries must be owned and continuously cared for by the exhibitor from June 30 through the show date of the Fair.
- **4. VALIDATION**: This show will adhere to the recommendations of the Texas 4-H/FFA Steer Validation Program. Failure to comply with these rules will result in disqualification.
- 5. ASSISTANCE: Prospect steers may be led through the sifting procedure by owner, another qualified youth exhibitor, or parent/adult leader from the exhibitors chapter or county. Parents or other adults will not be allowed to assist youth exhibitors during judging of classes.
- 6. **PROCESSING**: Prospect beef will be classified by division. Prospect beef steers must meet the following requirements or automatically be sifted:
 - a. Weigh a maximum of 1100 pounds,
 - b. All prospect steers will be shown with hair in a natural state WITHOUT the use of glues, adhesives, paints, etc. Steers with any type of glue, paint, adhesive, etc. in the hair will be disqualified and premiums forfeited.
 - c. Be free of grubs or grub damage.
 - d. Be dehorned and show no secondary horn growth in excess of one inch.
 - e. Be trained to lead easily and handle properly through processing and in the show ring.

Decisions of official veterinarians, classifiers, and/or sifters are final and no protests will be considered by show management.

- 7. SHOW WEIGHTS: Exhibitors will turn in the official show weight for their steer. Show weight will be no more than 1100 pounds. All steers with weights more than this turned in will be sifted. Exhibitors must completely enter the State Validation Tag Number and Weight on the Class Card provided in the Exhibitor's Packet. This card must be presented to Superintendents at classification. Upon completion of classification, the exhibitor will check-in at designated kiosk and will be given the Exhibitor Receipt and Consignee Receipt sections of their class card. Exhibitors must have the remaining portions of the class card to show and/or consign their animal. NO FURTHER CHANGES WILL BE MADE AFTER SHOW WEIGHTS ARE ENTERED.
- 8. EAR TAGS: Steers must have a Texas State Validation ear tag. Only validation tags will be allowed. All other tags must be removed prior to arrival. If an animal is missing the Texas State Validation ear tag upon arrival, it is the exhibitor's responsibility to notify the Superintendent immediately.
- **9. TIE OUTS**: A limited number of tie out spaces will be sold on a first come first serve basis. Tie outs may be purchased at time of entry or from the Livestock Office. Tie outs will be assigned upon arrival when the exhibitor provides proof of purchase to the superintendent.

Cattle will not be removed to tie outs until 7:00 PM daily.

- **10. GROOMING**: This is a blow and go show. No clippers which must be plugged into an electrical outlet are permitted. Animals are to be shown in natural conformation and color. Grooming materials leaving any color residue are not permitted.
- 11. RE-WEIGH: After judging of each class is completed, all placing steers will be re-weighed. Any animal weighing more than 105% of the weight turned in will be disqualified. Animals remaining qualified after weigh-back will advance in placing if animals placing higher are disqualified. The State Fair of Texas reserves the right to weigh back any animal.

12. AUCTION OF CHAMPIONS: STEERS ENTERED INTO THE PROSPECT STEER SHOW ARE NOT ELIGIBLE FOR THE AUCTION OF CHAMPIONS.

This show will be governed by the General and Youth Rules and Regulations of the State Fair of Texas and the following special rules. The purpose of this show is to provide an opportunity for 4-H and FFA members to display projects constructed in agricultural mechanics labs; to promote the development of skills in agricultural mechanics through competition; to recognize individual and group accomplishments in the area of agricultural mechanics; and to provide an opportunity for public appreciation of this important phase of 4-H and FFA Youth Programs.

SPECIAL RULES

- ELIGIBILITY: Entries in this division are limited to Texas FFA and 4-H members. Entries must be included on the official group summary sheet submitted by the CEA or AST. Projects exhibited must have been constructed by FFA and 4-H members under direct supervision of the CEA or AST, either as a part of their agricultural mechanics instruction in agricultural science or as a part of their supervised work experience program. <u>Each exhibitor is</u> required to return a Youth Entry Certification Form.
- 2. **OWNERSHIP:** Projects may have been individually or group constructed and may be individually or chapter owned.
- 3. CLUB ENTRIES: Entries made in the name of FFA Chapters or 4-H Clubs are not eligible. All projects must be entered in the names of the exhibitors who participated in planning and construction of the project.
- 4. ENTRY LIMITATION: Each exhibitor may enter two individual projects and no more than one per class. Each group of students may enter no more than two group constructed projects and may have no more than one entry in any project class. No individual exhibitor may enter more than four projects total.
- 5. INELIGIBLE PROJECTS: Any project that does not fit into one of the stated classes will be disqualified by the Show committee.
- 6. SUBSTITUTIONS: All project substitutions must be made at check in with the superintendent. Substitutions will not be allowed after check-in. See Youth Show Rules for exhibitor substitution rules.
- 7. CONSTRUCTION DATE (AG MECH): A project can be exhibited only one time at the State Fair of Texas. All projects must be started on or after April 1, 2014.
- 8. **RESTORATION DATE (TRACTORS):** A tractor can be exhibited only one time at the State Fair of Texas. All restoration projects must be started on or after October 1, 2014.
- **9. EXHIBIT SPACE:** Due to limited exhibit space, please note your space requirements on your entry form. Final space allotment is at the superintendent's discretion.
- **10. PROJECT PRESENTATION:** All projects must be painted or properly treated and must be clean and in a presentable condition, even though they may have been used. Due to limited exhibit space, trailers and other equipment are to be displayed in transport position. Operation of ramps, extensions, and other special features may be demonstrated only as directed by the official judges and as space permits. No additional floor space will be provided for podiums, chairs, tables, show boxes, etc. No electricity will be available for computers, other electronics, etc. Electricity will be available for projects requiring it for operation during judging only. No touch up painting of any type will be allowed.
- 11. EXHIBITOR PRESENTATION/SHOWMANSHIP: Exhibitors should be dressed appropriately and be with their project when it is judged. Exhibitors should be courteous and helpful to those viewing their project, including those exhibiting next to them. Exhibitors should not interfere with or shield those who are exhibiting next to them. Exhibitors should be available to answer questions when their project is being judged. Knowledge of the project will be evaluated at this time. Exhibitors should be well informed of the project they are representing, but should not be boisterous or argumentative. Exhibitors should provide any equipment that may be necessary to judge their project (flashlights, mat or creeper for judging projects that the judge would need to get underneath such as trailers).

Exhibitors may be requested to hold measuring tape and assist the judge in making measurements on projects. An anonymous judge will award showmanship.

- **12. TRAILER REGISTRATION:** Current registration plates or one trip permits and paper plates are required on all trailers that are towed to the project show. Hauled trailers will be exempt from this rule.
- **13. DOCUMENTATION:** An original (exhibitor drawn) plan and drawing, a bill of materials and photographs showing all phases of construction are to be provided with projects. TxDOT and/or ASABE regulations and specifications are to be provided as they apply to individual projects. Display of plans, photos, etc. must be done in such a manner that no additional floor space is required. Stands, podiums, etc. will be permitted only when they can be positioned on or under the project.
- 14. PROJECT SAFETY: Appropriate and safe display stands must be provided for gates, panels, and other projects that need support. Sharp edges and points, such as found on self feeder roofs, bale movers, etc. are to be padded or covered as necessary to prevent injury. All trailers and other equipment that is to be operated and/or transported on public roads are to be equipped with safety equipment specified in Title 7, Vehicles and Traffic Transportation Code of Texas Statutes, Specific chapters regarding width (621.201), lights and reflectors (545.106, 547.324 and 547.331), brakes (547.401), length (621.201) and inspection (621.204) are to be adhered to. Any trailer that exceeds 102 inches in width must have a signed permit. All towed equipment, regardless of standards, is to be equipped with safety chains. All three-point hitch and P.T.O. operated equipment are to meet current ASABE standards. The IMS WEB page will provide information on how to access or acquire TxDOT Equipment and Vehicle Registrations, and ASABE Standards. (www-ims.tamu.edu)
- **15. ELECTRICAL SAFETY:** All 120 VAC and higher electrical plugs and receptacles are to be the equipment grounding type. All metal components are to be grounded. Ground fault circuit interrupters (GFCI) shall be provided for all 120 VAC receptacles. All 50 VAC and higher connections are to be protected in appropriate indoor or outdoor rated enclosures.
- **16. GENERAL SAFETY:** Flammable and/or combustible liquids shall not be used, stored or sprayed inside any State Fair of Texas® building at any time. This shall include, but is not limited to, enamel paints, thinners, reducers, gasoline or any other petroleum based liquids. All liquids must be in properly labeled original containers. All compressed gas cylinders shall be properly secured in place. Hand wheels are to be removed. Protective caps installed and taped. No regulators or hoses are to be installed at any time. No extension cords allowed.
- **17. OFFLOADING ASSISTANCE:** If the project can be removed safely from the trailer, the State Fair of Texas will provide assistance to unload the project. Unloading assistance is left to the discretion of the Superintendents.
- **18. PROJECTS WITH ENGINES:** There is to be no more than two gallons of fuel in any fuel tank. The fuel tank cap is to be in place and sealed with tape. The battery is to be disconnected. This applies to all engines in the exhibit area.
- **19. VEHICLES:** Tractors, truck or other vehicles (including non-entered trailers) are not allowed in the exhibit area as part of the display.
- **20. PROJECT COMPLETENESS:** All projects should be complete including finish. Any item, necessary for use of the project, must be a part of it (example: hinges and latches on gates and panels) including documentation.
- **21. SIGNS:** All projects are to be identified with standard club exhibitor cards. Additional signs, banners, etc. are encouraged, but are subject to approval by the Committee. No "For Sale" signs will be permitted.
- 22. LOSS OR DAMAGE: Every precaution will be taken to protect the projects entered; however, neither the State Fair of Texas, its management, superintendents nor judges of this Division will be responsible for any loss or damage to projects

24. TRACTOR RESTORATION:

- a. No yard tractors or riding lawnmowers.
- b. Tractors with steel lugs Exhibitors must provide mats or lumber/plywood to serve as runners to protect asphalt and concrete from damage.
- c. Tractor Serial Number must be included with Description on Entry Form.
- **25.** Judging Criteria for Tractor Restoration projects:
 - a. Aesthetics: 15 points. Overall appearance of tractor, including workmanship and finish. Items that will be

considered include, but are not limited to the following:

- Metal preparation prior to painting
- Completeness of all sheet metal
- Painting and finish
- Detail and completeness of components steering wheels, seats, decals, instrument panels, wiring harness, etc.
- b. Authentic: 10 points. Must be as original as possible. To include:
 - Paint color, fasteners, and other components such as magnetos, carburetors, exhaust systems
 - Mechanical systems, fuel, electrical, engine, transmission, final drive, cooling, etc.
 - Serial plates in place with unaltered serial numbers
- c. **Mechanical: 40 points**. To include the mechanical restoration of all systems including: (some tractors may not have all systems)
 - Engine, transmission, final drive

• Fuel, cooling, ignition, lighting, exhaust, charging, starting, hydraulic and steering systems Exhibitors will be asked to start the tractor and drive it, demonstrating all gears along with systems (hydraulics, lights, brakes, etc.). Driving and mechanical evaluation will be done outside when offloading on Monday. Exhibitors may be asked to move tractors back outside for additional driving and mechanical evaluation on Tuesday. A Mechanical Check Sheet, which tractor judges use in their evaluation, will be posted on the website as soon as it becomes available. These score sheets will include (a) Checks on Systems – engine – transmission – final drive – brakes/steering – lights/safety equipment – cranking/charging and PTO/lift/hydraulics; (b) example question that could be used in interviewing exhibitors to ascertain their knowledge; and (c) observations made when tractors are driven.

- d. **Safety Equipment: 5 points**. All equipment that was original to the tractor should be in place (includes all shields and decals). Tractor must be in safe operating condition. To exhibit a tractor, the following safety considerations must be followed:
 - No more than 2 gallons of fuel in the fuel tank
 - Neat and functional drip pans containing floor absorbent material (cat litter) to collect any coolant, oil, or hydraulics that may drip from the tractor
 - Fuel shut off valves, under all fuel tanks, must be functional and all tractors must be exhibited with these valves off
 - An approved ABC fire extinguisher with a minimum of 5 lb. capacity must be provided and placed near the tractor
 - Tractors may be started only at the request of show officials
- e. **Documentation: 15 points**. Documentation must be typed (recommend word processor or spreadsheet) and include the following: (The National FFA Tractor Restoration Competition documentation format may be used.)
 - One page description of the overall restoration project
 - Expense report identifying all costs involved in the restoration
 - Photos (before, during, after) Safe working environments should be depicted in all photos
 - Mechanic's report detailing all mechanical work performed

All documentation is to be arranged in a three-ring notebook, divided and sequenced with a table of contents and page numbers.

- f. **Knowledge: 10 points**. Judges will ask questions to determine the exhibitor/exhibitors knowledge of and involvement in the restoration.
- g. **Presentation: 5 points**. Showmanship includes meeting public, eye contact, introduction, and enthusiasm for describing tractor, articulate and assuring confidence.

- 1. ENTRY: An entry fee of \$25 made payable to State Fair of Texas will be charged per entry. Entries must be made through official State Fair of Texas entry forms and completed online at http://www.bigtex.com/sft/LiveStock/OnlineEntryForm.asp. The form must be completed online; printed; signed by the youth contestant, parent/guardian, and AST/CEA. The original must be post marked by the entry deadline. Any missing forms will be considered incomplete entries and will not be accepted. ONLY ONE speech per contestant. Speeches and manuscripts must be uploaded to judgingcard.com by September 15. Any speech with obscene language will be disgualified.
- 2. MANUSCRIPT: <u>The manuscript and bibliography must be uploaded to judgingcard.com as a single PDF file</u> <u>by September 15, 2015.</u> No late entries will be accepted.
 - a. Manuscripts will be certified and validated by a contest committee to determine if the appropriate division was entered.
 - b. Do not bring a copy of the manuscript to the speaking contest.
 - c. The manuscript must be completed in APA style. Included but not limited to: page numbers, cover page including name, division, age group, and a bibliography. Entry abstract is not required. Information about APA can be found at the following link: www.apastyle.org.
 - d. A bibliography following APA style <u>must</u> be included. Lack of bibliography will result in disqualification.
- 3. **ORIGINALITY:** The manuscript and speech presentation must be the contestant's own effort. A statement of originality is included on the entry form that must be completed online, signed, and mailed.
- 4. ELIGIBILITY: Participation is limited to Texas residents only, who are members of a Texas 4-H Club, FCCLA or Texas FFA Chapter. Exhibitors must be enrolled in, and attending, public, private or home school elementary or secondary schools in Texas and they must be at least 8 years old and in the third grade, but not more than 18 years old on August 31. Exhibitors must be bona fide residents of the State of Texas. Past State Fair of Texas Grand Champion speaking contestant winners who have won scholarships are ineligible to enter.
- 5. **AGE GROUPS:** Contestants will be divided into two age groups.
- a. Junior: 8 years old and in the third grade, but no more than in the eighth grade on August 31.
 - b. Senior: At least ninth grade, but no more than 18 years old on August 31.

6. CONTEST FORMAT:

- a. The speech presentations will be judged by a panel of 2-3 judges.
- b. The junior age group may be combined into one division for judging. The top two junior contestants will compete for Grand and Reserve Champion during the Public Awards Ceremony in the Food & Fiber Pavilion, unless otherwise announced.
- c. Senior contestants will be divided based on Division entered.
- d. The top two contestants in each Division will advance to the Semi-Finals where they will compete for division championship.
- e. If there are more than 15 entries in a Division, show management reserves the right to randomly divide into sub-divisions. The top two entries in the sub-division will advance to the Division Semi-Finals. The top two contestants in the Division Semi-Finals will advance to the Semi-Finals.
- f. Top two senior finalists will compete for Grand and Reserve Champion during the Public Awards Ceremony in the Food & Fiber Pavilion, unless otherwise announced.
- 7. TIME LIMIT: Each speech shall be a minimum of six (6) minutes and a maximum of eight (8) minutes. Deductions will be applied to overall score if time is under/over the allotted time. Time point deductions will apply as follows: Under six minutes one point per ten seconds, over eight minutes one point per ten seconds.

- 8. **QUESTION/ANSWER PERIOD:** A three-minute question/answer period will follow each speech. At the end of three minutes, time will be called and all questioning will end. If time is called during the student's answer to a question, the contestant may complete his or her answer. Only official judges may ask questions of the contestants.
- 9. **ATTIRE:** Business attire or official 4-H or FFA dress is recommended.
- 10. **PROPS:** The use of props of any kind is prohibited. Violation will result in disqualification.
- 11. **DIVISIONS:** Each contestant will enter their speech in one of nine divisions. The division must be declared on the entry form when submitting the manuscript. There are topics which may be appropriate in more than one division. If a topic is appropriate in more than one division, final division determination of all speeches will be at the discretion of show management.
 - a. <u>Agribusiness</u>: Any current or future subject that addresses topics such as cooperatives, sales, service, communications, entrepreneurship, marketing, finance, commodities, hedging, advertising, etc.
 - b. <u>Agricultural Policy</u>: Any current or future subject that addresses police or legislation on the following: domestic farm issues, international trade, international competition, rural economic development, legal issues, animal welfare, subsidies, price supports, etc.
 - c. <u>Agriculture Communication</u>: Any current or future subject that addresses the process or act of communicating agricultural related information to the public.
 - d. <u>Animal Science</u>: Any current or future subject that addresses any aspects of the dairy, equine, poultry, sheep, goat, swine, beef or specialty animal industries.
 - e. <u>Livestock Show Ethics</u>: Any current or future subject that addresses any aspect of the ethics practiced in the livestock show industry.
 - f. <u>Natural Resources</u>: Any current or future subject that addresses topics such as soil, water, air, water quality, wildlife, forestry, aquaculture, conservation, recreation, recycling, energy environmental issues, etc.
 - g. <u>Horticulture</u>: Any current or future subject that addresses any aspect of the horticulture and/or agronomy industries including floriculture, fruit and/or vegetable production, nursery operations, turf and landscape management, crop production or specialty crop production.
 - h. <u>Western Heritage</u>: Any current or future subject that addresses topics such as western history, culture or heritage.
 - i. <u>Agricultural Technology:</u> Any current or future subject regarding advancements made in agricultural practices through the use of technology, computer systems, or cutting-edge ideas.
- 12. **SCORE SHEET:** The manuscripts will be reviewed and validated by show management prior to the speaking contest. A separate panel of judges will evaluate and score the presentation. - 13. **RESULTS:** The contest results as announced will be final.

- 5. JUDGING: Within the contest, judging will consist of a 15 minute time limit per each contestant.
- 6. **DOCUMENTATION:** Participants must submit the following information to the State Fair of Texas: <u>ATTN:</u> <u>Contest Intern</u>-postmarked no later than September 15th to the address below.
 - **a.** Four copies of the entry's abstract
 - **b.** Four copies of the entry's research paper (stapled or bound copies)

Power, Structural and Technical Systems: The study of agricultural equipment, power systems, alternative fuel sources and precision technology, as well as woodworking, metalworking, welding and project planning for agricultural structures.

Social Systems: The study of human behavior and the interaction of individuals in and to society, including agricultural education, agribusiness economic, agricultural communication, agricultural leadership and other social science applications in agriculture, food and natural resources.

This show will be governed by the General and Youth Rules and Regulations of the State Fair of Texas and the following special rules.

- 1. Objective: Participants will apply for a position in the agricultural industry and write a cover letter/résumé pertaining to the job description. During the contest, participants will fill out a job application, interview before a panel of judges and write a follow up letter once the interview is completed. However, the cover letter, résumé and past work experiences should all reflect true and correct information about the applicant. It is encouraged that participants apply for an agricultural related job that best reflects his/her interests and work experiences.
- 2. Entry: An entry fee of \$25 made payable to the State Fair of Texas will be charged for each job interview entry. Entries must be made through official State Fair of Texas entry forms and completed online at http://www.bigtex.com/sft/LiveStock/OnlineEntryForm.asp. All entries for the 2015 job interview contest will be completed by using the State Fair of Texas entry system. All forms must be completed. Forms with missing information will be considered incomplete entries and will not be accepted. Contestants failing to submit a copy of these materials by this deadline are subject to disqualification.
- 3. Eligibility: Entries in this division are limited to Texas FFA, 4-H and FCCLA members. Cover letters and résumés submitted must have been constructed by FFA, 4-H or FCCLA members under direct supervision of the Agricultural Science Teacher, County Extension Agent or FCCLA Advisor. Participants may enter the contest under only one youth organization (FFA, 4-H, FCCLA). Entries in multiple organizations will result in both submissions being disqualified. Participants must be an actively enrolled member in either the Texas FFA Program, Texas 4-H and Youth Development Program or Texas FCCLA.
- 4. Entry Limitation: Participants may enter only one time in the job interview contest each year under one organization.
- 5. All materials submitted must have been created and written, in their entirety, by a member of FFA, 4-H or FCCLA.
- 6. Contest Format: The event will be held in the following contest format:
 - a. A maximum of 30 participants will be selected from the cover letter/résumé submission as the top participants. Those selected will be notified of their advancement by September 25, 2015 and compete on October 6, 2015. The first round of interviews will be divided among a maximum of three rooms. The top two individuals from each room will then advance to the final round and participate in the interview \ portion of the contest again.
 - b. Contest order will be determined by a random system to determine the order in which they will compete in both rounds.
 - c. At the beginning of the contest, all participants will be given 15 minutes to fill out the job application in unison and then wait their turn to compete in the interview portion of the contest.
 - d. Finalists will compete for Grand and Reserve Champions placing, unless otherwise announced.

- d. A statement of originality signed by the participant, parent(s), and AST, CEA or teacher must be attached to each copy of the cover letter and résumé. The statement of originality should be submitted.
- e. If a participant exceeds the guidelines for the cover letter and/or the résumé, point deductions will be taken at the discretion of the Superintendent, Show Management and Judges.
- f. Each participant should bring **six copies** of their cover letter/résumé on the day of the contest. Printing will not be available onsite. Points will be deducted if six copies are not presented at the time of registration.
- g. Dress Attire: Business attire or Official FFA/4-H/FCCLA attire is recommended.
- h. Application: The participants will begin this portion of the contest in unison before the personal interviews start. The participants will have 10 minutes to complete the application and may bring in a copy of their résumé to use as reference for past employment information.
- i. Personal Interview: Participants will proceed to a room during the contest with two (2) to five (5) judges who will act as the hiring managers for the position in which the participant has applied. The interview will last no more than 10 minutes.
- j. Follow-Up Letter: Participants will conclude the contest by writing or typing a letter to the interview panel thanking them for their time. Contestants are permitted to utilize cover letters and résumés at this time.
- k. Outside Materials: The use of outside materials is limited to business cards and notepads for the personal interview and a copy of the résumé and cover letter for the application. All other materials are prohibited and violation will result in disqualification.
- 8. Score Sheet: The cover letter and résumé will be reviewed and scored by judges prior to the contest. Judges' comments will be returned by mail to the Agriculture Science Teacher, County Extension Agent or FCCLA Advisor following the contest.
- 9. Awards: Awards will be based on the evaluation of the job interview segments to a set of standards.
 - a. Grand Champion: One Grand Champion Award banner will be presented to one participant in addition to a \$250 premium cash prize.
 - b. Placing Awards: Awards will be given to second through sixth place in the contest. Second place will also receive a \$125 premium cash prize.
 - c. Evaluation of the Job Interview Contest: Participants will be evaluated using the following criteria:
- **10. Tiebreakers**: Ties will be broken based on the highest score in the rubric category that carries the most weight. If a tie still exists, then the rubric category that carries the next amount of weight will be used to break the tie. This process will continue in the event that a tie still exists. The superintendent has the authority to further determine tie breakers to declare a winner.

- 1. ENTRY FEE: \$10 per team
- 2. ELIGIBILITY: Entries in this division are limited to Texas FFA, 4-H and FCCLA members. <u>Each exhibitor is</u> required to return a Youth Judging Contest Liability and Indemnity Form.
- 3. All teams must consist of members from the same county 4-H, FFA Chapter or FCCLA Chapter.
- 4. Each team shall consist of a minimum of three and maximum of 4 contestants, with the three highest scores being used to compute team scores.
- 5. Each club or chapter may enter as many teams as desired. Each team must be designated by the teacher or county agent at the time of entry.
- 6. Contestants must be passing all subjects for the semester or grading period immediately preceding the contest.
- 7. There will be no talking between contestants during the contest. Violating this rule may cause the contestants and their teams to be disqualified and ineligible to receive awards.
- 8. Only contestants and contest officials will be permitted in the contest area during the competition.
- 9. Contestants must have their contestant number clearly visible on their clothing.
- **10.** Contestants must advance from one exhibit to the next when instructed to do so.
- **11.** Contestants must evaluate each exhibit in sequence and will not be allowed to return to any exhibit after advancing.
- **12.** Contestants should not in any way willfully obstruct the work of another contestant.
- **13.** If an ineligible contestant is permitted to judge, the team and individual members of that team will be ineligible for prizes and future entry into this contest may be denied to the FFA, 4-H or FCCLA.
- **14.** No electronic communication devices will be allowed in the contest area.
- **15. CONTEST FORMAT:** Twenty Texas agricultural products selected from the Texas Agriculture Product List will be exhibited at separate stations. Contestants will select the correct identification of each product from four possible answers and bubble their answer in on a scantron sheet. Each station will also have one multiple choice question pertaining to the product on display. Questions may be: a) general to the industry that produced the product (i.e. Texas' national ranking, economic impact to Texas, general nutritional content, region of production); or b) specific to the individual product that is on display (i.e. cooking method use, growing season, specific nutrition of the cut or variety). Contestants will be allowed 40 seconds at each station before they are asked to advance to the next station.
- **16. SCORING:** Contestants will receive five points for each product that is correctly identified and five points for each question that is correctly answered. However, for points to be awarded on questions pertaining directly to the product displayed, the product must be correctly identified. Points will be awarded for correct answers to questions general to the industry regardless of the product being correctly identified. (Total possible points: 200 per individual, 600 per team).
- **17. TIES:** Five stations will be selected as tie breakers in advance of the contest. Teams with the highest cumulative scores at these five stations will win any ties. If ties still remain, winners will be determined by the toss of a coin.

- 4. PLANTS: Plants may be mounted specimens or live specimens. For a master plant list and characteristics of each plant, contact Dr. Barron Rector, Contest Coordinator, Extension Range Specialist Office, Texas AgriLife Extension Service, Room 225, Ag Bldg., TAMU, College Station, Texas 77843-2126, (979) 845-2755. This master list of plants was prepared by the Texas AgriLife Extension Service, Department of Vocational Agriculture, Natural Resources Conservation Service, Association of Texas and Water Conservation Districts and show officials.
- 5. **SCORING**: Participants will be given scorecards. Participants will have 45 seconds per plant to identify the plant, write in the common name on the scorecard and check the characteristics. Scoring will be done by points. If the plant name is incorrect, no credit will be given for characteristics correctly identified.
- 6. AWARDS

The State Fair of Texas will award canvas briefcases to the Junior and Senior Champion Team Advisors. Buckles will be awarded to the High Individual in both the Junior and Senior Divisions. Individuals placing 2nd – 10th, in both divisions, will be awarded a Special Award.

Dallas Agricultural Club will award plaques to the Junior Division Champion Team, Junior Division Reserve Champion Team, Senior Division Champion Team, and Senior Division Reserve Champion Team.

- 1. **PURPOSE.** This contest is designed to challenge any youth currently in a wildlife study and enhance their education in the subject of wildlife species and wildlife habitat management.
- REGISTRATION: Registration for this contest should be conducted through your local county extension
 office and in accordance to the registration deadlines of the State Fair of Texas. Additional rules and
 registration details for this contest in accordance with the State Fair of Texas are found in the Exhibitor
 Handbook on their webpage; http://bigtex.com/livestock/exhibitorinfo/.

3. TEAMS.

- a. Contestants may compete as Individuals or as a Team. A Team consists of 2 persons in the same age division. Team members must be from the same school or county program. Team scores will include the total of both members.
- b. Contestants are divided into two age divisions (as of August 31, 2015);
 - i. Junior (8-13 years old)
 - ii. Senior (14-19 years old).
- c. Each exhibitor is required to return a Youth Judging Contest Liability and Indemnity Form.
- 4. STUDY RESOURCE: The study resource for this contest is on the following pages and can be obtained at the following website: <u>http://texas4-h.tamu.edu/project_wildlife/wildlife/</u>. Scroll down to 'State Fair Wildlife Contest' and select 'Contest Study Resource and Rules'. Refer to this resource to understand the contest procedure.

5. EQUIPMENT.

- a. Teams will be provided scan sheets.
- b. Each contestant will be allowed to bring the following items to the contest area:
 - i. Clipboard
 - ii. Colored map pencils
 - iii. Plastic bag for storing scan sheet in wet weather
 - iv. Small ruler or straight edge to help align rows on the score sheets
 - v. 2 or more #2 pencils
 - vi. Backpack with necessary items to be outdoors such as drinking water, sunscreen, raincoat, binoculars, etc.
- c. Contestants will <u>NOT</u> be allowed to bring any of the following items to the contest area:
 - i. Any electronic device (calculators, compasses, phones, PDA's, etc.)
 - ii. Papers of any kind containing contest written information
 - iii. Any contestant bringing any of these items into the contest area will be immediately disqualified from competition.
- 6. **SCORING:** All parts of the contest will be scored for Individual and Team scores. On Teams, each team member's individual score will be used to determine their team score. All contestants are eligible for the high individual placings in their age division. Ties will be broken by the highest score for Part B. Further ties will be broken by using the first miss on Part A.
- 7. **CONTEST PARTS:** The contest will be presented in two parts:
 - a. Identification and Knowledge
 - b. Wildlife Habitat Management

Each of these parts is further explained in the contest **Study Resource** referenced earlier in this document. **Refer to this resource to understand the contest procedure.** All contestants will complete the two parts independently even when on a team.

2015 Study Resource and Procedures

This contest will follow the **Woodland Ecoregion** of Texas as described in this study resource. The wildlife species to study are listed on the chart located in the **Woodland** section of this resource. Only these listed wildlife species will be represented on the contest materials, therefore the only ones within the **Wildlife Species** section necessary for study. The chart also cross references each management practice utilized for each of the wildlife species. Contestants should study and be familiar with all of the practices within the **Wildlife Management Practices (WMPs)** section.

Part A: Identification and Knowledge (120 points possible):

This part of the contest consists of **30 identification items** and **30 multiple choice knowledge questions**. Contestants will be asked to identify an item and answer a question related to the item. Identification items can consist of the listed wildlife species and management practice related items to depict specific management practices (ex: photo of a white-tailed deer spotlight survey, an actual herbicide spray rig, a resulting effect in a habitat [disked ground], etc.). Wildlife species can be presented as photos or drawings, mounted specimen, external body parts (pelts, wings, feet, antlers, etc.), tracks, or calls. Wildlife management practice related items can be presented as photos or drawings, actual items, or a resulting effect in a habitat. Knowledge questions will be developed from any portion of the study resource within the sections **Wildlife Species** (only species listed on the chart) and **Wildlife Management Practices (WMPs)**. Each Identification item and Knowledge Question will be worth 2 points for a total of 120 points possible for this part. Contestants will be given 1 hour to complete this part.

Part B: Wildlife Habitat Management (100 points possible):

This part of the contest requires the contestant to evaluate a habitat and select the wildlife management practices necessary for the current habitat condition specific to **10 of the 18 listed wildlife species** on the chart. The 10 wildlife species will be announced at the contest. A **virtual habitat** depicting an example of the Woodland ecoregion will be presented for evaluation by the contestants. This virtual habitat could be presented in a combination of text, photographs, and videos. Contestants will choose the necessary wildlife management practices by circling the X's on the chart provided (see example chart on next page). Only the wildlife management practices marked with an 'X' are utilized for the specific wildlife species in each column of the chart. Contestants should not add X's to the chart and should circle only the X's needed for each wildlife species based on management requirements and their habitat evaluation. Contestants will be given 1 hour to complete this part.

SPECIAL RULES

- 1. COLLEGE ELIGIBILITY: Junior colleges in the U.S. with agriculture departments are eligible to enter the Junior contest. Senior colleges in the U.S. which offer a degree in animal Science are eligible to enter the Senior contest. The entry application must be signed officially by the team coach, certifying that all team members are eligible for entry in this contest. Each college will be permitted to enter one team in the Senior Division, or one team in each Junior division.
- 2. JUNIOR TEAM: Each Junior team will consist of 5 members and all 5 scores will count for the team total. Each team member is eligible for individual awards in their division. Junior college individual participants designated as alternates will be eligible for individual overall awards in their division. Contestants must be regularly enrolled in a Junior (2 –year program) College and may not have credit for more than 66 semester hours or the equivalent. Contestants must have attended full time the previous semester at the school from which they are competing, or not attended and Junior College the previous semester, in order to be eligible to compete. Students must have a 2.0 GPA on a 4 point scale to be eligible.
 - a. Novice Junior colleges may enter (1) team in this division. Contestants entered in this division may be eligible to complete in the Professional division in future contests. (Subject to other eligibility rules.)
 - b. **Professional –** Junior colleges may enter (1) team in this division. Contestants entered in this division must not have competed in the Junior College Professional Division in past years, and may be eligible to enter the Senior College Division in future contests.
- 3. SENIOR TEAM: Each Senior College may enter 1 team consisting of 5 members and all 5 will count for the team total. Each team member is eligible for individual awards. Senior college individual participants designated as alternates will be eligible for individual overall awards. Contestants must be regularly enrolled in a senior college which offers a degree in animal science. Students who have participated as contestants in senior intercollegiate livestock judging contests of interstate or international character previous to January 1 are not eligible to enter this contest. Contestants must have been regularly enrolled in their respective colleges the previous semester and must not have served any time as an animal science instructor at any secondary school or college.
- 4. BARN ENTRY: No contestant or coach will be permitted to enter the Show barns 24 hours prior to the contest.
- 5. ARENA SEATING: Coaches and alternates will not be permitted in the seats of the arena while the contest is in progress. Coaches and alternates may be permitted to see the classes after the judging is completed.
- 6. CLASS MAKEUP: Each class will consist of four animals. Animals within a class will be designated by numbers 1, 2, 3 and 4. The following classes will be judged: a total of four sheep/goat classes (any combination of market lamb classes, market goat classes, breeding sheep classes (fine wool or medium wool), and/or breeding goat classes); a total of four to five classes of cattle (any combination of market steer classes and/or breeding cattle classes); and a total of three to four swine classes (any combination of market and/or breeding hogs). When available, records may be used for evaluation of breeding classes. Actual class makeup is subject to change within the aforementioned list of classes.
- 7. TIME: On each class of livestock, contestants will be allowed fifteen (15) minutes to make their observations, record their placings, and take such notes as will assist them in remembering the class when they appear before the judge. All groups will be notified two (2) minutes before the time is up. All contestants shall hand their cards bearing their number, class of animals, and placings, to the group

leader immediately when called for. When final time is called, groups will change to other classes as directed by the Superintendent.

- 8. ORAL REASONS: After placing all classes in the contest, the contestants will appear singly before a judge to give oral reasons substantiating their placings on certain classes. Each contestant will be allowed two (2) minutes to give reasons on each class. No contestant will be allowed to hold any paper or device of any kind that will assist in stating reasons to the judge. Seniors 8 sets, Junior Professionals 8 sets, and Junior Novice 6 sets.
- **9. DRESS CODE**: No contestant will wear any uniform, college colors or belt buckle, or will in any way signify to the judge his/her identity or the identity of the college represented.
- **10. TALKING**: While the contest is in progress, there is to be no conferring between contestants or anyone else, except as directed by the Superintendent or his representative.
- **11. RULE VIOLATIONS**: Any coach or contestant who violates any of the rules of this contest will be barred from competing in future contests and their team will be disqualified for any awards.
- 12. TIES: Ties will be broken using species reasons scores, overall reasons scores and overall score when breaking ties within species. Ties within reasons will be broken by overall score and ties within overall score will be broken by overall reasons. Scores tied after application of these tie breakers will be broken by a method determined by contest officials. No duplicate awards will be given.
- **13. SCORING**: Scan sheets used for scoring will be provided by the Fair. - 1. RULES/REGULATIONS: Entries made in this department shall be subject to and each exhibitor agrees to abide by the General Rules and Regulations and Youth Livestock Show and Events Special Rules.
- 2. AGE DIVISIONS: Determined by a participant's age as of September 1.
 - a. Junior Division: be eight (8) years old and in the third grade, but not have reached their fourteenth (14th) birthday on September 1, 2015.
 - b. Senior Division: be in the ninth grade or have passed their fourteenth (14th) birthday, but not older than nineteen (19) years old on September 1, 2015.
- **3. MEMBERS PER TEAM:** Each team will have at least three (3) and no more than five (5) members. Teams may not include members in different age divisions (i.e. juniors mixed with seniors).
- 4. ENTRY FÉE: An entry fee of \$75 per team made payable to the State Fair of Texas will be charged. Entries MUST be submitted online or by mail prior to entry deadline, September 15, 2015.
- 5. FOOD CATEGORIES: There will be four food categories in each age division: 1) Main Dish, 2) Fruits and Vegetables, 3) Bread and Cereal, and 4) Nutritious Snacks. Teams will be randomly assigned to a category, which will not be announced until check-in the day of the contest.
- 6. ATTIRE: All contestants should wear closed-toe shoes and clothes appropriate for cooking. Each team has the option of wearing coordinated clothing, aprons or hair coverings; however, such attire is not required.
- 7. RESOURCE MATERIALS: Resource materials will be provided for each team to use during the contest to help prepare their team presentation. These include Choose My Plate 10 Tips to a Great Plate, Fight Bac Fight Foodborne Bacteria Brochure, Nutrient Needs at a Glance, Altering Recipes for Good Health, Food Challenge Worksheet, and copies of grocery receipts. No other resource materials will be allowed. Teams may not use personal copies of the resources during the contest.
- 8. SUPPLY BOX: Each team must supply their own equipment for the food challenge. Teams may bring only the supplies listed in the contest supply box list. Supply boxes will be checked by contest officials as teams check in for the contest. Any extra equipment will be removed from the team's supply box.
- 9. CONTEST FORMAT: The contest consists of two parts: 1) Preparation and 2) Presentation.
- **10. PREPARATION:** Each team will be assigned a cooking station (one table) and provided with a set of ingredients reflective of the assigned category. Each team will then have forty minutes to plan and prepare the dish using the ingredients provided at the cooking station and in the pantry, develop a presentation, and clean up their cooking station. The amounts of ingredients, based upon a recipe, and a clue will be at each station to assist the team.
 - a. The ingredients provided to each team are based upon a recipe. Teams are challenged with being creative and developing their own recipe with the ingredients provided.
 - b. Teams must incorporate each ingredient into the dish. However, teams may determine the exact amount of each ingredient to use.
 - c. Teams will have access to a "pantry" of additional ingredients that may be incorporated into their recipe. The number of additional ingredients a team may get will be determined by contest officials and announced during orientation.
 - d. The ingredients provided to each team at the cooking station and in the pantry may also be used to garnish the dish. Additional garnishing items will not be provided.
 - e. Note cards and the Food Challenge Worksheet may be used to write down the recipe that the team invents, along with notes related to nutrition, food safety and cost analysis. Teams should be exact on ingredients used, preparation steps, cooking time, temperature, etc.
 - f. Teams are judged during the preparation portion of the contest. Teams should refer to the scorecard for judging criteria.

- g. Only participants and contest officials will be allowed in food preparation areas. However, spectators may view the contest from designated areas.
- **11. ELECTRICITY:** Electric access will be provided at each cooking station. Based, upon number of entries and electricity capacity, teams should be prepared to use only one heat source at a time.
- 12. EQUIPMENT MALFUNCTIONS: Teams that may experience any equipment malfunction(s) may not replace the equipment with supplies from another team, leaders, volunteers, CEA/ASTs or contest officials. Team members must work together and be creative in completing preparation without the malfunctioning equipment.
- **13. PRESENTATION:** After the 40-minute preparation time is complete, teams will be called to present their dish to a panel of at least two judges. Teams should refer to the scorecard for judging criteria and what to include in their presentation.
 - a. All team members must participate in the presentation with at least three of them having a speaking role.
 - b. Judging time will include:
 - 5 minutes for presentation
 - 3 minutes for judges' questions
 - 2 minutes between team presentations for judges to score and write comments.
 - c. Teams are allowed the use of note cards during the presentation but should not read from them, as this minimizes the effectiveness of their presentation.
 - d. Judges may ask teams questions that are not directly related to the dish prepared. Instead, some questions may address the general knowledge gained through personal experience in a food and nutrition program.
 - e. No talking or writing is allowed among any team members while waiting to give their team presentation. Team members caught talking and/or writing will receive a warning. The second time, the team will be disqualified and asked to leave. Team members should not have pens or pencils in their possession while waiting to present.
- **14. CLEAN-UP:** Teams must clean up their preparation areas. Clean-up time is included in the 40-minute preparation allotment. Teams should plan to not have access to a kitchen facility; therefore, dirty dishes should be placed in a plastic container, bag or box to be cleaned at a later time. Left-over food can be disposed of in trash cans made available.
- **15. TASTING:** Judges may taste at their personal discretion. Therefore, teams should be prepared to serve a portion of their dish to the judges during their presentation.
- **16. FINAL ROUND:** The first place team in each category per age division will compete in the final round competition. Teams competing in the finals round will be provided with an area to wash their supplies in preparation for the finals.
- **17. AWARDS:** The top three teams in each category, in each age division, will receive awards. Additional placing awards will be provided for the teams competing in the final challenge.
- **18. SCHEDULE:** The following is a *tentative/example* schedule. A finalized schedule will be determined based upon the number of entries received and shared with contestants and coaches prior to the contest.

- RULES/REGULATIONS: This show/contest is subject to the State Fair of Texas General Rules, Junior Rules, and Special Rules listed in this section. The Skill-A-Thon will be comprised of an exam and one skill station. Point totals will be clearly written for each section at the time of the contest.
- 2. **ENTRY:** An entry fee of \$20 made payable to State Fair of Texas will be charged per entry. Entries must be made through official State Fair of Texas entry forms and may be entered online at bigtex.com.
- 3. ELIGIBILITY: Contestants must be between the ages of 3 years old 21 years old.
- 4. DIVISIONS: The contestants will be divided into four age divisions (aged as of September 1, 2015):
 - a. Novice: 8 and under
 - b. Junior: 9-12
 - c. Intermediate: 13-15
 - d. Senior: 16 and up
